

SF Has Eye On Big Tilt Against LA

 Los Angeles—UPI—The San Francisco Giants, their league lead cut to two games, tried to forget Sunday's debacle against the Los Angeles Dodgers and instead concentrated on the third big game of the series tonight.

Los Angeles capitalized two Giant errors in the bottom of the ninth to push over two unearned runs and gain a 7-6 victory. The Giants won the Friday series opener, 5-0.

Although rookie first baseman Willie McCovey committed two of the three San Francisco bobbles in the Sunday game, manager Bill Rigney refused to blame him for the loss.

Might Rest McCovey
 At the same time, he indicated McCovey might be given a rest tonight with Orlando Cepeda taking over his regular spot at first.

Rigney said that with southpaw Sandy Koufax, 7-4, pitching for the Dodgers, he wanted as many righthanded batters as possible and that might be his reason for benching McCovey, not his fielding bobbles.

The Giants announced they would pitch Jack Sanford, 12-10, and were hopeful the righthander could go the route because they used five pitchers Sunday in a futile attempt to pull the game from the fire.

Tonight's game is for the benefit of the Kiwanis Crippled Children's fund and crowd of better than 60,000 was expected.

Chisox Hold 5 1/2 Game Edge; Dodgers Hack Giants Lead

 Those go-go White Sox can go ahead and print their World Series tickets but they'd better leave a blank space for the name of their opponents because it could easily be the supposedly long-gone Pirates.

The inspired White Sox really did a job on the Indians in all but wrapping up their first American League pennant since 1919.

Al Lopez' speedy crew took a doubleheader from the Tribe Sunday, 6-3 and 9-4, before 66,586 at Cleveland to sweep a four-game "show down series" and lengthen their lead to 5 1/2 games—longest of the season.

The White Sox never had it so good. If they win only 13 of their remaining 25 games, the second-place Indians still would have to win 19 of their last 24 to overtake them.

The Pirates aren't in such good shape, of course, but they aren't exactly complaining. They made it nine out of their last 10 by sweeping a twinbill from the Phillies, 2-1 and 7-6 in 10 innings, with little Roy Face fashioning his 17th victory of the season without a defeat in the nightcap.

Pirates Climb
 By taking two from the Phils, the Pirates climbed to within four games of the first place Giants who dropped a 7-6 decision to the Dodgers. The Cubs beat the Braves, 6-2, and the Reds defeated the Cardinals, 6-4.

Among the "also rans" in the AL, the Tigers took their third place with a 4-0 victory

over the Athletics; the Senators topped the Yankees, 3-1, and the Red Sox blanked the Orioles, 3-0.

The White Sox won their opener from the Indians with a five-run sixth-inning rally that Early Wynn launched with a home run. Wynn, who needed Gerry Staley's help in the eighth, won his 17th of the season and 266th of his career, tying him with Bob Feller and Eppa Rixey for total major league victories.

Barry Latman won his eighth game in the nightcap although he gave way to Turk Lowen in the sixth. Before departing, Latman yielded Colorado's 50th homer with two on and Woodie Held's 26th homer with the bases empty.

Face Gets Lucky
 Face, who now has won 22 straight over two seasons, got away a bit lucky in Pittsburgh's second game win over Philadelphia. Ed Bouchee homered off Face in the top of the 10th to put the Phils ahead, 6-5, but Dick Stuart doubled home two runs off Dick Farrell in the bottom of the 10th. Stuart also hit a pinch homer, his 21st, in the ninth.

Bob Skinner's fourth hit of the game, a two-out single in the ninth, won the opener for the Pirates. Lefty Harvey Haddix gave up only six hits, including Gene Freese's 19th homer, in notching his 11th triumph.

An error by third baseman Jackie Brandt paved the way for two unearned runs in the ninth that gave the Dodgers their victory over the Giants. Wally Moon followed with a triple to tie the score at 6-6 and after Sam Jones relieved loser Mike McCormick, the Dodgers filled the bases on two walks. Willie McCovey then led in the winning run when he fumbled Norm Larker's grounder.

The Cubs won their game from the Braves with a five-run rally in the eighth at the expense of loser Carlton Willey. Key blows in the rally were Jim Marshall's double which tied the score at 2-2 and Irv Noren's two-run single.

Kasko Aids Reds
 Ex-Cardinal Eddie Kasko drove in three runs to help Cincinnati snap a four-game St. Louis winning streak. Jay Hook hurled a seven-hitter for his fourth win.

Over in the American league, Don Mossi of Detroit posted his 12th victory when he held Kansas City to three hits and also belted his first major league homer.

Russ Kemmerer and Tex Clevenger combined in a five-hit, pitching effort that led Washington to victory over

New York. Kemmerer, who won his eighth game, had a three-hit shutout until he had to leave with a pulled back muscle in the sixth.

Frank Sullivan pitched a four-hitter and struck out nine in Boston's win over Baltimore.

Edstrom, Dellinger Score Triumphs In Pan American

 Chicago—UPI—The third Pan American Games, which the United States considered a warmup for the 1960 Olympics in Rome, was turning out to be such a romp today that even the U.S. coaches admitted they were not proving much of a testing ground.

The sister Western Hemisphere nations were not furnishing much opposition.

None of the coaches would be quoted. But they all pointed to the results of the first three days of competition.

It showed that of the first 21 championships decided, the U.S. won 18 and was expected to add a minimum of six of the nine on today's schedule. The other three

were wide open. But the U.S. entries were no worse than co-favorites.

Sunday, led by Dave Edstrom, a 21-year-old senior at the University of Oregon who won the decathlon championship, the U.S. swept all eight gold medals which were decided. In winning four of them, the United States set Pan American records.

Sets Record
 Edstrom, in winning the grueling two-day decathlon, set one of them, scoring 7,254 points as he won or tied for first in eight of the ten events which comprise the title.

The others were made by Bill Dellinger, Oxnard, Calif., who won the 5,000-meter run

over favored Osvaldo Suarez of Argentina in 14:28.4; Thomas Murphy, Brooklyn, N.Y., whose winning time in the 800-meter run was 1:49.4, and Mrs. Earlene Brown, Los Angeles, Calif., breaking the mark on each of her six throws, established a discus record of 161 feet, 9 1/2 inches.

The U. S.'s other gold medal winners were Lucinda Williams, Nashville, Tenn., in the women's 100 meters, Harold Goldsmith, New York, in the men's foil fencing, Nelson Lincoln, Columbus, Ga., in the free pistol shooting team of Lincoln, Lloyd Burchett and Roy L. Sutherland, all of Columbus, Ga.
