

## HORN BROOK Smoke Hangs in Valley

Hornbrook - Hornbrook's housewives have been busy "mopping up" from the Ashland fire.

No ashes fell in the immediate vicinity from the blaze which blackened 2,800 acres of brush and timber on the outskirts of town two weeks ago, but because of the prevailing north winds here, a steady shower of ash had been carried over the mountains since the fire first started Saturday. It sneaked through screen doors and windows, and left a coating of sifted ashes on everything.

Monday afternoon, visibility was about two blocks, and the sunlight was filtered through smoke still blowing in from the north, and hanging like a pall over the valley.

Bob Smith, of Roseburg, Ore., telephoned his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Smith, at 7:30 a.m. Friday, Aug. 7, to advise them that he was all right. Bob lives about a mile from the scene of the blast but it was his mother's understanding from their brief conversation, that he was thrown out of bed by the force of the explosion. He is employed by Copco, and had been out along with other Copco men since 1:30 in the morning.

## Florida Man Paid to Stay On Rockpile

Apple Valley, Calif. - (UPI) - Neither rats, dust, sand, heat, flying ants or boredom will prevent a red-barded Florida man from staying atop a 60-foot rock in the desert until Oct. 4.

That was the vow made Friday by Jim Coble, 33, who is being paid \$2 a day to stay atop the rockpile at "Deadman's point."

Coble, a carpenter, came west seeking work. Local businessman Mike Dressler selected him to climb the rockpile last July 5 and stay there alone until Oct. 4.

The stunt is to help entertain visitors to Dressler's Western Village at Deadman's point.

Coble raises the American flag over his perch daily on a flagpole he erected himself. A cable leading to the ground hauls up Coble's food and other necessities in a bucket.

Visitors to the site, once a raiding point for hostile Indians who met wagon trains on the old Holcomb trail, seldom are able to talk to Coble because their shouts are lost in the wind.
