From London: President Eisenhower ends the second round of top secret allied cold war talks ASSURED of British Premier Macmillan's support for a "firm but flexible" hand in dealing with Russia's Nikita Khrushchev.

Mr. Macmillan's backing was coupled with a previous note of confidence from West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. This placed President Eisenhower in a strong position for his talks with when he goes to Paris Wednesday.

ALL sweetness and light? Watch Monsieur De Gaulle. He's one of the strongest characters of this century. He can't be figured out in advance.

But—It's a safe guess that if he thinks the U.S., Britain and Germany have it all rolled up in a nice ball of wax he isn't going to like it.

FROM Washington: The U.S. state department announced this morning that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev will be accompanied on his visit to the United States by his wife, two daughters, one son and a son-in-law.

HMMMMMMMM. In the olden days, when the savages came alone to a parley it was accepted as a sign that they were tough-minded and up to no good. But when they brought their women and children along it was felt that the situation was apt to be less ticklish.

We'll see what we'll see.

WHAT of India and the ruckus on the Indo-Chinese border? Watch it. A dispatch from New Delhi this morning says the situation is becoming so serious that even the Indian communists have issued a statement expressing concern over the "unfortunate" incidents on the border. The statement adds: "There can not be two opinions that the territorial integrity of our country (meaning India) must be safeguarded."

That's a sign that even India's communists think India will fight if invaded from China.

WHAT then? I think no one doubts that Communist China could trample India into the bloody mud. But . . . India is the leader of Asian FEELING. So far Asia — colonized by Europe and HATING COLONIZATION — has been suspicious of the West. It has felt that communism couldn't be much worse than the colonial system Asia has lived under.

A communist invasion would transfer the hatred of the Asian peoples to communism. That's what the Indian communists are thinking about when they express concern over the possibility of a communist invasion of Indian territory.

HONEST AMBITION Nashville, Tenn. —UPI—James R. Cavnar, serving a one to five year term in state prison here on bad check charges, went before the state parole board Wednesday to ask for his release. Cavnar said if freed he'd like to become a professional baseball umpire.

VANISHING AMERICANA Richmond, Va. —UPI—One-room, one-teacher schools have been vanishing at the rate of 100 a year in Virginia since 1925. Dr. Davis Y. Paschall, state superintendent of public instruction, reported that only 289 were left during the 1958-59 school term.

New York—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, announcing that he will call on FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover for help in fighting New York City's wave of juvenile violence.

"The recent tragic occurrence of juvenile violence in the streets, and the fear, anxiety and heartbreak they have evoked are tragic to all of us, and they call for action by all of us."

Washington—Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.) promising to go along with an invitation for Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev to address Congress if protocol calls for it.

"I observe protocol, whatever it is. I'm a conformist."

Chicago—National Safety Council President Howard Pyle, giving the council's prediction of the Labor day week end traffic toll:

"On the basis of past experiences and the anticipated increase in travel this year, the cold statistics indicate that as many as 450 immediate traffic deaths could occur over the Labor day holiday."

Birmingham, Ala.—Negro leader Samuel H. Moore, president of the Southern Negro Improvement association of Alabama, in a telegram asking President Eisenhower to poll southern Negroes on forced integration:

"I assure you that both races in the South are unalterably opposed to the integration of races in public schools. Racial hate and racial prejudice that was dead is now reconstructed."
