Swedish Tests Described by AFS Student

The severity of academic tests in Sweden was described by Miss Margaret Larsdotter-Aulin, former American Field Service student from Falun, in letters to the Frank Bash family, 1325 Bundy street. Miss Larsdotter-Aulin, who attended Medford High school for the year 1957-58, was recently admitted to a school in Sweden for the training of grade school teachers.

In her letter to the Bashes, the family with whom she lived while attending school here, Miss Larsdotter-Aulin describes the tests she had to take prior to being accepted by the school.

About 700 students applied for entrance, she said, of which about 200 were chosen to take the tests. Of these 200 only 48 were selected to attend. She mentioned that in Sweden it is very difficult to become a grade school teacher as so many students desire that profession.

There are four different kinds of tests. For one of them the student has to complete a questionnaire about herself, then they have a "describing test." In the "telling test" each applicant is given three different subjects. One is chosen and the person must stand in front of teachers and students and talk about that subject for at least 10 minutes. In addition each person talks with a psychologist who also asks a lot of questions.

In making the final choice the school takes into consideration grades, age, and if the person has had any work outside of school.

Miss Larsdotter-Aulin will attend the school for two years to qualify as a grade school teacher.

She was graduated from a girls school this year and the following day traveled to Germany on a class trip.

This summer she has worked at a children's camp near Falun.

The Swedish girl was sponsored by the local Rotary club for her year in Medford. She was crowned Junior From queen the spring of 1958.

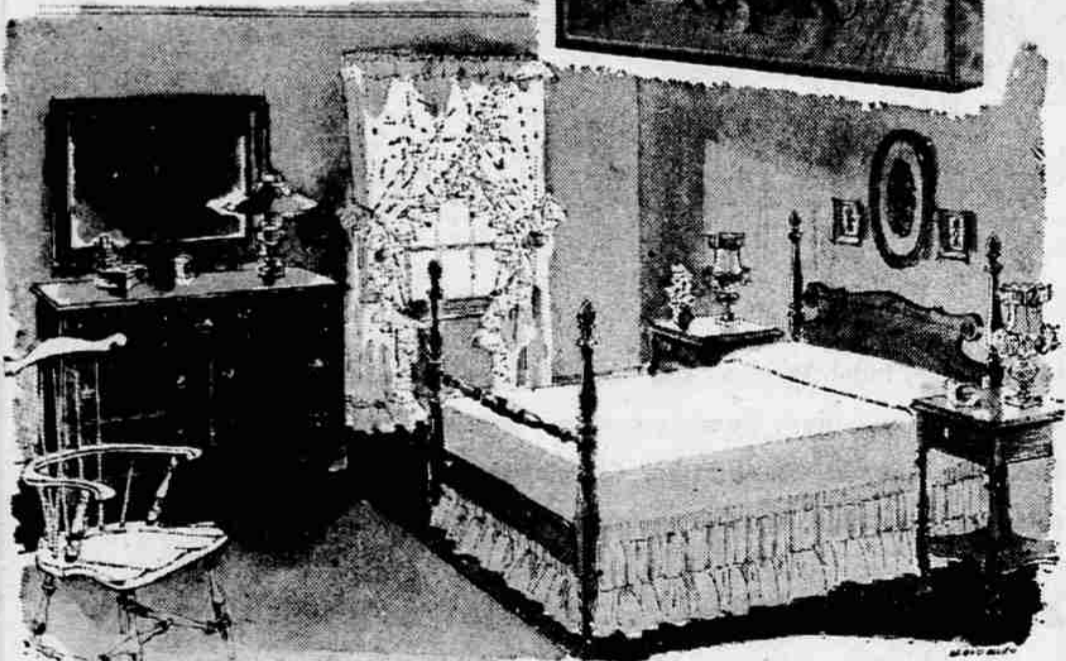

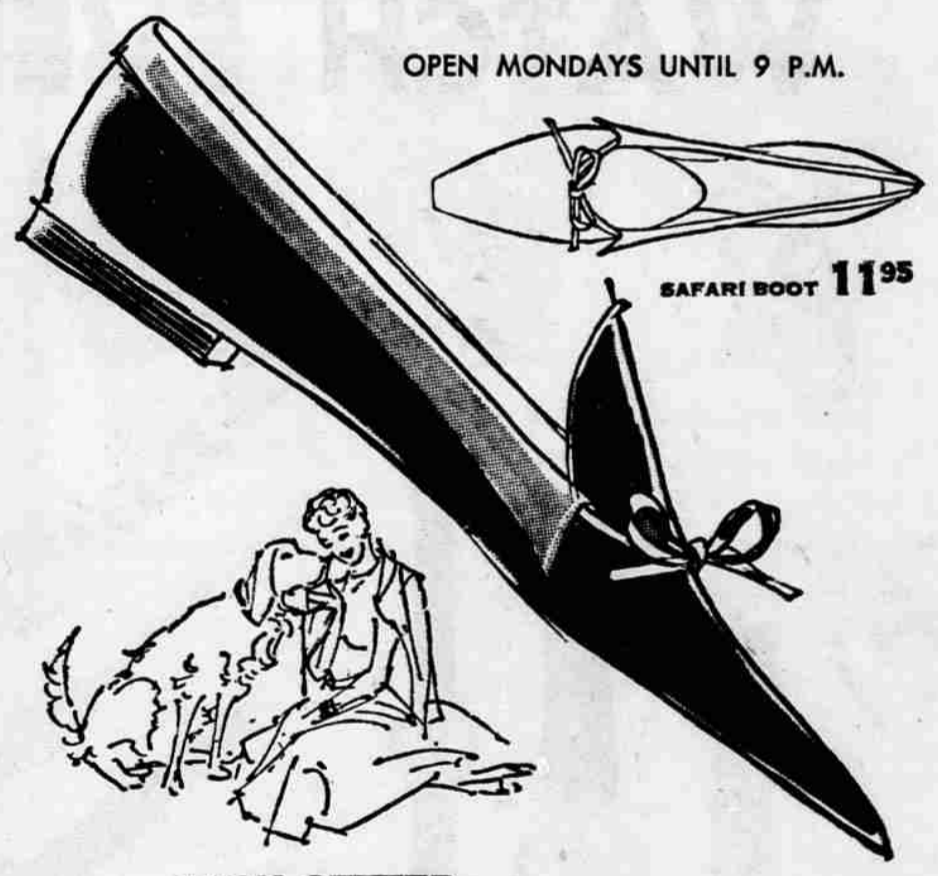
Navy Mothers Club
