Washington - (UPI) - House-Senate conferees finally broke their deadlock today and approved a compromise labor reform bill.

Paris Reception Of Ike Richest In Europe Tour

Paris - (UPI) - President Eisenhower arrived in Paris on the last leg of his international crusade for peace today and received a heart-warming greeting from a million wildly cheering, flag-waving Frenchmen. The President thanked them in French with the words: "I love you all."

Eisenhower, whose allied armies liberated Paris 15 years ago, received here the richest and most colorful welcome of his entire European tour.

Along the whole length of the broad Champs Elysees Parisians crowded five and ten deep. They sent up a deep-throated roar of "Ike" as he rode past them to and from the Arch of Triumph.

The welcome could be compared with that which President Charles de Gaulle received when he entered the city as its liberator in August, 1944.

The climax came this evening at the historical Hotel de Ville, the Paris city hall.

Standing on a raised dais at De Gaulle's side and with his voice throbbing with emotion, Eisenhower told a crowd of 40,000 to 50,000 Parisians massed in the square in front of him that he would use his few words of French to thank them.

"Je vous aime tous" (I love you all), he cried out.

The shout of delight that welled up from the crowd could be heard a mile away, and the President, waving both arms, smiled back his happiness.

Neuberger Urges Appointing Hollis

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) today urged that Dean Orlando John Hollis of the University of Oregon law school be named to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

A vacancy was created with the death last week of Judge James Alger Fee, a native of Pendleton, Ore.

Neuberger wrote Attorney General William Rogers asking that Hollis be given consideration. He said Hollis was a legal scholar, a man of unimpeachable personal integrity and a citizen of high standing. He added there was ample precedent for naming an outstanding teacher of law to the high federal court.

Dr. Hollis succeeded now Sen. Wayne Morse as dean of the law school at Oregon.

Medford Teacher Named to Institute

Lester Hutchinson, teacher at McLaughlin Junior High school, is one of 50 teachers selected from 478 qualified applicants to participate in an academic year institute for high school teachers of science and mathematics at Arizona State university, Tempe.

Hutchinson will join other teachers from 50 cities in 19 states in the program which runs from Sept. 8, 1959, through May 27, 1960. He will earn a minimum of 24 units of graduate credit in science and mathematics and will be paid for studying.

Purpose of the institute, which is financed by a \$300,000 grant from the National Science Foundation, is to give the teachers an opportunity to augment their knowledge in as many ways as possible so that they may not only become more learned in their subject matter areas, but also be able to stimulate their students, according to Dr. Alan T. Wager, chairman of the ASU physics department and director of the institute.

Each of the participants will receive a basic stipend of \$3,000, plus \$300 for each dependent, up to four. Allowances are given for travel and books, and all tuition fees are remitted.

terms on the last details of the controversial legislation on the 12th day of intensive and occasionally stormy negotiations.

Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) issued a statement shortly before the conferees agreed which described the approved compromise as "a great improvement over both the House and Senate versions."

Earlier today, hopes for accord were suddenly shattered by news that an informal conference agreement on the bill had "fallen apart."

The 14 House-Senate conferees seemed to have final agreement almost in their grasp when they began the 12th day of their negotiations. But the House parliamentarian ruled that a provision demanded by Senate Democrats was not germane to the bill. That threw the whole matter up in the air again.

Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) chairman of the committee, said the situation was not as bright as it had been Tuesday night when the conferees reached tentative accord on all but one point in the bill.

Republicans told newsmen there was a possibility the disputed point - dealing with so-called "common site" picketing at construction sites - would be dropped until next year.

Concessions in Doubt But Kennedy said his group definitely wanted the provision, strongly favored by building trade unions, in the compromise bill. He said it would serve to offset some of the concessions that Senate Democrats had made which were unfavorable to labor.

In view of the House parliamentarian's opinion that the provision would be subject to a point of order on the House floor, Kennedy said, it apparently would be useless to include it in the bill.

Therefore, he said, the Senate Democrats wanted to withdraw some of the concessions they had made in an effort to get the House conferees to go along with the construction picketing provision.

Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) blamed "push, push, pushing" from labor representatives - "the constant pressure from the boys out in the hall" - for the new impasse.

