



Cougar Mauls Deer; Search Attempt Fails

A forked horn deer was mauled by a "fair sized" cougar about three miles west of Gold Hill along Old Stage rd. north of the Rogue river Friday morning.

The young buck was put to death later, according to state police. But the cougar escaped when tracking efforts failed because of dry weather.

The incident occurred about 9 a.m. Friday. Two employees of the county, riding in a dump truck, saw the cougar attacking the deer and reported it to Edsel White, Gold

Hill, who called state police. Police contacted Harry Dunlap, 1216 Saling st., Medford, who tracked the cat off and on during the day with four dogs. Dunlap said, however, that because of the recent dry weather the animal's scent was not enough for good tracking.

He said the dogs tracked the scent about a quarter of a mile up a hill north of the site where the incident occurred. The scent then became so slight the dogs could not follow it.

Both White and Dunlap said the cougar apparently is a "fair sized one." Dunlap said he found tracks near a water hole north of the road in the hills, and the tracks were "good sized." He said he also found the remains of another deer which apparently had been attacked by the cat within the past week.

Dunlap said he searched the area all day Friday, but was unable to find the cougar. He went back to the site along the road that night, thinking the cat would return to the

scene to find "his kill" but he said he saw nothing. **May Go Back** Dunlap, who said he has killed about 13 cougars since he purchased his dogs, said he may go back into the area soon to see if the animal can be tracked.

Several reports of a cougar in the Gold Hill area have been made in the past few years.

Last spring, Terry Turner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Meister, Gold Hill, reported seeing a cougar on a

Rogue River Rooster Rules Crow-Off Roost

Rogue River - A Rogue River rooster crowed 96 times in 30 minutes Saturday to break a tie with a Medford bird during a "crow-off" contest here.

The first-place gold trophy was awarded to Sandy, owned by Paul Elbert Sanders of Rogue River for the second highest number of crows ever recorded in the annual rooster crow.

The Saturday event was necessary to decide the winner of the gold trophy. A tie occurred between Sandy and Twinkle - Twerp, a rooster owned by Howard and Arlen Simon of 2105 Roberts rd., Medford, during the regular June contest. Twinkle-Twerp came in a close second Saturday with 82 crows in the half-hour period.

A crowd of nearly 300 persons attended the contest. County Judge Earl Miller counted Sandy's crows. Twinkle-Twerp was coached by Leo Deja, Two Rivers, Wisc., Rogue River's "tourist for the day," who also counted the bird's crows.

For a while Saturday it was thought an overtime period would have to be called, as the two roosters stalled at 67 crows each. It was reported that not only did the roosters continue to crow after the contest, but during the barbecue which followed.

This is the first time that a "crow-off" has been necessary, it was reported. The two birds tied with 67 cock-a-doodle-dos last June with the owners splitting \$325 prize money.

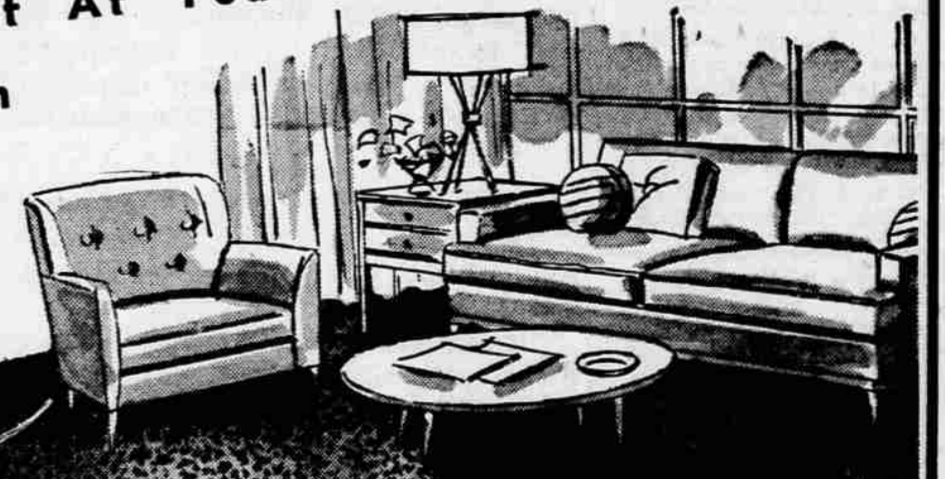
