

### Firemen Fail to Save Savin' Sandy's Market

Toppenish, Wash. — (UPI) — Savin' Sandy's market, a one-stop shopping center, was destroyed by a fire of undetermined origin Tuesday night and preliminary estimates placed the damage at \$500,000.

Firemen from here, Harrah, Sunnyside, Wapato and Zillah were called out to battle the blaze, which tied up traffic on Highway 3-A for several hours.

### Boat Hits Jetty, Sinks; Men Saved

Winchester Bay — (UPI) — The commercial fishing boat Doreen sank after striking the submerged south jetty at the entrance to Umpqua harbor, Monday night, but both men aboard were rescued by the Coast Guard.

The 37-foot commercial troller was en route from Fort Bragg, Calif., to Florence when it struck the jetty. Saved were Capt. Lorin S. McDonald, 45, Florence, and Robert Lagonegro, 32, Waterbury, Conn.

Coast Guard lookout Robert Chitwood had sighted the boat heading into the jetty and two lifeboats were dispatched. They found the two men clinging to the sinking craft and took them aboard.

The Doreen has an all-steel hull valued at about \$10,000. The owner is Harvey A. Tipton of Florence. The boat's trolling poles remained visible at low water, and Tipton said he would try to salvage the craft.

## Parade Monday Will Highlight Jubilee In Illinois Valley

Jubilee festivities begin Saturday morning with a barbecue near the American Legion hall and will proceed through Monday night when

Confirmations from 20 organizations and individuals who will enter floats in the parade have been received, according to Melvin Gray, grand marshal. Additional entries are expected before Sunday's deadline.

Saturday's program, following the barbecue, calls for a gold-panning contest at 3:30 p.m. and tug-of-war contests for both men and women at 2:30 p.m.

The Queen's ball in the Legion hall is the big event Saturday, starting at 6 p.m. The Queen will be chosen on the basis of ticket sales.

### Monday's Schedule

Monday's schedule begins with the arrival of the pony express, with the mail expected to arrive at 10 a.m.

The line will move from River st. to Redwood ave. and then south to Caves highway and toward the Caves to disband at the World War I veterans grounds.

A Gymkhana horse show will follow the parade, at Spitz field.

The Jubilee Queen will present trophies to contest winners immediately after the

At 6 p.m. there will be a free dance for the young people in the Legion hall, and the big Jubilee dance will follow Monday evening.

There are still some concession booths available, according to Otto Tyron, Jubilee general chairman. He asks that anyone who wants to arrange for a booth do so immediately.