Conference in Corridor During the conference session, the wide corridor outside the main entrance to the Senate chamber was alive with labor officials and others interested in the fate of the bill. On at least one occasion, Kennedy left the meeting room and conferred with a group which included Richard Gray, head of the AFL-CIO Building Trades department, Andrew Biemiller, legislative representative of the AFL-CIO, Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.) and others.

Before everything came unstuck, Goldwater and Rep. Robert Griffin (R-Mich.) said the committee was ready to write into specific language its verbal agreements on "everything except 'common site' picketing."

Core-Drilling For Dam Starts

Exploratory core-drilling for a proposed small watershed project for the Ashland area will start tomorrow, according to Clem Ault, conservationist for the Rogue soil conservation district.

Willcox drilling company of McMinville has moved in two drilling rigs to start work on the Willamette dam site on Ashland creek, Ault said.

The proposed dam would provide additional municipal water for Ashland and more irrigation water plus providing some flood control, Ault explained. Robert High, SCS geologist from Portland, is working with the city of Ashland on the project and is in charge of drilling operations.

Drillings will determine if the proposed site is practical, size of the dam and reservoir and other facts, Ault said.

Super Bomarc In Fourth Testing

Cape Canaveral, Fla. - (UPI) - A swept-wing Super Bomarc missile arched across the sky today in the fourth test of the speedy anti-aircraft weapon.

The Air Force said the Super Bomarc, which will have a maximum range of more than 400 miles when it becomes operational, was not aimed at any target.

Local Benefit Seen In Pipeline Proposal

Salem - (UPI) - Medford and Ashland are among the potential southern and central Oregon markets that could receive natural gas from a pipeline proposed by Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation, Salt Lake City.

Officials of the corporation have informed Public Utilities Commissioner Jonel C. Hill that the gas would come from fields in Alberta, Canada, over a line proposed by Pacific Gas Transmission company through Idaho and Washington and across Oregon into California.

The transmission company told the commissioner Oregon needs would be fulfilled along the pipeline.

"Our company will furnish gas as necessary, should

PNPC not be able to," Hill was assured.

Pacific Northwest is the sole supplier of natural gas to Oregon at the present time. It has a contract with PGTC to sell the transported gas in Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

Bend, Klamath Falls Named. Vice Presidents R. W. Harris, Arthur E. Allyn and Fulton Copp of the company said they were making a study of many communities within a reasonable distance of the pipeline. Hill said these included such cities as Prineville, Redmond, Bend, Klamath Falls and the southern Oregon territory.

The main pipeline would run north and south on the east side of the Cascades and it is expected that gas for the Medford area would have to come over the mountain range via a branch from the main pipe.

The Pacific Gas company has an application before the federal power commission to build the \$129,588,000 natural gas pipeline from Kingsgate, B. C., to the California area. It proposes to deliver up to 414 million cubic feet of natural gas per day.

PNPC plans to import additional gas over the pipeline for resale in the states named.

Plane Wreckage Found in Alaska

Fairbanks, Alaska - (UPI) - A Wein Airlines plane with eight persons aboard, including six young women, crashed near McGrath, Alaska, Tuesday night. The wreckage, with no sign of life, was sighted today.

An Air Force helicopter flying over the area, 28 miles northwest of McGrath, reported the only thing visible at the crash scene was wreckage and fire.

Nehru Announces Easing of Crisis; Talks with Lama

New Delhi - (UPI) - Premier Jawaharlal Nehru told a tense capacity crowd in parliament today that India's defense crisis had been eased by the withdrawal of Lt. Gen. K. S. Thimayya's resignation as army chief of staff.

Nehru heaped praise on Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon, making no mention of the fact that he too had offered to resign in the crisis touched off by his alleged playing politics with the armed forces.

The premier also had nothing to say about the nation's other chiefs of staff, Vice Adm. R. D. Katari and Air Marshal S. Mukerjee, who handed in their resignations along with Thimayya's. It appeared likely, however, that they would follow the general's example and continue in their posts.

Nehru said there is no truth to reports that Menon had been allowing favoritism or political factors to influence army promotions.

"I myself have seen the files," he said. "There is no truth to the charge."

Nehru also conferred today with the Dalai Lama, who came here from his refuge in Mussoorie to urge Indian leaders to support his protest to the United Nations over Communist aggression in Tibet.

