WILLIE SCHULTZ

Hornbrook - Graveside funeral service were held last week for Willie Prescott (Jack) Schultz, 78, who died Sunday at the Siskiyou General hospital in Yreka, where he had been admitted on Aug. 26.

Mr. Schultz was born on Jan. 31, 1885, in the old gold-mining town of Cottonwood, now known as the Huley district of Hornbrook. He spent the greater part of his life in and around Hornbrook. Also known as "Shorty" and "Cowboy" Schultz, he was a colorful and familiar figure at rodeos throughout northern California, and in his younger days was widely known as a freight team driver, when he regularly drove a six-horse freight team down the Klamath river.

He served with the U.S. Cavalry during World War I. Mr. Schultz never married. For the past several years, he had made his home at the Clarendon hotel in Yreka. Survivors include three half-brothers, Alfred Clawson of Hornbrook, Fred Clawson of Yreka, and Theodore Clawson of Salem, Ore., and a half-sister, Mrs. Gertrude Ginnacles of San Francisco.

The chaplain of the J. Ross Nelson post of the American Legion of Yreka officiated, and members of the post conducted military services. Burial was in the family plot in the Henley-Hornbrook cemetery.

Police in New York Crack Down on Violence by Youth

New York (UPI) - Police ordered to clear New York streets of hooligans arrested 150 teen-agers and youths Saturday in roundups in some of the city's worst crime areas.

In one seven-hour operation, police seized 63 young hoodlums, loiterers and beatniks lounging on benches along Central park.

Police said they arrested 44 on the East Side and 38 in Brooklyn.

All of those arrested were charged with disorderly conduct.

Most of them were between 15 and 20 years old. Among the alleged culprits were 29 Puerto Ricans and a 19-year-old Negro seized at a "waistline party," a wild drinking affair featuring the beating of a bongo drum until the neighbors could not stand it any longer and called the police.

Lye Thrown

Most of those arrested in Brooklyn were boys and girls attending a party at which lye was thrown into the face of a would-be gate crasher.

The seven-hour Central park police operation was touched off by complaints of rowdiness from occupants of towering apartments overlooking Central park. Police emptied every bench from 68th to 86th streets, along the edge of the park.

Police said residents had complained the youths monopolized the benches and were loud and offensive. Those seized were charged with disorderly conduct.

The raid followed a busy night for New York City hoodlums. A 19-year-old Negro, Louis Truett, stabbed subway policeman Thomas Cooney, 39, in the groin while resisting arrest for picking a sleeping man's pocket.

'Waistline' Party

Police broke up a wild "waistline" party on the lower East Side, arresting a 19-year-old Negro and 29 Puerto Ricans and seizing a bongo drum.

The party, given in an apartment rented for the occasion by Negro Frank Robinson in a low-income housing project, was to have lasted 48 hours. But the police got there three hours after the guests had arrived, paying admission charges based on their waistline measurements, at a rate of 2 cents per inch.

Neighbors on the 17th floor of the building stood the thumping of the drum, the wail of a record player and the screams and laughter of the guests as long as they could before calling police. "Mack the Knife"

The Columbia Broadcasting System said it had withdrawn temporarily all versions of the song "Mack the Knife" from local broadcasts because of juvenile stabblings. "Mack the Knife," from Kurt Weill's "Three Penny Opera," has lyrics describing an English hoodlum's bloody exploits.

"Why broadcast songs about knifings and throwing people into the river in cement suits?" a CBS spokesman asked. "It could encourage young hoods to commit crimes."

The spokesman said the song would be returned to the air as soon as the crime wave abated.

In another incident involving juveniles, two boys were splashed with liquid lye when they and others tried to crash a party being given in Brooklyn by a Negro social group called the "Mysterians."

'Sweet Sixteen'

A 15-year-old Brooklyn boy was wounded accidentally in the shoulder at a "sweet sixteen" party by a boy who told police he had brought his ancient Derringer gun to protect himself against a possible gang attack.

Area Conferene on Aging Scheduled In Mid-November

The Southern Oregon Regional Conference on Aging will be held in Medford about mid-November, depending on availability of speakers and adequate space, according to Frank Glonning, chairman of the Rogue Valley Council on Aging.

The tentative date of Nov. 14 was decided upon at a meeting of the executive board Thursday afternoon when Miss Julie Johnson, executive secretary of the state commission on aging met with the group.

Attending the conference will be delegates from Jackson, Klamath, Josephine, Curry, Lake and Douglas counties.

Miss Johnson is touring the state, setting up planning committees to handle and organize district conferences on problems of the aging.

Study Needs

She told the Rogue Valley council executive board that each district should study the needs of their own counties and plan the program for regional conferences with those problems in mind. No set pattern of programming is contemplated by the commission, she said.

Miss Johnson pointed out, however, that one purpose which must be met is that each district is expected to produce actual facts on conditions found in each area such as how many older people need better and less expensive housing, and how many can not afford proper medical care and similar facts.

The information will be reported to east state commission and compiled for the national conference, which is scheduled in 1961.
