Uncommitted Votes Sought on Labor Reform Bill

Washington - (UPI) - Both sides in the fierce House battle over labor reform legislation fought today to sway uncommitted colleagues whose votes will determine the outcome.

The House begins the labor reform debate Tuesday. It promises to be the most spirited fight of the session and the biggest battle over the issue of labor unions since the Taft-Hartley law was passed 12 years ago.

Outcome Not Predicted

House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack (Mass.) and GOP leader Charles A. Halleck (Ind.) vied on the eve of the showdown to push vigorously for rival bills. Neither would venture a prediction of the outcome.

It appeared that the votes of 216 of the 435 House members would clinch victory, if no more than the normal number of lawmakers are absent for such a crucial test.

There are 282 Democrats and 154 Republicans. The most optimistic of several Democratic head counts showed fewer than 200 Democrats committed to vote for the bill approved by the House Labor Committee.

80 Demo Votes Needed

Some Republican strategists calculated they needed about 80 Democratic votes to go with the 135 to 140 GOP ballots they counted on for the stronger measure of Reps. Phil M. Landrum (D-Ga.) and Robert Griffin (R-Mich.), which is supported by President Eisenhower.

The remaining undecided congressmen generally fell into three categories: Republicans from industrial areas where labor is strong politically; Southern Democrats; and northern Democrats from farm areas.

The lawmakers who have not made up their minds were under intense pressure from labor lobbyists to vote against the Landrum-Griffin bill and from business groups to vote for it.

Khrushchev Could Bring Peace Gift, Hoover Declares

New York - (UPI) - Former President Herbert Hoover said Sunday night that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev could bring world peace as a gift when he comes to the United States, "but this is unlikely to be the result of this visit."

Hoover, born 85 years ago today, answered questions ranging through his relief work in two world wars, the strength of American democracy, farm problems, crime, education, inflation and 1960 politics. "I'm not a candidate. You can take that as positive."

Challenge to Khrushchev Hoover said that Khrushchev could bring "the greatest, most generous gift which mankind has received in a thousand years," if he would eliminate "all international demands, all warnings, all threats, and all conspiracies against free people" and agree to peaceful co-existence, and inspected disarmament.

He said there was some hope the visit would lessen

some world tensions, but little hope Khrushchev would choose the means he outlined "to win immortality among the leaders of all men."

"We must be alert and armed to the teeth," Hoover said. "Expresses Deep Confidence"

But Hoover expressed confidence in the nation's ability to face both the external and internal problems which beset it.

"We are in more imminent dangers from internal causes than we are from the cold war," he said, citing "inflation, unbalanced budgets, overspending by Congress, the huge growth of crime" as some of the half dozen things about which the nation needs "to be more diligent."

When he was asked if these internal problems had weakened the nation so it could not stand firm against Russia, he replied with a stirring recital of this country's strengths.

"I wouldn't want anybody to think for a moment that the American people are not capable of solving any crisis," Hoover said.

Profit Taking Cuts Wall Street Prices

New York - (UPI) - Massive profit taking hit the stock market today, driving prices down as much as 11 points among the leaders.

The selling, heaviest since the Sept. 26, 1955, session which followed President Eisenhower's heart attack, was concentrated in those groups and issues where large paper profits had been run up over recent months—the electronics, chemicals, steels, aircrafts, drugs, metals and motors.

Among the heaviest losers were:

In the chemicals—DuPont, off 1 1/2, Allied Chemical, down 8/2 at the low.

Electronics—Texas Instruments, off 1 1/2 at its low, International Business Machines down 9/2, Zenith off 7/2 at the bottom.

Drugs—American Home Products down 1/2 at its worst, Warner Lambert down nearly 5, Vick off 3/2.

Steels—Youngstown Sheet & Tube down 4 1/2, U. S. Steel off more than 3.
