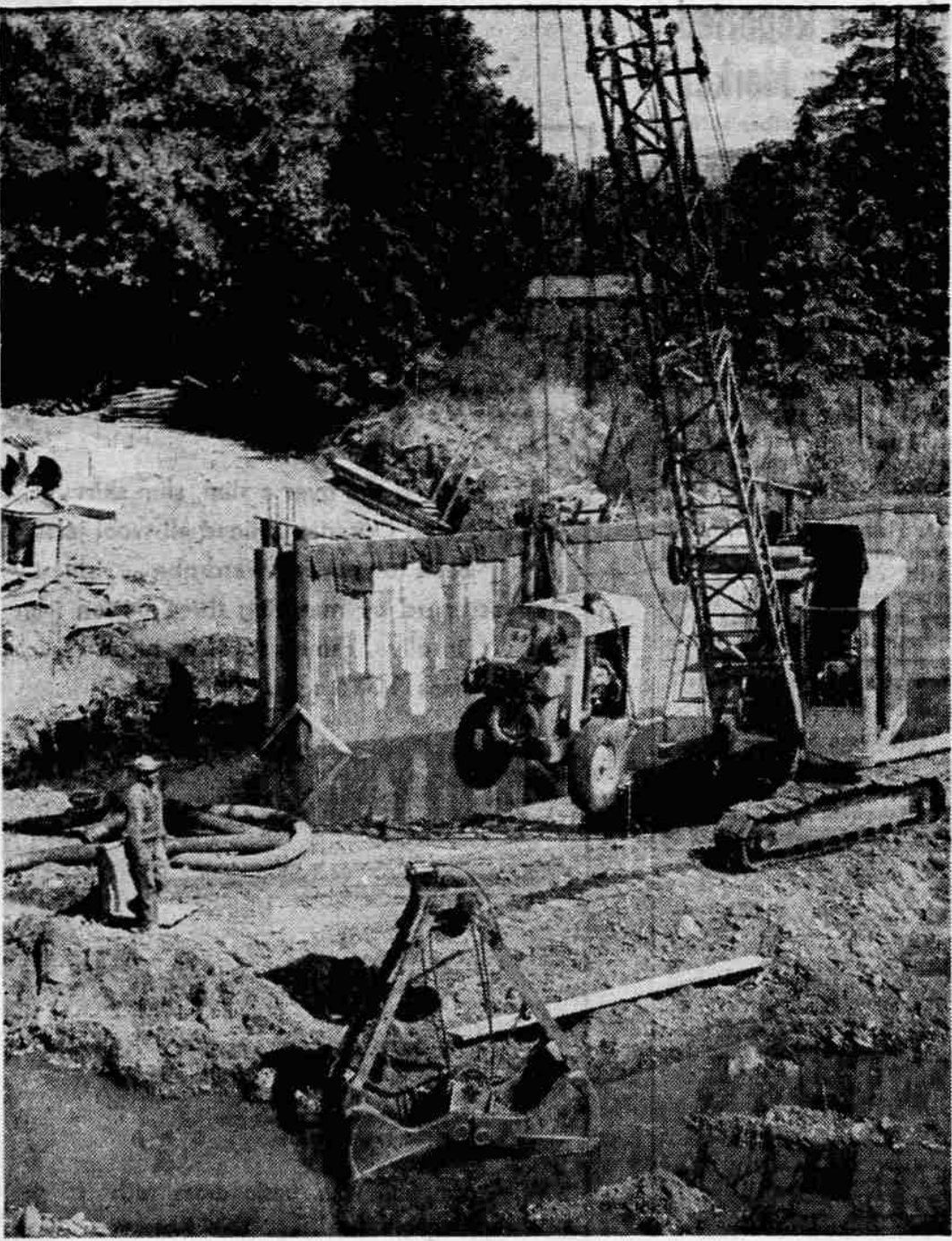

Strike's End Expected Soon

San Francisco — (UP) — A Teamsters union spokesman said Saturday there was hope the strike against San Francisco and San Mateo county truckers could be settled soon.

