Giants Bombard Pittsburgh; Chisox Nab 30th by One Run

The Giants and White Sox may well wind up as rivals in the World Series, but they are sure are traveling different roads toward the promised land.

The Giants like to slug it out in a "big inning," as they did in a 12-5 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates Tuesday night to preserve their 3 1/2 game National League lead. Even 18-game winner Johnny Antonelli got into the act with a two-run homer.

But how about those White Sox, who think a "big inning" means a walk, a stolen base, a wild pitch, and a sacrifice fly?

The Go-Go-Soxers gave a typical performance as they came from behind to beat the Boston Red Sox, 5-4, in 10 innings and maintain their two-game lead in the American league chase. That was merely their 30th one-run victory so far this season.

Cash Gets Homer
This time they were "treated" to an early homer by rookie Norm Cash. But they had only four hits off Frank Sullivan and trailed, 4-2, going into the ninth. Singles by Al Smith and Cash chased Sullivan and then Jim Rivera and John Romano continued the "bombardment" with singles off reliever Mike Fornieles to tie the score.

Chicago won in the 10th when Sherm Lollar walked with two out and Billy Goodman drove him home with a double.

The Giants, on the other hand, missed scoring in only two innings as they trampled the Pirates for Antonelli's 18th victory—tops in the majors.

Dodgers Whip Phils
In the National league, the second-place Los Angeles Dodgers whipped Philadelphia, 5-2, to stay a half-game ahead of the third-place Milwaukee Braves, who downed St. Louis, 3-1, in 10 innings. Also, the Chicago Cubs downed Cincinnati 8-6. In the American league, second-place Cleveland ripped New York, 6-3; Washington downed Detroit, 3-1; and Kansas City snared Baltimore, 6-5.

Duke Snider and Gil Hodges, the two "old pros" who are pacing the Los Angeles attack, each whacked his 21st homer of the year, to beat the Phils. Snider's was the 352nd of his career, breaking his third-place tie with Ralph Kiner on the all-time National league list and leaving him behind only Mel Ott and Stan Musial.

Ray Boone, acquired recently for pinch-hitting strength, delivered a run-scoring ninth-inning single that gave the Braves a 1-1 tie with the

Cards and then Ed Mathews' double highlighted a winning two-run rally in the 10th.

Colavito Belts Two Homers
Homers by Cal Neeman and Irv Noren led the Cubs' 11-hit attack against Cincinnati as southpaw Bill Henry picked up the win with 5 1/3 innings of one-run pitching.

Rocky Colavito belted two homers and Vic Power one for the Indians as Cal McLish posted his 16th win on a six-hitter over the Yanks. Colavito's blasts gave him 37 for the year.

Pedro Ramos, with ninth-inning help from Chuck Stobbs, gained his 12th win for the Senators over the Tigers. Julio Baquer led his 11-hit support with two singles and a run-scoring double.

The four's spotted the Orioles four runs, gradually caught up, and then went ahead to stay when Dick Williams' run-scoring single capped a two-run rally in the seventh inning.

Governor Brown Warns Against Monkey Business In Basilio-Fullmer Bout

San Francisco—(UPI)—Gov. Edmund G. Brown made a strong threat Tuesday to seek abolition of boxing in California, and the California state athletic commission warned against any "monkey business" in the Gene Fullmer-Carmen Basilio (NBA) middleweight title fight here Friday night.

As the two battlers wound up their training for the big battle at the Cow Palace, the commission forced Basilio to sign a new contract that would "cut out" his co-managers, John De John and John Netro. Neither man is eligible for a manager's license in this state—and neither is expected to watch the battle from ringside, although both probably will see it on television.

Basilio 2-1 Favorite
Late odds showed that Basilio has been boosted into the favorite's role at 2-1 and it is probable that the commission was cocking an eye at these odds when it warned Basilio against "splitting" any of the money he received here with Netro and DeJohn.

"The first contract had a clause in it stating that Netro and DeJohn would split their share of the purse," said Jack Urch, executive officer of the commission. "The new contract calls for Basilio to get 100 per cent of whatever he earns."

