The wedding cake was baked and decorated by Mrs. Britton.

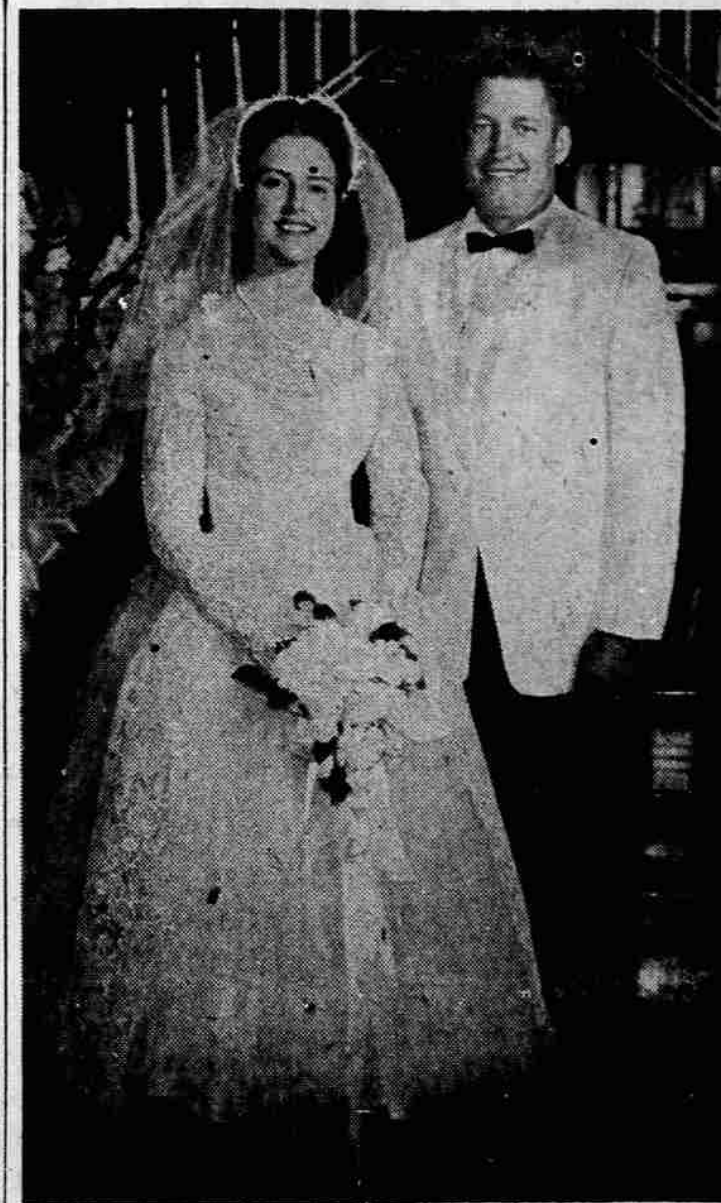
Pink and white gladioli and ivy decorated the reception hall.

Each honored member received a gift and prizes were given winners of games. Refreshments followed.

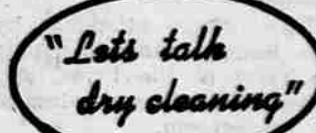

While diamonds may be called a girl's best friend, hand-knits are one of her best loves. Knitted garments of both the hand-knit and machine-knit variety are one of the special favorites of this year's fashions.

This is due largely to the fact that knitted materials can stretch in one direction and at the same time shrink in the other. Also, knitted clothes are likely to lose their shape during wear. For this reason they require frequent cleaning and blocking to restore them to their original shape and dimensions. This is true of fabrics and garments knitted of wool, cotton, rayon, nylon and combinations of yarns.

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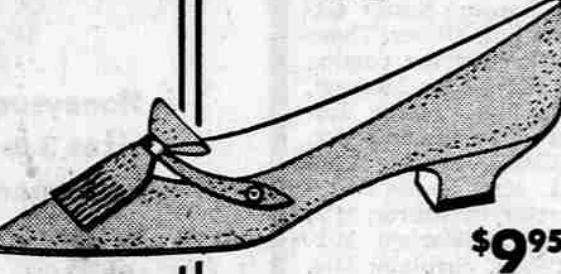
