Peas Plus Pork

New York—(UPI)—A quickie meal features peas and pork roll. Drain 1 (1-pound) can of peas. Arrange half of peas on 1/2 pound of thinly sliced pork roll. Roll up and fasten with toothpicks.

Melt 2 tablespoons of butter or margarine in skillet. Add pork roll and cook until lightly browned. Combine remaining peas with 1 (10 1/2-ounce) can of condensed cream of celery soup, 1/4 teaspoon rosemary, and salt and pepper to taste. Pour over pork roll, cover and cook over low heat 10 minutes. Serves 4.

Teen's Choice

Chicago—(UPI)—The teenagers' favorite drive-in snack of a hamburger, French fries and a chocolate shake is rich in nutrition, says Thomas A. Anderson.

Anderson, president of a drive-in corporation, said scientific studies show the meal provides more than half the daily requirement of calcium and one-third the protein and iron needed by a normally active man.

Meat Balls in a Boat

Hollow a long loaf of French bread by removing the top in one long slice and scraping the inside of the loaf with a fork. Fill the hollowed loaf with canned meatballs and gravy. Top with thin slices of onion and a sprinkling of Parmesan cheese and place top slice over all. Wrap the loaf in foil and bake in a gas oven, set at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Serve on a platter or tray garnished with olives and parsley. Serves 3-4.

Cooking Out?

New York—(UPI)—For a mild barbecue flavor, try open-face burger sandwiches. Blend 2/3 cup (1 small can) of undiluted evaporated milk with 1 egg, 1 1/2 pounds of ground beef, 1/2 cup of fine cracker crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, 1/4 teaspoon of pepper, 1 teaspoon of dry mustard and 1/4 cup of finely chopped green pepper. Toast 6 slices of bread on one side only. Divide meat mixture into 6 portions and arrange on untoasted side of bread. Broil to taste. Serve with 1 (8-ounce) can tomato sauce heated to serving temperature.

Sunday Breakfast

Serve Sunday breakfast guests a hot fruit to accompany ham, bacon or sausage. Drain canned cling peach halves well, and heat gently with a tablespoon of drippings in the skillet in which the meat was cooked. Sprinkle with finely chopped fresh mint, a little lemon juice and a dash of sugar. Serve piping hot.

"The adolescent girl wants to be slim, beautiful and popular," Dr. Everson said. "Often she refuses to drink milk for fear it will make her gain weight. But studies at Iowa State college have found that milk drinkers are actually more slender than girls who don't drink milk."
