Radioisotopes to Be Used at Rogue Valley Hospital

Rogue Valley hospital has been given authority by the federal government to administer radioisotopes in therapeutic cases, it was announced by hospital officials.

Approval came from the Atomic Energy commission after official investigation of storage facilities, treatment area conditions, and personnel training and experience.

The use of radioisotopes is not new at Rogue Valley hospital, but its use has previously been confined to a diagnostic role.

The service of administering the isotopes for therapy will be a new medical benefit offered by the hospital, commonly given only in the nation's medical centers. The isotope treatment is effective in combating over-activity of the thyroid gland as well as certain forms of cancer, officials said.

A special problem in stocking radioisotopes is the brief life of certain types, as short as one and one-half days. In obtaining such isotopes, the hospital must maintain close coordination between the source of supply at Oak Ridge, Tenn., and its delivery by Air Express to Medford.

Permission was granted at the same time for more extensive application of the isotopes in diagnostic procedures.

Courtesy on Streets Prevents Some Mishaps

A little more courtesy on the streets of Medford would go a long way toward making the streets much safer, according to Chief of Police Charles P. Champlin.

Chief Champlin said last week that many accidents which cause considerable property damage are the result of failure to "share the road".

As an example, he cited the driver who backs out or pulls out of a parking place without checking to see if his movement might cause some other driver trouble.

"Common courtesy," the chief said, "should cause a driver to check first and, if traffic is too close, to wait until he has a chance to pull out without interfering with moving traffic."

Annoying Type
The most annoying type of driver discourtesy in city traffic, he pointed out, is the horn honker, the fellow who gives a blast on his horn if the car ahead doesn't move the second the light turns green.

Other actions which indicate a car is being driven by a driver who hasn't learned to share the road, he said, are bumper-chasers and lane jumpers, not to mention those who never bother to signal what they plan to do next in traffic.

If these drivers did nothing more than annoy other people it would be bad enough, he concluded, but many times they cause accidents.

Diphtheria Case Is Reported in County

One case of diphtheria in Jackson county was reported Friday by Dr. C. I. Drummond, acting Jackson county health officer.

The victim, a 47-year-old man who moved here recently from California, is confined in a local hospital. Dr. Drummond said all contacts with the man had been checked and no other case has occurred.

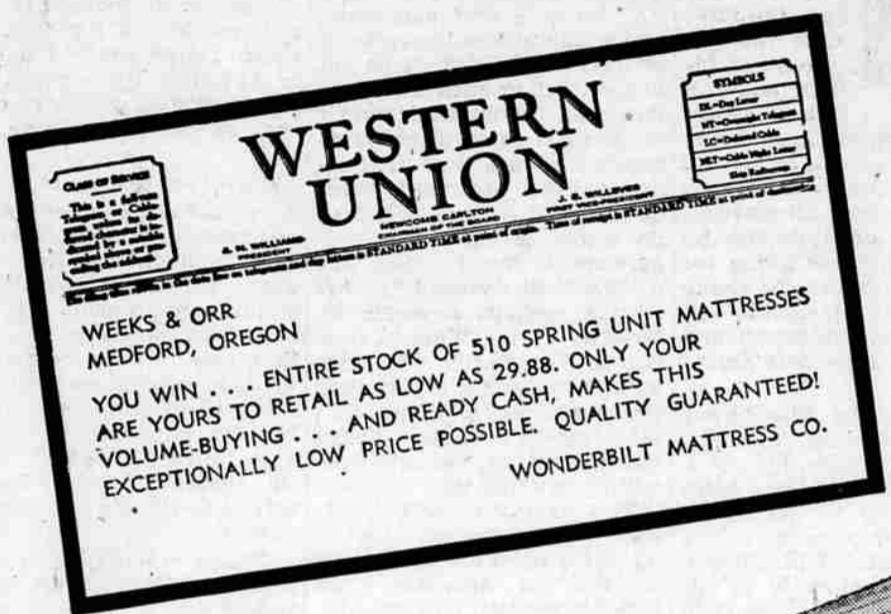

Engineers See Deep-Sea Mining

Berkeley, Calif. — (UP) — The miner of tomorrow may head for his diggings by ship and use a vacuum-cleaner contraption to dredge up a bonanza of minerals from the ocean floor.

This is envisioned by two University of California mineral engineers who report that loose-lying rock containing such vital metals as manganese may be found in some areas of the ocean floor to be worth as much as \$1,500,000 per square mile.

Present technology probably could manage such deep-sea mining today, according to Dr. Herbert E. Hawkes and John Mero.

The metals are contained in spherical deposits usually less than six inches in diameter and called nodules. These small brown-black stones began to grow millions of years ago from materials washed into the oceans from the land, such as volcanic glass, pumice and clay.

Scientists at the University of California's Scripps Institution of Oceanography in La Jolla early this year found a rich store of nodules off the coast of the French-owned Tuamotu islands in the South Pacific.

Analysis showed that these deposits contained 25 per cent manganese, 15 per cent iron and lesser amounts of nickel, copper and cobalt. A number of rare earth metals also were found.

One dredge haul brought in nearly 500 pounds of the nodules from a depth of 4,000 feet.

The United States has no important deposits of manganese, necessary for the manufacture of steel. Before 1948 it was imported mainly from Russia but now comes from India, Brazil, Ghana and South Africa.

Hawkes and Mero estimated that one square mile of ocean floor could yield enough nodules to provide 6,000 tons of manganese, worth about \$750,000; 4,000 tons of iron, worth \$40,000; and 125 tons each of nickel, copper and cobalt worth, respectively, \$180,000, \$60,000 and \$500,000.
