New York—(UPI)—Stocks suffered another bad sinking spell today before meeting some late support.

The late buying brought some issues back sharply from their lows but losses of a point or more were liberally sprinkled throughout the main list.

At the lows for the day, individual losses ran past 4 and 5 points in some stocks. The autos, chemicals, oils, aircrafts, rails, steels, nonferrous metals, tires and drugs all stood out on the downside.

Curtiss-Wright was a bright spot all day, rising around 5 at its high after directors maintained the quarterly dividend. DuPont was weak in the chemicals, while American Home Products and Vicki featured the downside in the drugs.
