Chinese Student Who Hid in Church Attic in Seclusion

Ann Arbor, Mich. - (UPI) - A Chinese student who hid for nearly four years in a church attic because he was flunking college courses went back into hiding today to think things over.

This time, however, 28-year-old Cheng Guan Lim of Singapore was in seclusion at a private home near the University of Michigan campus. Lim had wrapped himself in a sort of self-imposed purgatory from Oct. 9, 1955, until he was captured by police investigating one of the many prowler reports at the First Methodist Church Sunday morning.

Told of Father's Death
Lim cried Monday when he was informed that his 72-year-old father, Tien Un Lim, who had demanded he enter engineering school, died of cancer last March. He smiled, however, when informed his mother was well and living in Hong Kong. He was to have a reunion with his professor-brother today.

Philip Loh, 34-year-old U of M research associate professor whose brother is married to Lim's sister, said:
"It must be hard for you people to understand how someone could survive that long... the pressure on him was terrific from his family."

Felt Shamed, Disgraced
"His father was a stern man, a teacher. His brother, Chung Chuan Lim, is a professor at Waterloo, Ont., College and both his sisters graduated from colleges."

"He felt he was a failure. He was shamed, disgraced." Revelation of his fantastic tale won Lim permission from immigration officials to stay in Ann Arbor. It also focused attention on his university problems and won him a chance to reenter U of M.

Cambodia King, Queen Escape in Assassination Try

Tokyo - (UPI) - The King and Queen of Cambodia escaped injury but a prince and a palace servant were killed and two others wounded in an assassination attempt, a Chinese Communist news agency reported tonight.

The New China News Agency, quoting an official communique issued by the royal cabinet in Phnom Penh today, said:
"The King and Queen of Cambodia Monday escaped an attempt upon their lives when a bomb exploded in the royal palace, killing Prince Norodom Vakiarvan and a servant and wounding two other persons."

The prince was protocol chief of the palace.

According to the communique the prince received an "Asiatic foreigner" with a large parcel containing a so-called "gift from a friend at Hong Kong" addressed to the Queen.

When the package was opened, King Norodom Suramarit and the Queen left the room to receive Foreign Minister Son Sann and the Cambodian delegation to the United Nations, the communique said.

While the royal couple was out of the room the parcel exploded, killing the prince, it said.

The communique said an inquiry was begun immediately to find the persons behind the crime which was "doubtless plotted from abroad."

Cambodia, a constitutional monarchy in southeast Asia, is one of the three former associated states of French Indo-China. The others are Laos and Vietnam.

Stocks Turn Lower With Selling Spurt

New York - (UPI) - The stock market turned sharply lower today in the wake of a further tightening of the money market.

Selling hit the market in the morning shortly after leading commercial banks announced they were hiking their prime interest rates to a 30-year high of 5 percent.

Individual losses in the main list ran to 4 points in some of the leaders.

Youngstown led the steels lower with a loss running past 5 points at the low. Alcoa and Reynolds were weak in the aluminum and Litton, IBM, Texas Instruments and Zenith dropped sharply in the electronics.

Motor stocks showed losses running past a point. Oils were lower on balance. Rails sported losses running past a point in some of the pivots.

The drugs were off as much as 2 points or more.

Public Works Group Approves Gas Tax Boost
Washington - (UPI) - The House Public Works committee today approved an immediate one penny hike in the federal gasoline tax to keep the super-highway construction program going.

The vote was 25-6.

Chairman Charles A. Buckley (D-N.Y.) told reporters afterward he would ask the rules committee to clear the plan Wednesday so it can go to the House floor Thursday.

22 Months Duration
Speaker Sam Rayburn told reporters the bill would be called up Thursday if it gets rules committee clearance.

The proposal, drafted by the tax-writing House Ways and Means committee, provides for boosting the federal levy on gasoline from three to four cents a gallon for 22 months.

For a three-year period after the higher tax expires, some of the receipts from automotive excise taxes would be shifted from general revenue into the highway trust fund.

President Eisenhower, who called for a 1 1/2 cent tax hike, has described the penny plan as a step in the right direction.

It was estimated that the tax hike would bring in an extra \$1 billion.

Amendment Adopted
Buckley indicated he did not expect formidable opposition on the floor.

"I would think it would run into more trouble in the Senate," he said.

Before approving the plan, the committee adopted an amendment declaring it the "intent and policy" of Congress that the states should be reimbursed for highways, bridges or tunnels they have built as part of the interstate highway system. Buckley said there now are about \$4 billion worth of such projects for which the states eventually should be repaid.

Group Resumes Negotiations on Labor Reform Bill
Washington - (UPI) - House-Senate conferees resumed last ditch negotiations on the labor reform bill today with its fate hanging by a thread.

A slight shift in position by either side could break the stalemate and bring final agreement on a compromise.

But there also was a chance the conference would blow up again and throw the issue to the Senate floor.

Members of the 14-man committee were cautiously optimistic as the bargaining got underway. Leaders of both the Senate and House agreed a dispute over picketing at construction projects was the biggest stumbling block.

No Predictions
None of the 14 negotiators would predict that they would agree on a compromise between the Senate anti-racketeering bill and the tougher House version. But they were much more hopeful than they were last Friday when their talks appeared to reach a dead end.

Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) said the disagreements were no thicker than a razor blade. The conference has approved most sections of a compromise, generally leaning toward the House features. The negotiations are snagged by the refusal of the Senate Democrats to accept without modification House provisions on secondary boycotts, organizational picketing and "no man's land" labor disputes.

Fire Department Called Out Six Times Yesterday

The Medford fire department saw a lot of smoke but not much fire yesterday.

They were called out six times, and at the end of the day the total damage appeared to be ten square feet of grass, one 6-inch hole in a car seat and two burned battery cables.

Firemen were called to two small grass fires, two car fires, one flu fire and one tar fire. Damage at all of them was minor or non-existent.

At 9:30 a.m. one pumper was sent to a grass fire at 741 South Fir st. The department said it was started by transients and had been extinguished by employees of the Crystal Springs Packing company when the truck arrived.

At 11:40 a.m. damage to a car parked at Main and Front sts. was confined to a 6-inch diameter in its front seat.

At 12:30 p.m. one pumper was sent to 1603 North River-avenue, to a tar pot fire. Firemen shut off the burner and cooled down the pot with water fog. They reported no apparent damage.

At 1:05 p.m. one truck was dispatched to 1018 West 10th st., where a fire was extinguished after burning about 10 square feet of grass.

At 6:33 p.m. a truck was sent to 402 West 9th st., where a short circuit in a car owned by Wallin Crewell burned the battery cables.

And at 7:25 p.m. a pumper was sent to 1120 South Oakdale ave. to a flu fire. Firemen let the flu burn out and clear the chimney. They stood by to see that it didn't get out of control.
