**The Medical Roundup**

**New Polio Vaccine Can Now Be Given in Candy**

Millions of people all over the world are now being given a polio vaccine made of three living, but harmless, viruses. The small dose can be taken by mouth. It is probable that it will give a protection which will last much longer than does that given by a killed virus vaccine. It is important, also, that the persons who get the live virus are likely to pass on their immunity to others within the family, who have picked up the virus from them. Fortunately, it is a virus which has been "attenuated," or so weakened that it cannot produce any serious illness. Until this is made generally available here, mothers should be seeing to it that their children are given another injection of Salk vaccine.

**Gluing Together Broken Bones**

A while ago, Dr. Michael P. Mandarino, of Philadelphia, announced that he had been having excellent results, gluing the two ends of broken bones together. The patients tended to recover quickly so that they did not need to stay so long in the hospital. Naturally, in order to use the glue, a surgeon will have to cut down on the broken bone. Oftentimes today this is done, and the two pieces are held together, perhaps with a metal bar and some screws. In many cases, if the two ends can be brought into good position and held there with a cast, that is the best treatment. Many old people who fall and break the upper end of their long thigh bone are best treated with an operation in which the lose end in the hip joint is nailed onto the shaft of the femur (thigh bone). With this operation the patient can get up out of bed sooner, and with this there is less of a tendency for the old person to become bed-ridden.

**Mental Troubles Are Common**

In a recent release from the World Health Organization, I find a page that interests me because the author agrees with me. Dr. P. Sivadon, a leading French psychiatrist, said that when he was a student and decided he wanted to go into psychiatry his professor objected and said, "Mental cases are scarce; I've only come across three in the whole of my career!"

As Dr. Sivadon says so truly, mild mental cases are anything but scarce. Probably any good psychiatrist could go into the crowded reception room of any internist and quickly pick out one or two schizophrenics or manic-depressives. The important point is that when the patient got in to see his doctor the chances are that his mental troubles would not be suspected.

Why not? Because the doctor never had any interest in psychiatry and never had much if any training in it. When he was in college, he never would pay any attention to psychiatry because he didn't expect in his practice ever to see a mentally dis-

**Steel Negotiators Renew Discussions**

New York—(UPI)—Steel contract negotiations resumed this morning with the strike logging its 41st day and the industry maintaining that the only solution lies in "free collective bargaining."

R. Conrad Cooper, chief industry negotiator, said Sunday the steel industry still was against proposals for a public fact-finding board to look into the dispute.

Both the industry and the United Steelworkers know the facts, Cooper said, and "we don't need anyone else to tell us the facts."

The Steelworkers seek a 15-cent an hour wage increase and maintains that industry could grant one without raising prices. The industry, replying that any wage boost will be inflationary, is asking certain contract changes.

Today's talks were not expected to tackle the central issue of wages. Union President David J. McDonald was not slated to be present.

**TO EXTEND SERVICE**

New York—(UPI)—Pan American World Airways announced Sunday that beginning Oct. 25 it will extend jet service to six more European cities. The new cities on Pan American's itinerary will be Frankfurt, Dusseldorf, Amsterdam, Brussels, Hamburg and Copenhagen.
