## Honor Student Found Murdered; Kidnap Sought

Reno, Nev. — (UPI) — A 17-year-old honor student, believed kidnapped during a service station holdup in California, was found shot to death last night on a remote cliff near here.

The victim was Larry Water, who had planned to start collecting next month on a \$150 a month scholarship.

Police issued an all-points bulletin for a young murder suspect, who was believed to be driving a car bearing New Mexico license plates.

George Howard, manager of the service station where Water was employed in Livermore, Calif., said a young man drove into the station Wednesday and entered the office.

A few moments later, Water told Howard he "had to leave" with the customer to help him buy some tires. The manager said Water appeared nervous at the time.

When the attendant hadn't returned in a half hour, Howard went into the office and found \$42 missing from the cash register. He notified authorities that Water may have been kidnapped.

Police said Water's body was found on a high cliff overlooking the Truckee river in the rugged painted rock area near the small town of Wadsworth. Two 25 caliber bullets had been fired into the boy's head.

Justice of the Peace Harry Guerin, of Sparks, Nev., said the boy had been dead about 25 hours. He found rope burns on the victim's wrists and \$1.02 in his pocket.

## Springfield Due Plywood Plant

Portland — (UPI) — Plans for a new 10-million square feet per month plywood plant in Springfield were announced Thursday by Georgia Pacific Corp. here.

President Robert Corp. t President Robert B. Pamplin said the new plant, which is expected to provide employment for about 200 workers, is the first step in completely integrating the firm's three Springfield plants.

Chipping equipment also will be added to utilize waste wood from all three of the Springfield plants. Pamplin said the chips would be shipped to the GP paper mill in

Toledo. He said the company's paper and containerboard production at Toledo will be doubled by mid-1960.

The new plywood plant will be built adjacent to the 100 per cent owned Springfield Plywood Corp. plant.

"It is the first step in better utilization of the Booth-Kelly timber," Pamplin said. Georgia Pacific purchased the Booth-Kelly holdings in a multi-million dollar transaction last month.

Construction will begin immediately, he said, and completion of the plant is expected in the spring of 1960.

## Senate Approves Orphan Measure

Washington — (UPI) — Legislation sponsored by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) governing the entrance of orphans to the United States passed the Senate Thursday.

The legislation will permit orphans under 14 years of age to enter the country if they have been or will be adopted by United States citizens, Neuberger explained.

The senator said the bill passed Thursday was an extension of legislation which expired July 1, 1959.

"While the extension passed Thursday is only for one year," Neuberger said, "it is my hope that next year Congress will be able to enact a permanent program for the admission of orphan children."

Legislation of this type has allowed Creswell, Ore., farmer Harry Holt to carry on his Korean orphan airlift program.

Neuberger said he expects White House approval of the bill shortly.
