Oregon To Get Funds for Aging

Washington—(UP)—As a financial aid to participation in the 1961 White House conference on Aging, Oregon will receive \$15,000 in federal funds, Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) announced Sunday.

The senator said he had been advised by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that Oregon was one of the first 15 states whose applications were approved. Neuberger said the conference, along with studies now being carried out by a Senate subcommittee, could serve as the basis for establishing "a comprehensive approach to the problems created by the percentage population increase in older persons."

He said the major problem facing older persons is medical care. He cited figures showing that persons 65 and older use more than twice as much hospital care as those under 65, but that 65 per cent of the aged do not have hospital insurance.

Bend—(UP)—All wood cutting permits have been cancelled by officials of the Bend district of the Deschutes national forest.

Officials said the permits were revoked because of fire hazards in the area. They said the permits will be restored when weather conditions permit.

Boeing Jet Plane Crash Investigated

Calverton, N.Y.—(UP)—Investigators tried today to determine why a huge, swept-wing American Airlines Boeing 707 jet passenger plane crashed here on a training mission, killing all five crew members.

Thirty-two investigators headed by David L. Thompson of the Civil Aeronautics Board joined with American Airlines probers in sifting through the charred wreckage of the \$5 million plane, which crashed and burned in a Long Island potato patch Saturday.

They also questioned eyewitnesses who saw the craft, the pride of this nation's commercial jet fleet, falter and plunge to earth about four miles from the Gruman Aircraft Corporation's Peconic river airfield where it was practicing "touch-and-go" landings.

Range Fire Under Control Near Vale

Vale—(UP)—A range fire of some 3,000 acres about 50 miles west of here was brought under control early today according to the Bureau of Land Management's fire control office.

About 80 men battled the blaze Sunday night after it broke out along a county road. Darryl Fulwider, Vale district manager for the BLM, said he believed the fire was man-caused.

The flames mostly burned brush and juniper trees. The blaze was located northwest of the Beulah reservoir.

The fire was contained about 2:30 a.m.

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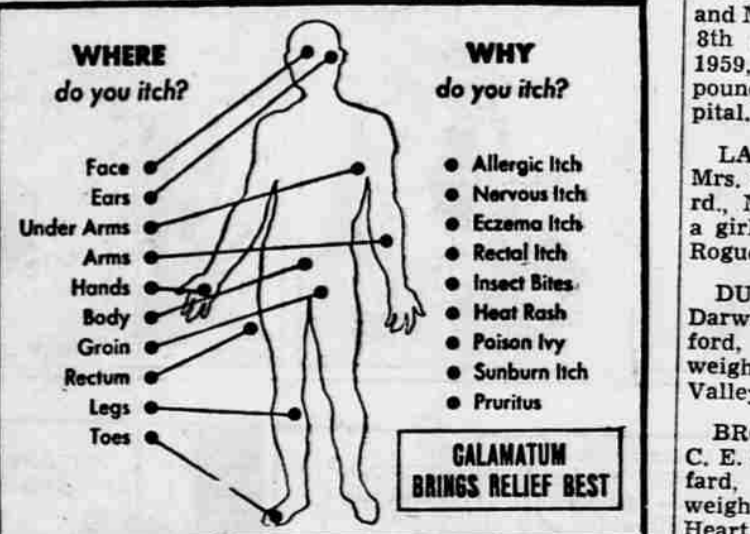
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
