G. P. Beats Riddle 18-4; In Playoffs

Riddle — The Grants Pass Merchants scored in every inning to chalk up an 18 to 4 victory over Riddle to capture the Rogue Valley Baseball league playoffs here yesterday.

Grants Pass had grabbed the first game of the two-out-of-three series Saturday at Grants Pass with a 22 to 4 victory but dropped the second game, the first of a double header here Sunday, 10 to 7.

The game which gave the Merchants the title had been billed for seven innings but was called at the end of five frames with the winners in a commanding 14-run lead.

Grants Pass scored three times in the first inning with three walks, a double and single. Four more runs crossed the plate in the second frame with a double, three errors and two bases on balls. Two more were added in the third inning on two singles and a walk and the Merchants crossed the plate nine times in the fourth inning when they sent 14 men to the plate. The scores came on six hits, including home runs by Derald Wootton and Rusty Snyder, a walk and four errors.

Scores Twice

Riddle scored twice in the second inning on a walk and two singles and two more times in the fifth frame on two errors and two singles.

Roy Harris went the distance for the winners, giving up seven hits and walking two. He struck out four. Sam Humphreys started on the mound for Riddle and was lifted in favor of Layton Dietz with nobody out in the first inning after yielding two runs on a double, single and two bases on balls. Dietz was relieved by Ken Ayres in the fourth inning.

Gene Morrison was the winner for Riddle in the first game Sunday, relieving starter Don Dedman in the first inning with one out and four runs across the plate. Morrison scattered eight hits over the remaining eight and two-thirds innings, including a home run to Derald Wootton and a triple to Norm Hedgepath. Kermit McLemore was the loser.

Dietz, hitting two for four including a bases-circling blow; Ayres with three for five and Morrison's two for three, were the big sticks for the winners.

Sheldon, DeVoe, Creager Runners-Up in Labor Day Holiday Tournament Here

A Salem real estate man, a University of Washington coed and a Grants Pass bowler in galley operator, all veterans of the Southern Oregon Golf tournament, yesterday garnered their first championships in that Labor Day holiday event at Rogue Valley Country club here.

Bob Prall, Salem, first flight winner in two previous years, survived 42 grueling holes in the Sunday quarter and semi-finals and outdistanced his adversary over most of the last 25 holes yesterday to subdue Jim Sheldon 4 and 2 in the men's division finals of the 31st annual tourney.

Betty Martin, 20-year-old, Longview, Wash., saw a 5 up advantage dwindle away then dropped in a birdie putt on the 36th hole to dethrone defending champion Sue DeVoe, Medford, for the women's mantle. This was her first championship flight tourney play past quarter-finals. Karl Bennett, Grants Pass, who has played in the Southern Oregon "off and on" since 1929 and was a pre-world war II semi-finalist, captured the senior trophy with a 4 and 3 victory over Jack Creager, Medford.

Two Extra Holes

Prall, who before this year had never advanced past the championship second round of the Medford classic, pitched and putted well on the final stretch to overcome the Rogue Valley club champ on this 34th hole. Actually, the 23-year-old twice Oregon medal play titlist reached the final the hard way. Prall fought 22 holes, four extra holes, before eliminating George Cicrich, Portland, in the Sunday morning quarter-finals. In the semis, Lynn Creason, Las Vegas, Nev., the defender, won 20 holes with Prall before succumbing.

To take his crown, Prall had to come from well behind in all of this last three matches of the tourney. Sheldon icked Ed Kovacovich, Eureka, Calif., 1 up in his semi-final after eliminating Justin Smith Jr., Medford, 2 and 1 earlier Sunday.

Miss Martin, first flight winner two years ago, thumped Mrs. Helen Davies 5 and 4 and Miss DeVoe won from Mrs. Ed Wheelock, Portland, 3 and 2 in Sunday semi-finals. Bennett ousted Larry Tripper, Medford, and Creager tripped C. J. Harbeck, Olympia, Wash., Sunday to reach the senior final.

In first flight finals yesterday Dr. Robert Buck, Medford, downed Clayton Lewis, Medford, 1 up to take the men's, Susan Small, Corvallis, won from Mrs. S. A. Peters, Eureka, 3 and 1 for the women's and Ted Porterfield, Grants Pass, trimmed Ray Beeber, Klamath Falls, 2 up for the senior hardware.

Four Greens Important

Both Prall and Sheldon were three over par for the

first Monday 18. The eventual titlist was even par the rest of the day while Sheldon was five over standard.

