**Advisory Council
Of Forest Service
Tours Burn Area**

The Rogue River National Forest Advisory Council held a field meeting in the Ashland Watershed area Wednesday, according to Forest Supervisor Carroll E. Brown.
The council was shown the area burned by the fire of Aug. 8, the Ashland city water reservoir and power house, timber access road constructed into the east fork of Ashland creek connecting with the timber operator constructed Tolman creek forest road.
Logging operations on national forest land and Tolman creek drainage adjacent to the Ashland Watershed and was given a birds-eye view of the watershed from the top of Mt. Ashland. The tour of the watershed was led by District Ranger Harold A. Thomas of the Ashland district of the Rogue River National Forest.

The advisory council is a group of citizens selected by the forest service to advise the forest supervisor on broad questions of policy, programs and procedures affecting the administration of forest service activities in the Rogue River National Forest.

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Medford, Oregon, up to and not later than 10:30 a.m., October 2, 1959, for all merchantable timber marked or designated for cutting on an area embracing 200 acres, more or less, within Sections 12 and 13, T. 30 S., R. 3 E., Sections 7 and 18, T. 30 S., R. 4 E., W.M., surveyed in the Rogue River National Forest, Jackson County, Oregon. The estimated volumes are: 100 M board feet of all species of pine, 200 M board feet of western hemlock and other species. The minimum acceptable bid per M board feet is as follows: all species of pine \$20.60, western hemlock and other species \$7.00. This includes the following stumpage rates, per M board feet: all species of pine \$14.00, western hemlock and other species \$4.00, plus \$6.60 on pine and \$3.00 on hemlock and other species for sale area betterment and \$0.00 for slash disposal for all species. In addition there is within the sale area an unestimated volume of older dead (unsound, sapwood) all species logs and peeler blocks which will be paid for at \$2.00 per M board feet. This includes per M board feet \$2.00 for stumpage plus \$0.00 for sale area betterment and \$0.00 for slash disposal. Sealed bids will be publicly opened and posted at the office of the Forest Supervisor, at 10:30 a.m., October 2, 1959. A money order, bank draft, cashier's or certified check in the sum of \$500.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Forest Service bid forms for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the District Ranger, Union Creek, Oregon, or the Forest Supervisor, Medford, Oregon, before bids are submitted.

The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Rose K.—I think I should contribute to my board.
Irma Z.—You shouldn't have to contribute until you get out of high school.

Rose K.—My friend and I are having a controversy about money. We are both 16 and have summer jobs at which we are making pretty good money.

I feel that as soon as you are old enough to make money you should start to contribute to your board at home. I have given my mother \$10 a week throughout the summer. Mother said I didn't have to, but she accepted it when I said I wanted to give it.

Irma Z.—I don't think you should have to pay for your board until you at least get out of high school. Your parents are supposed to support you until then.

It might be different if your father is out of work. My parents don't need the money—and neither do Rose's. My mother said she wouldn't take the money from me, even if I tried to give it. I am saving her money by buying all

my own clothes for the summer and for fall as well.
My mother agrees with me that it is selfish of Rose's mother to take her money when she can get by without it.

The Council: We think it is good for teenagers to make a contribution to their home and it is not at all selfish for parents to accept this money. It helps the youngster build up his sense of independence and makes him feel more vitally a part of his family.

It is true in our society today that 16 is young to start making contributions when they are not particularly needed. It is also true that the young wage-earner can save his parents the expense of clothing and various extras. But the same youngster would have a much better feeling about himself and his family if a portion of that money went into the family budget.

Many parents make the mistake of being somewhat huffy about accepting money from working children. They may repeat trite phrases about their desire to avoid ever taking any money from a child. They may also think in simple, practical terms that the child has plenty of independ-

ent needs to look after. Taking care of his own needs can give a child satisfaction, but not quite as much satisfaction as making a real contribution to the household.

In many houses today a working youngster's contribution might seem hopelessly and pathetically small. He may have the feeling that this money would just go down the drain. In such a case, he might be encouraged to save up enough to buy something that will be seen and used throughout the year by all members of the family. This will get around the business of actually taking the cash from the child's hand—and 'tis can be distasteful to some parents.

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**Report Scheduled
On TV Proposal**

Montague—James B. McAdams, president of the Nor-Sis TV Corporation has announced that a program report by committeemen will be made at the board of directors meeting Wednesday, Sept. 2, at 8 p.m., in the club room of the Montague auditorium.

Papers for permission to construct have been in the hands of the Federal Communications Commission since Aug. 6, but according to reports, action will not be taken until Sept. 2 when the FCC will reconvene.

James M. Dow, technical engineer for the corporation had written to both Sen. Claire Engle and Congressman Harold T. Johnson, requesting them to intervene with the FCC in behalf of Nor-Sis TV corporation.

In regard to the current financial status of the corporation, it is revealed by the combined reports of Harry Meek, Yreka, treasurer of the organization, and Doug Silva of Weed, assistant treasurer, that the total amount of money collected to date is \$24,534.30, and total amount of pledges to be collected stands at \$3,948.20, making a total of \$28,482.50.

The need for more funds from memberships and pledges still stands, although the corporation has made the down payment on the translator systems, additional funds are required for construction of roads, purchase of power line poles and cable to carry the necessary power to Antelope Peak, point of construction, as well as the housing unit for the translator equipment.
