

Giants Get 6-4 Wet Victory Over Tough Chicago Cubs

Home runs by Willie Mays, Daryl Spencer and rookie Willie McCovey, plus the three-hit pitching of Jack Sanford carried the San Francisco Giants to a 6-4 victory Saturday in a rain-abbreviated game with the Chicago Cubs.

The victory snapped a two-game San Francisco losing streak and enabled Sanford, who was routed Thursday in the Cubs' 20-9 shelling of the league-leaders, to run his record to 12-9.

Mays' homer was his 20th, Spencer's was his ninth and McCovey's was his sixth in 14 games. Moe Drabowsky, the victim of poor fielding, was tagged with his ninth loss against five victories.

Downpour Delays Game
A heavy downpour delayed the game 50 minutes after the

Giants had batted in the eighth, and the umpires finally called the game when it became apparent that the rain would continue.

The second-place Los Angeles Dodgers, getting scoreless pitching from rookie Larry Sherry for 8 2/3 innings, kept pace with the Giants by beating the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3. The third-place Milwaukee Braves slipped four games behind the Giants when the Pittsburgh Pirates held on for a 10-8 victory and the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Philadelphia Phillies, 8-3 in other games.

The Cards jumped on Los Angeles starter Johnny Podres for all three of their runs in the first inning before Sherry came on to shut them out the rest of the way. A two-run homer by Bill White and a bases empty blast by

Ken Boyer accounted for the St. Louis scoring.

Sherry singled across the first Dodger run in the second and then batted in their second and third runs with his first major league home run in the third. The winning marker came on Duke Snider's homer in the sixth.

The victory kept the Dodgers 2 1/2 games in back of San Francisco.

The Pirates scored five times off Lew Burdette in the first inning and then held on to beat the Braves for the second straight day. Roberto

Central Pointers were issued nine walks by Woodburn chucker Randy Kooyman. They swiped 10 bases.

Quinney struck out eight and walked four. Woodburn tagged only one ball other than the lone hit out of the infield. That was a fly to center field which was turned into a double play by catching a runner off first base.

Kooyman whiffed 12 Pointers. Mike Pepper was to pitch last night's game for CP, according to Coach Don Miller.
