Antelope Hunters Urged To Use Care

Salem—(UP)—An urgent plea to use extreme care with fire has been directed by State Forester Dwight L. Phipps to the many antelope hunters who are heading for eastern Oregon for the season opening Saturday.

He pointed out that the hazard is very high and the slightest spark could ignite dry grass and brush. He said that in the open eastern Oregon country, winds can carry fires over large areas of grazing land in a very short time.
