

### Giants File Protest on Cub Scrap

Chicago (UPI)—Manager Bill Rigney of the San Francisco Giants today awaited word on his protest of Thursday's game with the Chicago Cubs which earned a place in the record book as the longest nine-inning game in league history.

"My protest may make it the longest game played under protest in any league, anywhere," Rigney said. "But I filed it right after the game and I'm anxious to see what's done about it."

The Cubs, with five home runs among 19 hits, battered the Giants 20-8, cooling off the league-leaders' hot streak of three straight victories and six in the last seven starts.

The three-hour and 50 minute game was interrupted by nine pitcher changes, seven by Rigney, seven substitutions, four by Rigney and three hassles with umpires.

Early Departures  
Giants pitcher Jack Sanford and infielder Daryl Spencer were tossed out of the game after challenging plate umpire Hal Dixon's judgment of balls and strikes in the first inning.

Cub Manager Bob Schefing was ejected after a lengthy dispute with first base umpire Vin Smith.

Rigney's protest came while his club trailed 10-7 in the fifth inning, the only frame in which the Cubs failed to score.

The Cubs' Tony Taylor, a baserunner on third, reached to deflect a foul grounder. Rigney charged from the dugout to protest this was interference.

He was overruled by the umpires and announced the game was being played under protest from that moment.

## Harshman Chalks Up Victory In First Start for Indians

Frank Lane may have struck it lucky again in obtaining Jack Harshman for a mere \$20,000.

That's the amount the Cleveland general manager paid the Red Sox to acquire the 32-year-old left-hander who came through Thursday night in his first start to go the distance in the Indians' 7-5 victory over the Kansas City Athletics.

The win enabled the second-place Indians to remain 2 1/2 lengths behind the Chicago White Sox who clobbered the Detroit Tigers, 9-0, for the 265th win of Early Wynn's major league career.

And it put them 9 1/2 games ahead of the third-place New York Yankees who suffered a 5-2 loss to the Washington Senators.

Home-Produced Runs  
All five Kansas City runs of Harshman resulted from homers by Bob Cerv, Zeke Bella and Dick Williams but the lean left-hander yielded a total of only seven hits and walked only one.

The White Sox backed Wynn's three-hit pitching with a 14-hit attack that included homers by Jim Landis, Bubba Phillips, Earl Torgerson and Sherman Lollar.

Harmon Killebrew hit two doubles and a single, drove in two runs and scored another as the Senators scored their second straight victory over the Yankees.

The Dodgers piled up an early 7-1 lead for Sandy Koufax but Danny McDevitt was rushed into the game in the ninth when the Cardinals rallied for five runs to fall one short of a tie.

## Ken Johnson Gains 15th Portland Win

Lanky 26-year-old Ken Johnson has become the winningest pitcher in the Pacific Coast league and he's carrying Portland's Beavers right along with him.

The 200-pound right hander won his 15th game of the season last night, muffling Sacramento on five hits, 5-1. He's lost only five.

Johnson, who won 11 and lost 17 with Buffalo in 1958, entered Thursday night's fray with a 2.44 earned run average and 107 strikeouts, both marks near the top in league statistics.

His "stopper" victory, getting the league-leading Bevs back on the win trail after a double loss Wednesday, was Johnson's 11th straight this season in Portland's Multnomah Stadium.

In other action Thursday, Seattle continued its torrid pace by winning its ninth in a row, 2-1 over Phoenix. San Diego blanked Vancouver, 4-0, and Salt Lake split with Spokane, winning an 8-3 opener but dropping the nightcap, 6-5.

BILKO BELTS  
Big Steve Bilko was Spokane's heavy artillery in the second game, belting a grand slam home run and a triple to back up pitcher Connie Grob's 11th win of the year.

In the opener, a pair of bases empty homers by R. C. Stevens and Dick Barone paced the Bees. Bilko also homered for Spokane in the seven-inning first game, but winning pitcher George Perez was in control for Salt Lake most of the way.

Bilko's homers were his 21st and 22nd of the season. Mark Freeman's three-hit pitching and the hitting of Gale Wade led Seattle's rejuvenated Rainiers in their 2-1 conquest of Phoenix. The win moved the cellar-dwellers to within one percentage point of the seventh-place Giants, and kept them within six and a half games of first place Portland.

Wade scored both Seattle runs, hitting his fifth homer of the season in the third inning and tripling off the right field wall in the eighth before scoring the winner. He also singled.

## Stan Sits On Bench

St. Louis (UPI)—National league, all-time great Stan Musial sat it out on the St. Louis Cardinals bench today. They told him he was getting a bit old.

Cardinal general manager Bing Devine said Musial was in perfect agreement with the arrangement to sit out most of the season's remainder "so we can play a lot of our younger men."

For his part, Musial said he was "very anxious" to play in 1960. Devine said Musial could play with the Cardinals so long as he wants.

Not Being Benched  
Devine told a hastily-called press conference just before tonight's Cardinal-Los Angeles Dodger game. "He's fully in agreement with what we're doing. It's just that for the rest of the season we'll be playing lots of young players."

Musial, 39, six-time National league batting champion, second only to Mel Ott in number of all-time home runs, runs scored and runs batted-in and to Honus Wagner in hits, all-time leader in doubles and total bases, only is hitting .261 this season. His life-time batting average entering the season was .340—far and above the highest of any active National leaguer.
