Academy Classroom Building To Open for Fall Semester

E. L. Gammon, educational secretary of the Oregon conference of the Seventh-day Adventist church, was in Medford Wednesday to inspect and give conference approval to the classroom building under construction at the Rogue River Academy.

The building, which will house six classrooms, is expected to be completed by Sept. 8 when the academy will open for the fall term. Also in the structure will be three additional classrooms and a library to accommodate junior high students. This part of the building will be completed several weeks after the term begins, it was reported. The building, of shale block, is on Old Stage rd. The entire side of the structure which overlooks the valley will be of glass. Each classroom is equipped with sink and rooms for the lower grades will have adjoining rest rooms.

Future construction will include a cafeteria. Contractor is George Johnson, Medford.

Registration at the academy will be held Aug. 30 and 31. Teachers will be Mrs. Dwight Pflugrad, first; Mrs. Arthur Bissiger, second, both new this year; Jim Nations, third

National Religious Publicity Council

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Correspondent Talks With Church Council Secretary

Editor's note: Louis Casseles, UPI writer on religion in America, has been taking a look at religious developments in Europe. In the following dispatch, he reports on an interview with a leader of the World Council of Churches.

Geneva—UPI—The forthcoming Ecumenical Council in Rome will be "strictly a Roman Catholic affair." Protestant and eastern orthodox churches will not be invited to participate.

This prediction came from the Rev. Dr. Willem A. Visser 'T' Hooft, general secretary of the World Council of Churches. It conforms with opinions expressed privately by well-informed Catholics in Rome.

Dr. Visser 'T' Hooft is a 59-year-old Dutch clergyman who has served most of his adult life in the cause of Christian unity. He has been the chief staff officer of the World Council of Churches since that organization of 165 Protestant and Orthodox denominations was established 11 years ago.

Intending Inviting Others
In an interview at the world council's headquarters here, he expressed the conviction that Pope John XXIII originally intended to invite non-Catholics to the ecumenical council which probably will meet in 1961.

"If you read the spontaneous announcement made by the Pope last Jan. 25, you can have no doubt that he wanted the council to be something more than an all-Catholic meeting," said Dr. Visser 'T' Hooft. "There was every indication that he conceived of it as an historic move toward reunion of the Christian family, and that some form of invitation would be issued to other churches."

But Dr. Visser 'T' Hooft said recent pronouncements from the Vatican have taken "an entirely different line." He cited particularly a papal encyclical of June 29 which said that the Ecumenical Council, by bringing together Catholic bishops from all parts of the world, will be a "wonderful manifestation" of unity already existing within the Catholic church.

The encyclical expressed the hope that this demonstration would inspire in non-Catholics a desire to "return" to the Roman fold. But there was not the slightest hint that eastern orthodox or Protestant representatives would be asked to attend the council in any capacity.

Dr. Visser 'T' Hooft indicated that he is inclined to agree with Vatican advisers about the impracticality of inviting non-Catholics to an Ecumenical Council at this time. "Great harm can come from rushing into formal talks about unity," he said. "There is a strong yearning for Christian reunion today, among Catholics as well as non-Catholics. The Pope's original announcement, in which he clearly spoke from the heart, showed that he shares this yearning."

A Hopeful Development
"This is a very hopeful development, and surely reflects the will of God for his church. But a long period of preparation will be needed before we reach the stage of formal talks about unity. It took the churches 1,000 years to get so far apart, and it would be unrealistic to expect them to heal their divisions overnight."

"That are some stumbling blocks which are so big that human wisdom cannot at present see any way to overcome them. For example, there is not a single church in the World Council that has the slightest desire to recognize the Pope as infallible."

"We cannot simply sit down at a conference and draw up neat little blueprints for solving these problems. We can only pray earnestly on both sides that God will show us His way, and give us the faith and humility to pursue it."

Syracuse, N.Y.—UPI—During the past 11 years some 650 youngsters have learned that their speech and hearing problems can be solved. Each summer since 1948, boys and girls aged 6 to 18 have gone through daily programs of therapy with recreation and special instruction at Syracuse University. "We firmly believe that these children benefit immensely from working and playing and living together in an natural way as possible," said Dr. Charles V. Mangle, director of the Summer Residence School for Children with Speech and Hearing problems at Syracuse University. For three hours each day the students receive both group and individual attention consisting of lip reading instruction, auditory training, selection and evaluation of hearing aids and language activities. In addition, the program seeks to help the youngsters overcome the social and emotional problems connected with their handicaps.
