## Normal Life Span Of 100 Years Seen For Man in Future

Ojai, Calif. —UPI—A pioneer in the theory of stress psychology says "no one dies of old age" and envisioned the day when man will have a normal life span of 100 years.

Dr. Hans Selye, director of the Institute of Experimental Research, at Montreal, Canada, said "no one has ever reached the limit of age." Mankind now is troubled primarily by diseases of stress—wear and tear—and the problem of cancer. Once solutions are found to these problems, man can expect an increasingly longer life, he said.

"No one dies of old age. Some disease causes death," Dr. Selye said. **Makes One Nervous**  
Selye was principal speaker at the second annual inter-professional seminar sponsored by the affiliated psychosocial consultants. This year's seminar was devoted to psychological stress, an area in which Selye is credited with principal contributions.

Selye said to the layman, stress is defined as something that tires one and makes one nervous. The physician says stress is strain.

He went on to say man is born with a specific amount of adaptability to life which he can use, but cannot supplement. How this adaptability is used determines the length of his life.

Stress is the date of wear and tear—"the speed with which we use up our vital energy at one time," Selye said. He emphasized this was not the same as aging, which he called the result of the total stress over the period of a lifetime.

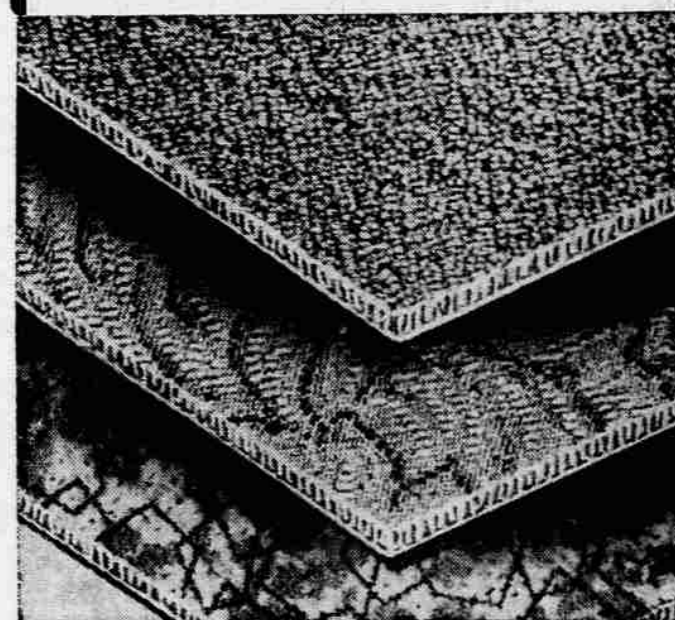
