

Maentz Tops Johnson; Lynch, Miller Take Adversaries in Extra Holes in SO Golf Meet

Bob Maentz, Medford, ousted the medalist buster while Mike Lynch, Eugene, eliminated the 1958 runner-up and Dr. William Miller, Medford, won the longest tussle in the first two days of championship flight matches in Friday's second round action in the Southern Oregon Golf tournament here.

Maentz chalked up a 3 and 2 triumph over Jimmie Johnson, Sacramento, Calif., who on Thursday had edged Stewart Schroeder, Medford, men's low qualifier in the 31st annual rivalry at Rogue Valley Country club. Lynch, an RVCC member, nipped Dr. Dave Boals, Medford, the last year's finalist in 20 holes. Miller needed 21 greens to get by Carl Schmidt another Medfordite.

The day's hottest play was by George Clerich, Eastmoreland, Portland, Southwest Oregon champ, who was two under par in winning from Ron Mitchell, Chico, Calif., 2 and 1.

One Under Par
Some of the day's best rounds were posted by defending champion, Creason, Las Vegas, Nev., Bob Prall, Salem, and Justin Smith Jr., Medford, all one under par and six times champ Eddie Simmons, Medford, even par for his match.

Creason downed A. J. Toyly, Vancouver, Wash., 6 and 4, Prall, twice Oregon Golf association medal play winner, turned back a fine bid by Dick House, Medford, 4 and 3, and Smith was 5 and 4 victor over Red McLean, Coos Bay, Simmons was winner by 4 and 3 over Jim Snider, Portland, an ex-Medfordite.

Jim Sheldon, Medford, second low qualifier in the meet, was one over links standard in a 4 and 3 decision over Ray Orrick, Chico, Calif. DeRoss Kinkade, Cottage Grove, who shared third low qualifying count with Simmons, was another Friday 4 and 3 winner. He defeated Dr. N. J. Wilson, Medford.

Never Trained
Maentz never trailed in his match despite a five over par count. He went ahead to stay on No. 4 hole. Lynch won the second extra hole of his match with a par when Boals chipped too far past the green. Boals held a 4 up lead after nine holes of the match. Miller took third extra hole of his ruckus with a par. Schmidt, after a shot down the middle of the fairway, chipped short and two-putted. Miller evened his match on the 17th green and the two halved 18, 19 and 20 with pars.

Prall was 2 up on the turn of his hassle and settled the issue with birds on Nos. 10

and 11 holes. House made some good recoveries. On No. 8 he topped the ball in trying to get out of the trap but on the next shot plunked the ball on the green to set up a putt that gave him a par to halve the hole. Smith chipped well to take his battle. Sheldon, against Orrick, was 3 up after birds on No. 7 and 8. He lost No. 9 to a bogey but had pars the rest of the way.

Medalist Prize Goes To Davies

Trailing by six strokes after 11 holes, Mrs. Helen Davies, Medford, made a rousing comeback Friday to cop the play-off for the women's medalist trophy in the Southern Oregon Golf championships here.

Mrs. Davies, seven times winner in the tourney, record: 1 an 85 card for the 18-hole runoff tour at the Rogue Valley Country club. Her opponent, Miss Betty Martin, Longview, Wash., stroked an 88. The two had knotted in Tuesday and Wednesday play with 80s for low qualifying laurels.

After the six-hole deficit, the home club player needed just three holes to pull even. The tide began to turn when Miss Martin's ball landed in the middle of a bush on her second shot on the way to No. 12 green. The ball was unplayable and the Washington miss had to hit a provisional shot. She took an eight for a triple bogey on the hole while Mrs. Davies was in the cup in six.

On No. 13 and 14 the Medford lady carded par fours while Miss Martin had sixes. Helen took a stroke lead with a par on 15. She picked up two more strokes on 16 and 17 and each bogied on the final hole.

Betty had a fine one under par card of 39 on the front nine to Helen's 43 but slipped to a 49 while the Medford player had a 42, four over par.

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Red Raiders Have Only 11 Days To Prepare for Contest With Hawaii on Medford High Field

Ashland — Football is again taking over the thoughts of enthusiasts in many parts of the area and at Southern Oregon College there is no exception as Coach Al Akins points towards Tuesday's opening day of practice on Fuller field.

Akins has indicated there will be little time to fret prior to the first game against the University of Hawaii in Medford on Sept. 19 in the Toronado stadium. The early date leaves the Raiders only 11 days to prepare for the battle.

Hawaii surveys the potential grid season with a brighter outlook than the 1958 season which saw the Rainbows emerge with a 4-7 record. Latest report from America's 50th state reveals that the Rainbows are better off this year at quarterback and the line packs more weight, depth, and experience.

Need Better Running

The report also stated their greatest weakness appeared to be in the lack of a gifted running attack. However, an accompanying roster listed three backs with lettering experience and one with three years action.

In the line the Rainbows will average about 193 pounds while the backfield, led by veteran Casper Schichtle, will average near 187.

Schichtle, a one year letterman, is from Coffeyville, Kan., and the sophomore signal caller weighs 185 and stands six feet. The Kansan is the leading passer and last year he completed 37 of 73 attempts for 429 yards.

Hawaii appears strongest from tackle to tackle by virtue of two returning two-year lettermen at the tackle slots and three returnees with three letters each at guard. A three-beaten last season.

Moore considers his squad green and the Beavers are terming this a "building" year.

The lettermen are Lewis Tuttle and Ron Hopkins, tackles; Tod Kennedy, fullback; Doug Whitney, end; Tony McCoy, center, and Chris Bishop, halfback.

Beaverton may have several sophomores seeing varsity service this fall. Strongest possibility is Brian Sinnerud, thirds in a family to play football for the Beavers. One brother, Jim, went on to play at Stanford. The other is Mickey, bonus baseballer signed by the Milwaukee Braves. Brian is reported outstanding in both baseball and basketball.