Play on four greens yesterday virtually settled the championship issue. These were the 12th, the 13th, the 14th and the 15th. They were a nightmare for Sheldon and a boon to Prall, who won each of them both in the morning and in the afternoon. Morning losses on these greens lost Sheldon a 4 up spread. In the afternoon on these holes, the 30th, 31st, 32nd and 33rd of the match, Prall took a commanding 3 up lead.

Sheldon put together his early margin by hitting all but one green and playing sparkling two under par golf on his morning front side. Then, while the Medfordite bogied on 12 and 13, double bogied on 14 and bogied again on 15, Prall played one over par to pull even for the lunchtime pause.

Sheldon Leads

After the lunch round Sheldon had 1 up leads on two occasions, the last on the 29th after winning three of four holes. Prall pulled even with a par, took 31 with a bird and 32 and 33 with pars. On No. 16 green, the 34th hole of the tussle, Prall was on the carpet in two strokes and parked his ball up in position for a par four 15-inch putt. Sheldon was above the green a bit on two and short on his next shot. When his putt did not go in, he conceded the hole and Prall was the new champion.

Sheldon started the post lunch leg of the engagement with an Eagle three on the 19th hole of the fray. He put in a 3½-foot putt. On No. 20 Prall parked his ball three feet from the pin on his second shot. Sheldon, over the green on two, on the apron on three and by the cup on four, conceded the hole. The Salemite went ahead for the first time during the day on the 23rd with a par four on a gimme short putt. He took No. 25 with a bogey five for 2 up when Sheldon had trouble with a chip followed by a stop-on-the-cup putt.

Sheldon won 26 with a par with a 4½ foot putt after blasting from a sand trap. Prall was over the green on approaching and his chip was just to the edge of the carpet. On 27 brought about a gallery uproar with a smart 14-foot downhill putt to even the match. Prall missed a nine-footer. An 18-footer by Sheldon and 15-footer by Prall on 28 were show stoppers.

Prall Puts Go In

On 29 Prall had trap and chipping trouble and Sheldon went 1 up with a par. The 30th was taken by Prall when a six-foot try by Sheldon rolled by the cup. Prall nabbed 31 with a 13-foot putt and claimed 32 with a 2½-foot putt when Sheldon's five-footer did not go down. On 33 Prall was in the trap but made a nice out and dropped in a seven-foot curling putt. Sheldon was into the trees off the tee, chipped across the green and then chipped to the back of the apron.

In the morning Sheldon took the lead on No. 2 with a five-foot birdie putt and won No. 3 for 2 up with a two-foot putt for a par when Prall got in a grass trap then couldn't sink a seven-foot shot. Prall made up for Sheldon by a better chip and 2½ foot putt for a par on No. 4. But, it was 2 up again on six on Sheldon's four-footer and Prall's missed 2½ footer. On No. 8 Sheldon hit the green 30 inches from the cup and holed for a bird and 3 up. He put in a 10-footer and Prall missed a three-foot shot for the 4 up gap.

A rimmed short putt gave Sheldon his bogey on 12 and a dubbed chip on 13 cost another. On 14 the Medfordite drove into the rough, hit into a sand trap, chipped across the green into another trap and hit well up on the pin on a second chip, leaving the ball well uphill from the hole. Tree trouble plagued Sheldon on 15.

DeVoe Finishes Strong

Miss DeVoe had a fine two-under par 36 on her last nine holes of the women's 36-hole championship session. But, it wasn't quite enough to pass by Miss Martin who was just two over par with a 78 for the whole after lunch round. The 1958 winner had a 79. The Washington lass had an 82 to 83 edge in getting a 1 up difference for the first 18 holes of the day. She built the margin to 5 up by the 25th hole but the match was even-seven on the 33rd.

Miss Martin opened up the

second 18 lap with a 12-foot birdie putt for a win. The two ladies parred through the 20, 21st and 22 holes and Betty won 23 when Sue threeputed. And, the standing went to 4 up when Sue hit her tee shot out of bounds on 24 and suffered a two-stroke penalty. Betty gained 5 up with a par on 25 when Sue's ball smacked a tree.

A par won No. 26 for Miss DeVoe. She then took 28 with another par when the Washingtonian chipped along. Sue then chipped up stiff on 29 for a par while Miss Martin was short and the count was down to 2 up. Betty was almost out of bounds on her approach on 31 and another par by Sue sliced her deficit.

The match was squared on 33 when Sue chipped up well and parred with a short putt. Each birdied with two putts on 34. Miss DeVoe hit the green on No. 35 tee and stopped three feet from the pin but muffed the chance to go ahead when she missed the putt.