The premier has already expressed his opposition to a UN debate on Tibet, but the huge crowd which turned out to welcome the refugee godking appeared to indicate wide popular support for his plea.

As the Lama left his special air-conditioned railway car, the crowd surged forward shouting "Long live the Dalai Lama!" and "Down with Chinese imperialism!" and "Chinese, get out of Tibet!"

Damage to Hoses Brings Court Action

Roberts was arrested on a bench warrant issued by Municipal Court Judge Alan Holmes for failure to appear Monday to answer traffic citations issued in connection with the incident.

northern Laos bordering on Communist North Viet Nam. He said the Communist forces captured or occupied about 80 villages along the Namwa River across a 35-mile front. He said the attacking force was 13 miles from Samneua late Tuesday. Reports received Tuesday night said the 3,500-strong Red force was still advancing.

Not Rebels "They are not Pathet Lao rebels, they are Viet Minh and some black Thai tribesmen," Rathikone said.

The general said the attack - second launched from Communist Viet Nam in the past two months was kicked off last Sunday at dawn in co-ordinated attacks on six villages.

Laotian army troops withdrew into the jungle toward Samneua, apparently without putting up much resistance.

"There is little or no fighting right now, that I know of," Rathikone said.

'We Stop Now'

Asked if the government intended to keep pulling back, he replied with an emphatic: "No, we stop now."

He said royal troops would defend strategic Samneua against the Communist invaders.

The government is believed to have strong army forces in Samneua City which are capable of blunting the Communist offensive. Indications are that at least six battalions of the Royal Laotian Army have been concentrated there.

Military planes shuttled between Vientiane and Samneua today dropping supplies to the Laotian forces.

Indian Police Fire On Red-Led Mobs

Calcutta, Indian - (UPI) - Be-leaguered police units opened fire on Communist-led mobs in this teeming city at least four times Tuesday night, killing at least seven rioters and wounding more than 1,000.

The riots virtually paralyzed Calcutta, and it appeared likely that the army might take over unless order could be quickly restored.

The mobs had driven buses and trolleys off the streets, and thousands of travelers were stranded at the airport and the railway stations because there was no way for them to reach their destinations in the city.

A general strike scheduled Thursday by the Communists and their leftwing allies in a campaign against alleged food shortages appeared likely to make the chaotic conditions worse.

Scholarship Group Becomes Activated

The state scholarship commission, authorized by the 1959 Legislature, has been activated and is now ready to process scholarship applications, it was reported here today.

The new law provides for a certain number of limited scholarships from each county.

Any local students planning to attend Oregon institutions of higher education this year may obtain details from members of the Jackson county legislative delegation. These include Dr. Edwin Durno, state senator, and Representatives Robert Duncan and Eve Nye.

Oregon's Solons Follow Parties

Washington - (UPI) - Oregon's House delegation split along party lines today as the lower chamber failed by one vote to override President Eisenhower's veto of the public works appropriation bill.

Rep. Walter Norblad, Republican, supported the veto. Democratic Reps. Edith Green, Charles Porter and Al Ullman voted to override.

Sen. Dimick Asserts Hearing at Roseburg Is 'Useless' So Far

Roseburg - (UPI) - A state senator charged today that the public hearing here into the Aug. 7 explosion and fire is not developing the facts.

State Sen. Dan Dimick (D-Roseburg) charged that the hearing so far has been "totally useless as far as promoting legislation to correct the evils found here."

Dimick's charges, made at the start of the second day of testimony, brought a reply from interstate commerce commission examiner Robert Murphy who said he was "trying to perform to the best of my ability."

Murphy added that the ICC could not go into civil or criminal aspects of the explosion.

State Aide Replies

The ICC is conducting the hearing in cooperation with the state public utility commission. Lloyd Hammel, assistant attorney general assigned to the PUC, said he resented Dimick's remarks.

"I personally resent a public official and a state senator

making representations for Douglas county when he, as a lawyer, has a vital interest in civil litigation," Hammel said.

Dimick represents Alvin Kuykendall, Roseburg, who has a damage suit filed in connection with the disaster in which Kuykendall's wife and daughter died.

State Rep. Al Flegel (D-Roseburg) and former mayor here said he believed the ICC should have called in state police arson experts to give their opinion on the explosion.