"If we find at any time that he has split some of his money with the co-managers, he never will be allowed to fight in California again."

Meanwhile, Gov. Brown warned the hoodlums in the boxing industry that he is considering a plan to outlaw professional fighting in the

state of California.

"The whole thing smells to high heaven," Brown told a news conference.

Brown suggested that Congress set up laws that would put the states on a cooperative basis.

Wants Federal Regulation
"I seriously have been thinking of asking for abolition of boxing in this state unless there are some national laws enacted to clean it up," said Brown. "It has to be on a national level. It can't be done without interstate cooperation."

He added that there is little interstate cooperation now and, when a fighter or manager is suspended in one state, he "just goes into another state."

Basilio wound up his major conditioning program Tuesday when he went two rounds with sparring partner Leo Owens. It brought to 111 the number of rounds Carmen has boxed preparing for this fight.

Today he just went through calisthenics and limbering up exercises with a bit of roadwork.

Fullmer, who already has boxed about 120 rounds, is in secret sparring sessions yet and hasn't allowed reporters to see his new weapons the last few days.

FORTY-NINERS TRIM
San Francisco—(UPI)—The San Francisco Forty-Niners trimmed their National Football league team to 47 players Tuesday by placing two high draft choices on waivers. They were halfback Leon Burton of Arizona State, eighth choice as a redshirt two years ago; and tackle-linebacker Don Rogers of South Carolina, seventh round pick this year.

2 Rounds Today in Ladies' Am

Washington—(UPI)—The slightly-blurred picture in the Women's National Amateur golf championship should be clearer by sundown today following a double round of match play action.

The field of 32 players who survived Tuesday's second round will be reduced to 16 this morning, and this afternoon's round will cut the list to eight quarter-finalists.

The quarter-finals will be held Thursday, the semifinals Friday and the 36-hole title round Saturday.

Defending champion Ann Quast of Marysville, Wash., and the other title contenders—Jo Anne Gunderson of Seattle, Wash., Mariene Stewart Street of Old Hickory, Ont., Judy Eller of Fond Hickory, Tenn., and Anne Richardson of Columbus, Ohio—all advanced with little difficulty Tuesday.

This morning's feature match sent Miss Eller, 19-year-old intercollegiate champion, against Mrs. Street, Miss Quast met Mrs. Frank Stranahan, wife of the former men's national amateur champion, while Miss Gunderson was a heavy favorite over Janet Macwha of St. Lambert, Que. Miss Richardson meets Sally Carroll of Wheeling, W. Va.

Drain Beats Show Me's
Wichita, Kan.—(UPI)—The Drain Black Sox have found the winning trail in the National Non-Pro baseball tournament here.

Drain won its third straight game Tuesday night by blanking the Branson, Mo., Show-Me's 6-0 behind the five-hit pitching of lefty Elwood Hahn.

Drain, which lost its first game of the tournament it won last year, plays Thursday afternoon against the winner of today's Wichita-Houston game.

Kim Bradshaw, Oregon State outfielder, led the Drain attack with a triple and a single to drive in three runs.

Pittsburgh—(UPI)—The San Francisco Giants, minus third baseman Jim Davenport for possibly the remainder of the season, meet Pittsburgh in the finale of a three-game set tonight then leave immediately for Philadelphia to play a rescheduled doubleheader.

It was learned Tuesday that Davenport would probably be lost for the season. The slick fielding third baseman suffered a torn ligament in his left knee in a collision at the plate in Cincinnati Aug. 17. Team trainer Frank Bowman said the injury had failed to respond to treatment, meaning that Rigney will have to continue to go with Jackie Brandt at third base.

White Sox Get Big Klu

Pittsburgh—The Pittsburgh Pirates Tuesday traded veteran first baseman Ted Kluszewski to the Chicago White Sox for Harry Suitcase Simpson and a minor league infielder.

The Pirates received waivers from all National League clubs on Kluszewski, who was acquired from the Cincinnati Reds in 1958.
