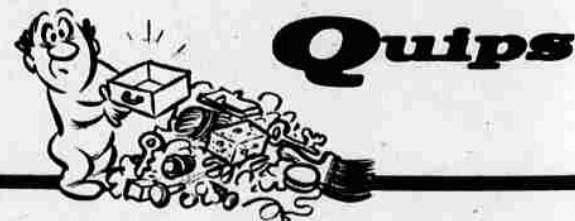
### How Many Weeks Is It? — Two?