Led In Morning

The 1958 victor never got a lead after lunch but was ahead for a stretch in the morning. She won No. 6 with a par and went 2 up with another par on 11. She lost 12 and 13 to pars for even 1 up and Miss Martin went 1 up with another par. Miss DeVoe squared it on 17 with a par. But, Betty set the stage ahead with a birdie on 18.

Bennett played a steady game against Creager most of the way in the 16-hole senior wrap up. He had two birdies and was even par and 3 up at the turn. Bennett was even par, yet at the end of 12 holes and was 4 up by that time. He lost 13 with a double bogey but took 14 with a par. Fifteen was halved with bogies to end the tussle.

Prall, 3 down to Creason and one over par after the front side played even standard golf the rest of the day Sunday to nose out the defending champion. The two were each one over par for the regular 18 holes. The Salemite closed out the match on the second extra hole with a 2½ gimme putt for a par when Creason knocked his ball over the green and took a double bogey. Each had birds on 19. Prall, over the green and under a tree on his approach, made a neat recovery, smacking the pill through a sand trap and then sinking an eight foot putt. Creason had chipped to within two inches of the cup for his bird.

Took Advantage

Creason faltered on the back nine, after two under par on the front and Prall was able to take advantage of it. Prall put in a six-foot bird put to win 10. On No. 12, Prall had a bogey five but won the green when Creason topped his second shot, hit his third to the back of a

trap and chucked his chip for a double bogey.

The Salemite laced a 35-foot uphill chip for a par on No. 13 to tie the match. Creason was in the rough in trees off the tee and his second shot hit a tree and bounded into the fairway. As if the long chip were not enough, Prall rammed in a 25 to 30-foot putt on No. 14 for a bird and 1 up. Creason rimmed with a nine-footer.

Creason won No. 16 when Prall three-putted and the match was square. Prall took 17 with a par when Creason missed the green off the tee. On 18, Creason chipped nicely to within 14 inches of the cup and dumped his putt for a bird. Prall's ball rolled by the hole on a three-foot putt and he lost a chance for a split and an end there to the match.

Sheldon Closed Brilliantly

Sheldon closed off brilliantly on the 18th against Kovacovich Sunday with a sensational 15-foot downhill putt for a birdie which assured a half of the hole. That was all he needed for he had gone 1 up on No. 17 by putting in a four-foot putt for a par. Kovacovich took a bogey when his tee shot hit a tree. He made a nice out but the tree cost him a stroke.

Sheldon was one over par for the match and Kovacovich two above. The RVCC champ was never up on the front nine while Kovacovich had 2 up gaps twice. He held this spread for the second time after a 20-foot shot for an eagle three on No. 7. However, Sheldon took No. 9 with a par when Kovacovich got behind a tree on his drive and had to use up a stroke to get back on the fairway. That put the Eureka just 1 up at the third.

A four-foot putt miss by Kovacovich enabled Sheldon to claim No. 12 and even the match with a par. Tall Jim also won 14 with a par to go 1 up, his first lead. A Kovacovich putt was in-and-out. The match then evened on 15 when Sheldon's tee shot, hit a tree and bounced to a bad lie among the oak timber. Kovacovich was on the green off the tee and was conceded a birdie two. The two halved 16 with pars.

No Comeback

Miss Martin was even par on the front side Sunday and one over coming back in thumping Mrs. Davies. She hit every green on the out nine and was 4 up at the turn. Mrs. Davies couldn't muster the comeback punch she had on Friday in the medalist play-off with Miss Martin and on Saturday in a quarter-final with Mrs. Helen Cavalli, King City, Calif.

Miss DeVoe, troubled by the flu bug, had to stage a rally to beat Mrs. Wheelock. One down with 10 holes played, Sue took No. 11, 12 and 13 holes with two pars and a birdie for 2 up. Mrs. Wheelock won No. 14 with a bird but the Medford Miss claimed No. 15 with par. On 16 Sue's approach was an inch from the cup and she got a bird to wrap up the match. She was even par for the round.

Creager in one of the senior semis, was one over par on the backside. He won Nos. 10, 12 and 14, lost 15 then stroked par for a win on 16 to close the action. The Medfordite was a bit ragged on the out nine but was even with Harbeck at the turn. Bennett was two over par in winning from Butler. They also were even after nine holes. The Grants Pass player won 13, 15 and 16 to take the tilt.