Phil Dindia, chairman of the local 84 strike committee, told reporters, "It's entirely possible some solution for the situation could develop" in meetings between the union, the employers, and a federal conciliator. The meetings began Friday and continued Saturday.

Meanwhile leaders of seven other Teamsters locals decided at a conference Saturday to continue to respect local 85's picket lines, which have been extended to East Bay and Santa Clara county branches of San Francisco firms. There had been some feeling that members of the other locals were not in sympathy with local 85 members who rejected a wage offer accepted by the other locals.

Cuba and Arab State Sign Trade Treaty

Havana — (UP) — Cuba and the United Arab Republic Friday signed a new trade treaty with promises to increase economic and political cooperation between the two countries.

Foreign Secretary Raul Roa signed for Cuba and described the accord as a "clear expression of Cuba's new international policy which proposes the strengthening of political and commercial ties with the world's underdeveloped countries that have a position similar to Cuba's."

Charles T. Duncan Heads Instructors

Eugene — (UP) — Next president of the Association for Education in Journalism will be Charles T. Duncan, dean of the school of journalism at the University of Oregon.

Duncan was elected vice president Friday at the association's national convention being held here this week. He will succeed Mitchell V. Charney of the University of Minnesota later this year.

Following his leave, Clower will proceed to Japan for two years' duty.

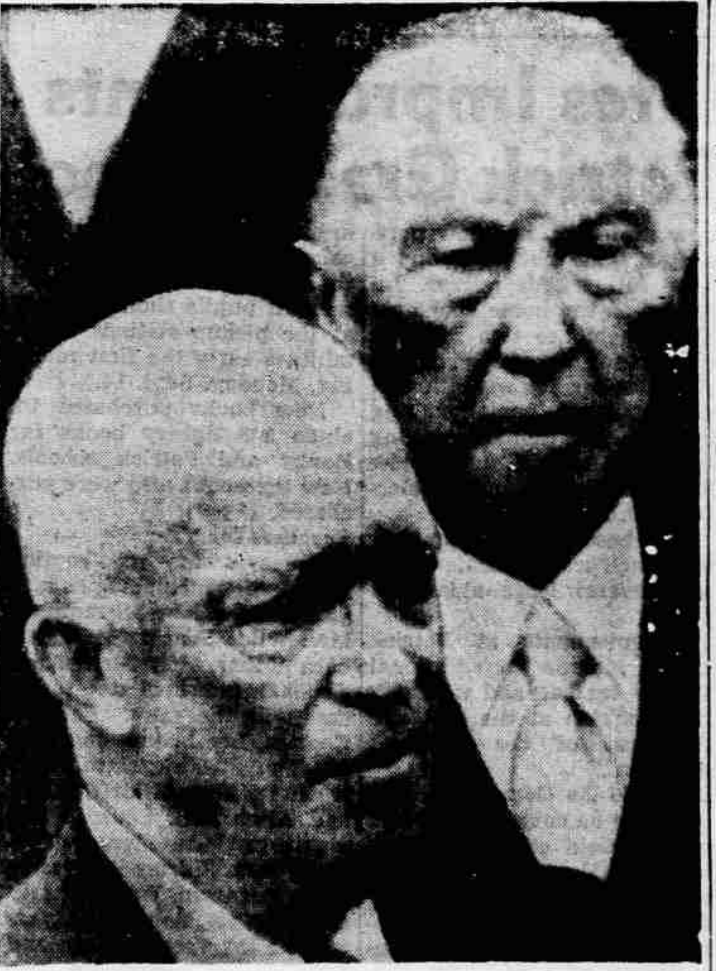

Norblad Seeks Drop Of Steel Wage Demands

Washington — (UP) — Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) requested striking United Steelworkers to withdraw their demands for higher wages if the steel companies would, in turn, lower their prices.
The Oregon lawmaker said if the strike should result in substantial wage-price increases in the steel industry, it could touch off a series of similar increases in other basic and related industries, producing what he termed "further inflationary forces."
Norblad made the request in a letter to Steelworkers President David J. McDonald.