Warning Said Given

A safety inspector testified Tuesday he had discussed federal rules about explosive-laden trucks with an official of Pacific Power company before the truck blew up.

Below Normal Rainfall Noted

Precipitation during the agricultural year just past was 5.02 inches below normal but the year, Sept. 1, 1958, through Aug. 31, 1959, was by no means the driest on record for the Medford vicinity.

Medford station of the U. S. weather bureau reported 13.13 inches of precipitation during the year, compared to a normal of 18.15 inches.

There have been seven drier years, the bureau reported. Driest was September 1954 through August 1955 when 8.89 inches of precipitation were measured here. Wettest year was 1955-1956 when the total was 34.66.

February, May and August during the past year were the only months with precipitation above normal. Wettest was February with 2.78 inches, .76 more than normal. No measurable rain fell in July.

Integration Gains In South Reported

Eight Negroes attend white public school in Durham, N. C., today for the first time.

In other school integration developments, limited integration in Winston-Salem, N. C., was scheduled to begin today for the third consecutive year. As in the case of Tuesday's school openings at Arlington, Va., and High Point, N. C., where Negroes attended previously all-white and predominantly white schools for the first time, no incidents were anticipated.

Several other North Carolina cities opened schools Tuesday to integrated classes without incident.

Other Virginia cities scheduled to hold integrated classes open next Tuesday when most other southern public schools open.

Short of Majority By Only One Vote On Public Works

President's Veto Record Sustained

Washington - (UPI) - The House refused by one vote today to override President Eisenhower's veto of the \$1,206,748,549 public works bill to give him a stunning legislative victory.

The vote upset all advance predictions and kept intact Eisenhower's record of never having lost a veto showdown with Congress.

In a setback to Democratic leaders, the House voted 174-138 to override. This was one vote short of the required two-thirds margin.

The narrow margin was achieved when several Republicans who had voted to override the veto changed their votes after the roll call had been completed. They did so after some Democrats who had voted to sustain the veto switched and voted to override.

Bursts of Applause

As the switches in votes were announced, there were bursts of applause, first from the Democratic and then from Republican side.

The margin was so close that Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas ordered a recount before announcing the result.

Seventeen House members crossed party lines. Voting to override the veto were 263 Democrats and 11 Republicans. Those voting to sustain were 132 Republicans and 6 Democrats.

No New Projects

The President vetoed the bill last Friday because it carried \$51,510,600 for starting 67 flood control and navigation projects in 31 states. He told Congress in his last budget message last January he wanted no new projects started this year.

During Eisenhower's six and a half years as President, the House has never overridden one of his vetoes. The Senate has done so twice but both times he was upheld in the House.

Gas Tax Measure Cleared for Vote On House Floor

Washington - (UPI) - The House Rules committee today cleared for floor action a one-cent increase in gasoline tax to program from bogging down.

Since no amendments will be allowed on the floor, a House vote was expected sometime Thursday. The measure calls for increasing the tax for a period of 22 months to raise funds for the big super-highway program.

After expiration of the tax, funds would be drawn from highway use tax revenues to keep the program going. Big construction cutbacks will be necessary unless new money is provided.

Although many House members bitterly oppose hiking the federal gasoline levy, which stands at three cents a gallon, the outlook was for House passage.

It could be a different story in the Senate, however. There, amendments to reduce the tax increase or otherwise revise the financing package would be in order.

Raccoon Joins List Of Vagrants in City

A raccoon who traded his cage for a rocking chair Monday joined the list of vagrants Medford police have been rounding up recently.

Louis Roy Guyer, 319 Portland ave., called the desk sergeant Monday noon to report the raccoon was snoozing in a chair on his (Guyer's) front porch.

"Officers observed the animal in the chair," the investigating patrolman wrote in his report afterward, "and upon approaching same was greeted by a growl and the flashing of teeth. At this time writer backed off."

The patrolman reported checking the neighborhood and eventually finding the raccoon's owner, James Francis Hackett, 1020 East 11th st., who was quoted as saying someone had probably unlocked the animal's cage. Hackett added that he was the only person who could pick up the raccoon without being bitten, and then he did so, to the relief of the patrolman and Guyer.
