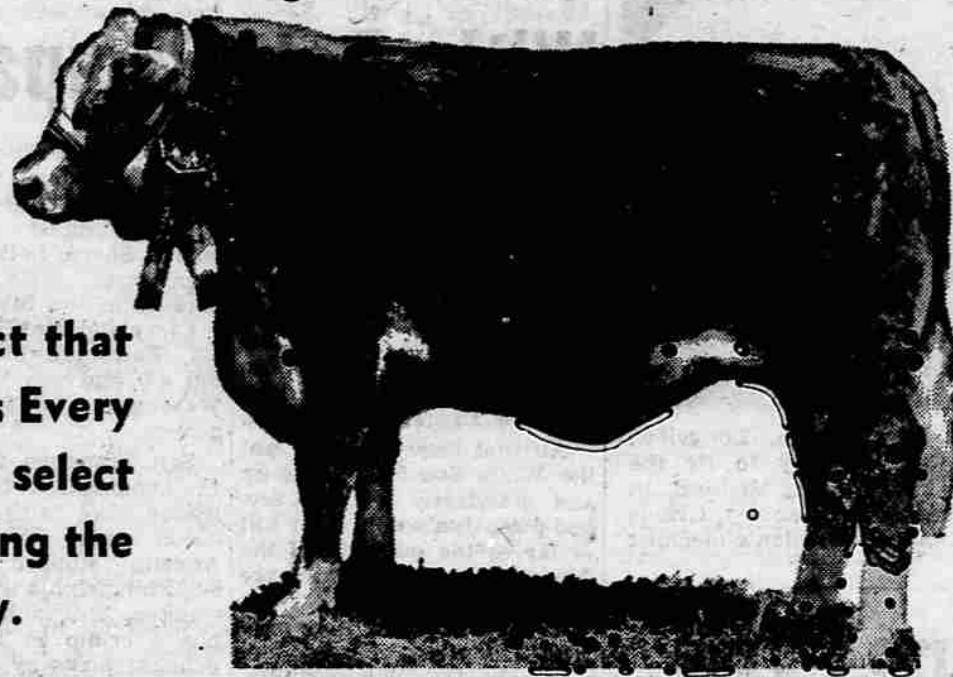

Portland-Portland area office of the bureau of land management has called for bids on furnishing various seeds for reseeding range lands in eastern Oregon, the department of the interior said today.

NBA Gives Nix To Ace Request

Toronto — (UPI) — The National Boxing association acted quickly and decisively on two separate fronts during the third session of its four-day meeting.

First the delegates thumbed down a request to consider Ace Armstrong as an immediate possible contender for the NBA's version of the world middleweight title currently held by Gene Fullmer.

Later, National Commissioner Abe J. Greene of Paterson, N. J., turned down a \$50,000 offer from Tel- prompter Corp. President Irving Kahn to help provide a "police force to govern boxing."

At the same time the NBA confirmed an earlier decision to have Spider Webb meet Fullmer in a title bout at a date to be announced later.

Eugene, Ore. — (UPI) — Coach Len Casanova was pleased with his Oregon Webfoots Wednesday following a hard workout climaxed by a 30-minute scrimmage session.
