

Mint Sale To Benefit Hospital

Southern Oregon District council of Epsilon Sigma Alpha International sorority will hold a door-to-door sale of Brown and Haley mints beginning tonight. The sale will continue Thursday and Friday, and will be conducted each night between 6:30 and 9 o'clock.

This sale is conducted to raise funds for the Children's Hospital school, Eugene. The sale will be conducted by the chapters in Ashland, Grants Pass, and Medford. This is the third year the Medford chapter has sold mints as a benefit for the Hospital school.

Last year the 60 Oregon chapters donated \$11,500.91 to the school. George Safford, managing director of the school said, "The various chapters of ESA have been of real service to us. In addition to raising monies to employ well qualified therapists for our school, offering campships for Hospital school children, contributing for the shoe and brave fund, they also help us locate and assist children requiring the services of the Hospital school."

Several local chapter members have visited the school and were much interested in the accomplishments of the handicapped youngsters. Average attendance is 30 to 35 children, whose ages range from 5 to 15 years. They come from all over the state and several from southern Oregon have attended. It is a day school and the children live in foster homes in Eugene. They are taught handicrafts, as well as regular school work and most receive therapy each day.

CHERRY MACAROONS

New York—Keep cherry macaroons on hand to serve with cold drinks or ice cream this summer. Mix 2/3 cup of sweetened condensed milk with 3 cups of flaked coconut, 1 teaspoon of vanilla and 3/4 teaspoon of almond extract. Drop by small tablespoonfuls about 1 inch apart on a well-greased cookie sheet, press a drained maraschino cherry into each cookie and bake in a 350-degree oven 8 to 10 minutes, or until the edges are delicately browned.
