Florida Woman Victor In Women's Amateur Golf

Washington, D. C. — (UPI) — Twenty-four-year-old Barbara McIntire, playing like she belonged on the pro circuit, won the National Women's Amateur Golf championship Saturday by defeating Joanne Goodwin of Haverhill, Mass., 4 and 3.

Miss McIntire, who sells real estate for her father in Lake Park, Fla., turned in several clutch chip shots in the match, which was played in humid, 95-degree heat on the 6,437-yard Congressional Country Club course.

The Collins college grad, playing in her 10th National Amateur championship, closed out the scheduled 36-hole match on the par-five 33rd hole with a halve. For the day, Miss McIntire was three strokes under par.

Maverick Wins Cup

Detroit — (UPI) — Maverick, the unsuccessful U.S. Harmsworth trophy defender, coasted to victory in the 14th running of the Silver Cup on the Detroit river by winning two races and finishing second in a third 15-mile heat.

Driven by Bill Stead, of Las Vegas, the Maverick coasted to victory in one section of each of the first two races and then was runner up to Miss U.S. in the final race of the day to pile up 1,100 points.

Miss U.S., driven by Don Wilson, was the only other two-heat winner in the Silver Cup, but she had trouble at the start of the day's action and averaged only 67 and 63 miles an hour on her first two three-mile laps. Thus the boat finished fourth in that heat, which was worth only 169 points, giving Miss U.S. a total of 969.

Victory in each heat was worth 400 points while the second place finisher received 300 and third place was worth 225.

Miss Detroit wound up third with 825 points on a pair of seconds and a third place finish in the last heat. Kol Roy was fourth with 638 points and was trailed by Miss Bar Dahl, 554, and Such Crust III, 545.
