Oregon Designated Polio Epidemic Area

Portland - (UPI) - The state board of health Tuesday designated Oregon as a polio epidemic area. Dr. Harold Erickson, state health officer, said the designation may help get Salk vaccine which has been in short supply.

Thirty-three persons have been hit with the crippling disease in the past two weeks, with a total of 27 cases of the paralytic variety, Dr. Erickson said.

The doctor urged widespread use of the vaccine to halt further spread of the disease which crippled 15 Oregon residents within the last week.

None of the cases reported had the full series of Salk shots, he said.

Those most needful of the shots are pre-school children and adults. Those two categories have accounted for the majority of cases, Erickson said.

Through last week, Oregon this year has recorded 79 cases, 61 of them paralytic and four resulting in death.

He said that 300 persons may be affected this year if the disease continued on its present course.

15 Last Week

Of the 15 cases reported last week, seven occurred in pre-school children up to the age of 5, three occurred in school-age children and six were

Fast Action Asked On Explosives Bill

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) wrote Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) today urging speedy action on a bill to tighten up on regulations concerning handling of explosives.

The Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce committee has reported out the bill.

It would make applicable to private motor carriers penalties of the transportation of explosives act and increase responsibility of all motor carriers for taking safety precautions.

Neuberger urged it be scheduled for Senate floor action as soon as possible so both houses would have a chance to act during the current session.

Tranquilizers Serve As Umbrellas to Shield Brain From Showers of Strains

Cincinnati - (Science Service) - Tranquilizers may literally be umbrellas that protect the brain from a shower of stresses and strains.

Structurally, tranquilizers resemble atropine which is known to dry the mouth and stop intestinal movement, or curare, the Indian arrow poison that paralyzes muscles.

All have large umbrella-like chemical structures which may shield the nerves from stimulating substances. Dr. T. C. Barnes, formerly of Hahnemann Medical College, Philadelphia, reported at a meeting of the American Pharmaceutical Association here recently.

Dr. Barnes basis this explanation of tranquilizers upon the results of an experiment with neurotic mice. He found that one tranquilizing chemical, stelazine, was three times as powerful as thiorazine in subduing the neurotic behavior of the mice. Stelazine has an added piperazine ring to the three-ring umbrella structure of thiorazine, Dr. Barnes pointed out.

Three Carbon Atoms

A good umbrella must have a handle, Dr. Barnes continued. In the phenothiazine tranquilizers, this essential part of the structure is a row of three carbon atoms. The nerve is accustomed to this handle because it is present on several natural neurohumoral agents such as adrenaline and histamine.

The newest umbrella tranquilizer is mellaril or thioridazine which has a four-ring structure like stelazine, but which lacks the essential "handle", the three-carbon chain. This may explain why it is so weak, the researcher speculated.

A mental patient may require a gram of mellaril where five milligrams of stelazine would do the job. An analogous situation would picture a person in a thunderstorm with a big umbrella and no handle.

In major epilepsy, the umbrella theory works very well, Dr. Barnes pointed out. All drugs used in severe fits have a phenyl or flat benzene

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Giant Rocket Plans Disclosed

London - (UPI) - Two American scientists disclosed today they had completed preliminary studies for a giant rocket which, by 1964, could be carrying a two-man crew to the moon and back.

M. W. Rosen and F. C. Schwenk of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in Washington said the powerful engines required for such a journey already were being developed, while the fuels already were in use.
