Duncan To Speak At Government Research Meeting

Speaker of the House of Representatives Robert B. Duncan, Medford, will be among the nearly 100 authorities in various phases of government who will participate in the forthcoming Western Governmental Research Association convention which opens Sunday in Portland. Duncan, who is chairman of the Legislative Fiscal committee, will participate in a panel discussion scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Monday on the role of the legislative fiscal officer. Since Oregon has recently established such an office and California has separated the fiscal analysis functions from the office of legislative officer, this topic is expected.

Other panel members with Duncan will be Marvin Blanchard, chief, division of organization and cost control, California department of finance, Sacramento; Gilbert G. Lentz, assistant legislative analyst, joint legislative budget committee, Sacramento; Leslie D. Howe, director of state activities, California Taxpayers association, Sacramento; and Paul W. Ellis, legislative auditor, Olympia, Wash.

To Preside—Dr. George A. Shipman, department of political science, University of Washington, Seattle, will preside.

Dr. Albert Lepawsky, director of the Training Center for the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, B. C., will speak at the luncheon Monday on "Regional Resources and Policy Research." He is one of the nation's outstanding experts in the field of resources management, international administration and regional planning and recently made an extensive tour of European and Scandinavian countries studying their administration of natural resources, according to convention officials.

Other topics of particular interest in Oregon will include the transitional role of counties, policy leadership in city government and new sources of revenue for state and local government.

Gov. Mark O. Hatfield will be the banquet speaker Monday evening and Dr. Dwight Waldo, director, bureau of public administration, University of California, Berkeley, will give the keynote address. Persons interested in administrative, finance and legislative problems in government will be welcome to attend the conference sessions, which will be held at the Multnomah hotel.
