Portland Orchestra Has Magazine

Portland Symphony will have its own official magazine, "Symphony Notes," beginning this fall.

Henry M. Norton, manager, said the publication will carry news of the orchestra, the society, women's committee, the conductor and articles of general interest. Mrs. Byron Ferris and Mrs. Carl Henninger are editors.

Thirteen issues will be published, 12 to precede concerts on the orchestra's 1959-60 season, and one annual issue August 31. Features of the first publication include a profile of the new conductor, Piero Bellugi, by Robert Arenz, and a preview of the coming musical season by Maurice Engleman, along with news of the great music seminars at the Portland extension center, the Sheraton-Portland Symphony benefit opening September 26, and the musical program for the coming season.

The magazine will be mailed to all members of the symphony society. During the symphony season, it will carry program notes to be distributed to all concerts, replacing the regular program. In addition, subscriptions may be purchased at a nominal cost at the symphony office in the park building for those who desire an advance mailing.

Aside from its informative value, the magazine advertising will be a financial asset to the symphony, according to Norton. Last year the program book brought \$7,000 income to the society.
