Compton Star UCLA Surprise

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Former Compton college star Bob Smith was a surprise star Saturday as the UCLA varsity rumbled over the reserves, 42-0, in a 90-minute scrimmage.

Smith, a sophomore pressing highly-touted Bill Kilmer for the tailback spot, carried the ball nine times for 96 yards. Kilmer also sparked on runs of 30 and 50 yards, as the Bruins did little passing in the long session.

Starting left guard Jack Metcalf suffered the most serious injury of the drill, a concussion which caused him to be sent to UCLA medical center for X-rays and observation. Full extent of his injuries was not immediately determined.

Coach Bill Barnes said he was impressed with the performance of the newcomers to the Bruin camp, particularly Smith and other running backs.

Kennel Club Show, Trial Slated Today At Football Field

Southern Oregon Kennel club's 11th annual all breed dog show and obedience trial will be held today at the Senior High school football field with judging to start at 9:30 a.m.

This will be an unbench show so the dogs will not be on display and can be viewed only at the time each breed is judged in the ring. There will be four rings for breed judging, and one ring where the obedience trial will be held.

Judging at 9:30 will be for weimaraners, long coated chihuahuas, cocker spaniels, Boston terriers, bulldogs, schipperke, basenji, basset hounds, and 13-inch beagles.

At 10:30 a.m. smooth chihuahuas, maltese, pugs, chow chows, dalmatians, keeshonden, lhasa apso, shetland sheepdogs, 15-inch beagles, greyhounds, rhodesian ridgebacks, whippet, samoyeds and great danes will be shown.

The schedule also includes: 11 a.m. English springer spaniels, English setters; 11:30 a.m. toy poodles, doberman pinschers and afghan hounds; 12:15 p.m. Norwegian elkhounds, and collies; 12:30 p.m. miniature pinschers, pomeranians, German shorthaired pointers, golden retrievers, Labrador retrievers, and pointers; 12:45 p.m. boxers; 1:00 p.m. miniature poodles, pekingses, German shepherds, St. Bernard, Alaskan malamutes; 1:30 p.m. Irish setters, airedale terriers, bedlington terriers, and cairn terriers; 1:45 p.m. long haired dachshunds, wirehaired dachshunds and smooth dachshunds; 2:30 p.m. standard poodles, smooth and wire haired foxterriers, Kerry blue terriers and west highland white terriers; 3:30 p.m. miniature schnauzers, Scottish terriers, skye terriers and Welsh terriers.

The obedience trial will start at 9:30 a.m. and continue until completed.

Dogs which have been judged the best of their respective breed will compete in the group judging which is scheduled to start at 3:30 p.m. The winners of each one of the six groups will then compete for best dog in show, to be chosen by a veteran all breed dog judge, Chris Shuttlesworth, of Sun Valley, Calif.

Chicago Defeats Forty Niners 27-24

Seattle, Wash. — (UPI) — Bob Joe Conrad kicked two field goals and scored a touchdown here Saturday to lead the Chicago Cardinals to a 27-24 victory over the San Francisco 49ers in an exhibition professional football game before 23,000 fans.

Conrad, formerly of Texas A&M, also kicked three extra points to personally account for 15 of the Cardinals' points.

The Lone Star state also was ably represented on the Cardinal squad by King Hill, of Rice, who mixed up his plays in mid-season form and passed with devastating effectiveness at times, and by John Crow of Texas A&M, who had a great first half.

The score was tied three times.

Chicago scored first late in the first quarter when Crow took a handoff from Hill and went over from 19 yards out.

The 49ers tied it up just before the opening period ended when Stanford's John Brodie passed 11 yards to Clyde Conner, College of Pacific.

San Francisco took a 17-7 lead in the second quarter. Bill Atkins gave the west

coast team a three-point lead with a fifteen-yard field goal, and the 49ers scored again when Hill fumbled in the end zone after being hit hard by Ed Hickey and linebacker Mike Dukas recovered.

The Cards recovered a Forty-Niner fumble on San Francisco's 41 and moved it to the eleven, then Conrad went over standing up.

Conrad tied it up with a 16-yard field goal seconds before the intermission.

Hill drove six yards for a third-period touchdown and the Forty-Niners came back with an eighty-yard drive. J. D. Smith going over from five yards out.

Conrad ended the scoring with his second field goal seven minutes before the game ended.