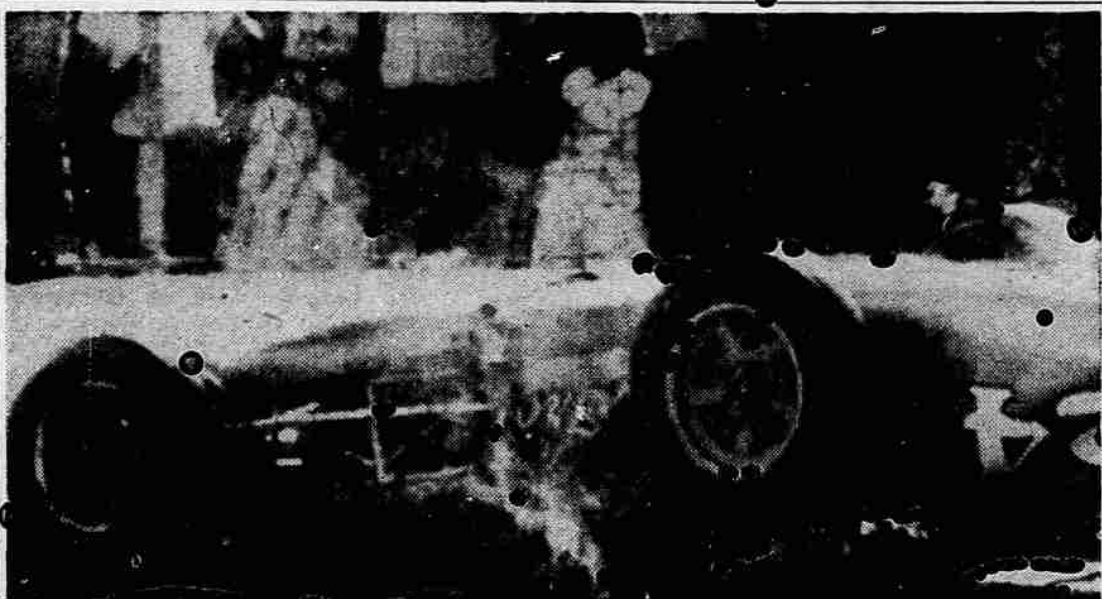

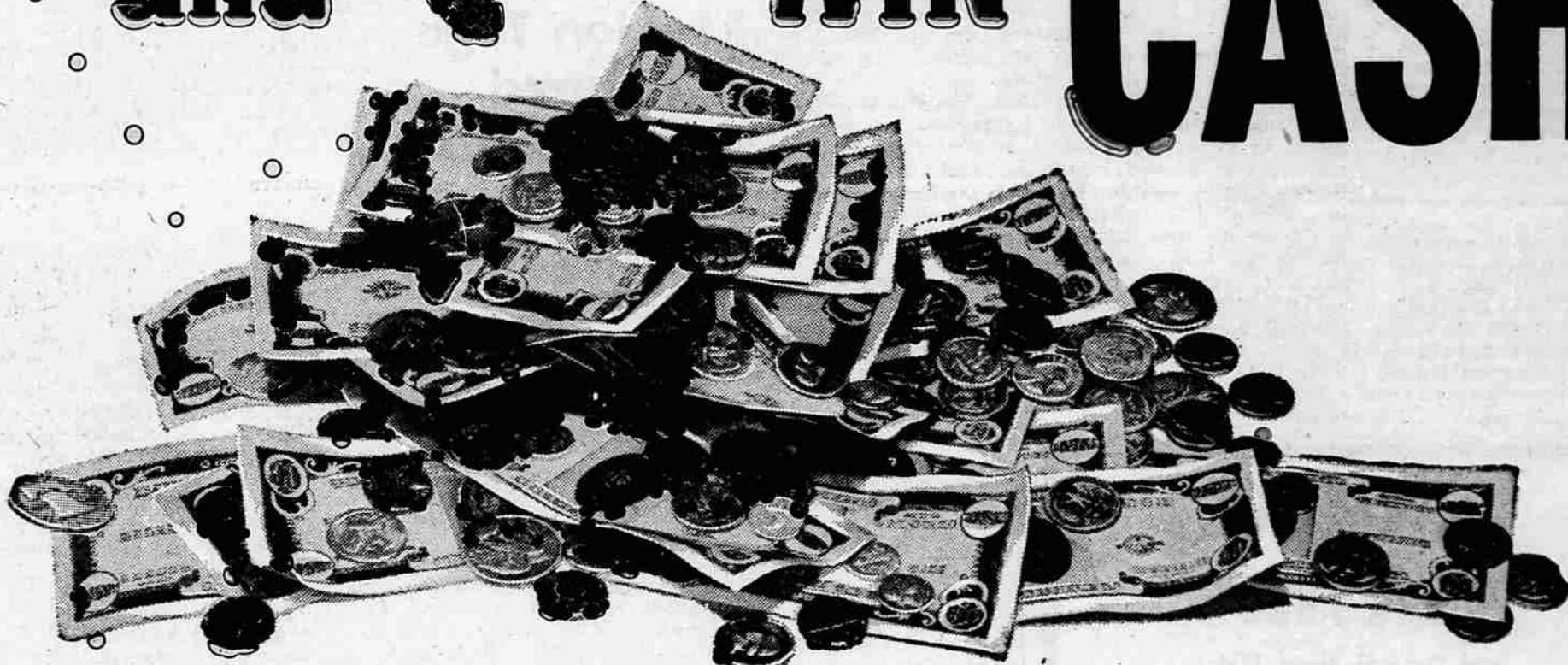
