

### Roseburg Victor in Regional

Roseburg — (UPI) — Roseburg scored five runs in the top of the third inning here Wednesday night and went on to defeat Billings 5-3 to win the regional 11 junior American Legion baseball title.

The game was the second of the night between the two clubs as Billings won the first 4-3 to necessitate the second.

A nominal fee of \$1 will be charged for the exam and each boy should bring the money with him at the time of the examination. Boys may have their physicals from their family physicians if they wish. If this is done, a boy must secure an examination form from the school office to take to his doctor and the boy will be responsible for paying whatever fee is charged.

Youths unable to attend the regularly scheduled examinations may call at the office of Dr. William Holt, at his convenience.

Signatures of a parent or legal guardian, granting permission to play football, should be on the exam form before it is returned to the school.

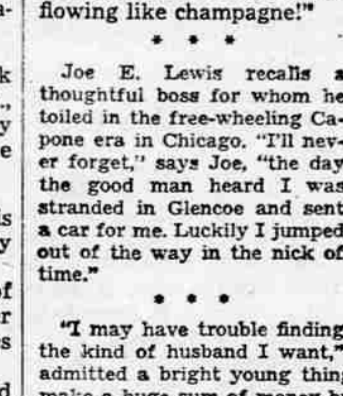