22 Hole Highlights

Highlight of the men's Sunday quarter-finals was 22-hole engagement which Prall won from George Cicrich, Portland, the Southwestern Oregon titlist. Creason defeated Dr. Ralph Odell, Medford, 3 and 2. Sheldon fought by Justin Smith Jr., 2 and 1, and Kovacovich, Calif., turned back Dr. William Miller, Medford, 3 and 2 in the other quarters.

Prall needed a strong upsurge to stem the title ambitions of Cicrich. The Portlander was 3 up after 11 holes. Bob grabbed 12 and 13 to narrow the gap but Cicrich took 15 when the Salemite's pitch was short to be 2 up. The two halved 16. On 17 Prall won when he hit the green and two-putted for a par. Cicrich missed the green and after chipping up missed a six foot putt.

Prall chipped to within

three inches of the hole for a gimme birdie four on the 18th to even the match. Cicrich's approach was to the right of the green in the rough. His chip landed on the edge of the sand trap and his next shot rolled by the cup.

No. 19 was halved with birdies. Cicrich put in a 12-foot putt to keep alive and Prall dunked a two-footer. The rivals stayed even on 20 with pars. On 21 Cicrich muffed a chance to win when hit two-foot putt would not go in. Prall had failed to down a three footer. The Salemite player was short of the green on his approach but made a nice chip. Cicrich was on the edge of the carpet and putted past the hole.

Prall took the 22nd hole with a par three. His tee shot was to the edge of the green on the right. He rimmed a 22 foot putt and was conceded a tap inches from the cup. Cicrich was short of the green and chipped up for a 12-footer. He was short on the putt.

Sheldon was even par in downing Smith in the quarter-finals. It was an evenly played tangle in which Smith had putting troubles. The two were even at the turn and Sheldon nabbed No. 10 and No. 17 greens with pars to make the difference. Smith, ex-Medford high and ex-University of Oregon golfer just out of the Air Force, missed short birdie putts on No. 12 and 16. On No. 17 a three-foot putt failed to go in for him.

Creason was even par, one over the front side and one under on the back in topping Odell. The Las Vegas man was never down in the match. He built a 3 up lead by taking the eighth and 12th holes with pars and the 13th with a bird. Odell cut the difference to 2 up on No. 14 with a 40 ft. shot into the cup for a bird. The two tied 15 with pars and Creason won on 16 with a par.

Turning point in the Kovacovich-Miller match came on the 11th hole. Kovacovich took the hole when Miller's ball hit the back of the green and bounded into a sand trap. The Eureka won 13 with a birdie and captured 14 with a par when Miller hit a tree.

Follows In Tilden's Foot Steps

Forest Hills, N.Y.—Vet-eran Vic Seixas, an "old man" of the courts who plays only week end tennis, sought today to following in the title footsteps of Big Bill Tilden after scoring the biggest upset of the U.S. amateur tennis championships.

Tilden, at 38, was the oldest winner of the Nationals. But Seixas at the same age showed he might be ready and able as well as willing to match that feat when he blasted aside fifth-seeded Ramanathan Krishnan of India Monday.

It was the biggest of three upsets — two seeded foreign women also biting the dusty turf at Forest Hills — as the handsome Philadelphian scored a smashing 6-3, 6-4, 6-2 victory over the classy Indian whose titles include the U.S. hard court championship.

Bow Out

Bowing out with Krishnan went fifth-seeded Angela Mortimer of England and seventh-seeded Renee Schuurman of South Africa. Sixteen-year-old Karen Hantze of San Diego, protegee of Maureen Connolly, scored over Miss Mortimer, 6-4, 6-4, and Shirley Bloomer Brasher of England eliminated Miss Schuurman, 6-3, 6-4.

Aside from those casualties the seeded stars moved along as expected. These included Peru's Alex Olmedo, Uncle Sam's Barry MacKay and Dutch Burchholz and such foreign threats as Chile's Luis Ayala and Australian Davis Cuppers Neale Fraser, Roy Emerson and Rod Laver.

Maria Bueno, the 19-year-old Wimbledon champion from Sao Paulo, Brazil, who is the favorite to capture the women's crown, escaped the upset wave as she dusted off Janet Hopps of Seattle, 6-4, 6-4, to show the way into the third round. With her went fourth-ranked Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., last year's runnerup, with a 6-4, 6-4 win over Carmen Lampe of New York.

Shoe production in the U.S. is expected to surpass the 600-million mark for the first time in 1959. The record up to now was almost 59 million pairs in 1957.
