In the nightcap, Rocky Colavito's sixth-inning double scored Minnie Minoso and broke a 1-1 tie. Cleveland added two more insurance runs off loser Skinny Brown in the seventh.

Trout Fishing
Improves Over
Rogue Region

Portland—(UPI)—The weekly report on fishing and hunting conditions prepared by the state game commission:

Southwest: Trout and summer steelhead angling only fair in North Umpqua; trout fishing improving all over the Rogue Basin; fall steelhead entering the Rogue in large numbers.

Pigeon hunting poor to fair in Douglas county; doves are plentiful along streams in lower valley; shooting poor in Jackson and Josephine counties; Coos county tidesflats and lower Smith flats good for pigeons.

Central: Fishing good throughout region; East and Paulina best on single eggs; Elk lake good on troll; Big Lava good trolling deep; Crane Prairie good for large rainbow; Deschutes from Bend to Wickiup good on both flies and bait.

Cool nights have moved doves south; sage grouse widely scattered; hunting conditions should be good in Deschutes unit archery area.

Northwest: Sea-run cutthroat angling improved along north coast; salmon angling should also improve; chinooks and jacks being taken in the Nectuxes up to Beaver and in Three Rivers; Clackamas drainage holding well with good fair catches; Sandy river slow but upper tributaries should be fair.

Northeast: Steelhead good on Columbia between Boardman and Arlington; Willows river good for rainbow on bait; angling picking up on Imnaha river; high lakes continue good; Eagle creek poor to fair; Brownlee reservoir good for bass, perch and channel catfish.

Grouse hunting spotty last week and with most birds near springs; morning dove hunting good to excellent in northeast region; conditions good in all archery areas.

Southeast: Malheur reservoir fair; Oversee reservoir slow; Beulah excellent for bank fishing.

The status quo was maintained in the National League where each of the top three contenders won. First place San Francisco stayed three games in front with a 7-2 victory over Pittsburgh; Los Angeles nipped Philadelphia, 1-0, and Milwaukee topped St. Louis, 5-3. Cincinnati swept a doubleheader from Chicago, 4-2, in 10 innings and 7-2 in a five-inning nightcap called because of darkness.

Bob Shaw won his 15th game for the White Sox with a seven-hitter against the Senators. The White Sox scored four runs with the help of three errors in the seventh. Jim Bunning held Boston to three hits in registering his 16th win for Detroit.

Held to Four Hits
Art Ditmar and Whitey Ford combined in a four-hit effort that gave the Yankees their victory over the A's.

Willie Mays cracked his 27th home run and scored three of the Giants' seven runs against the slumping Pirates, who lost their seventh game in the last eight starts.

Don Drysdale ended a month-long slump and a personal six-game losing streak when he pitched the Dodgers to their victory over the Phillies. Drysdale struck out 11 and yielded three hits en route to his 16th victory.

Bobby Avila's grand slam homer in the ninth inning sank Ernie Broglio of the Cardinals and brought Milwaukee southpaw Warren Spahn his 19th victory.

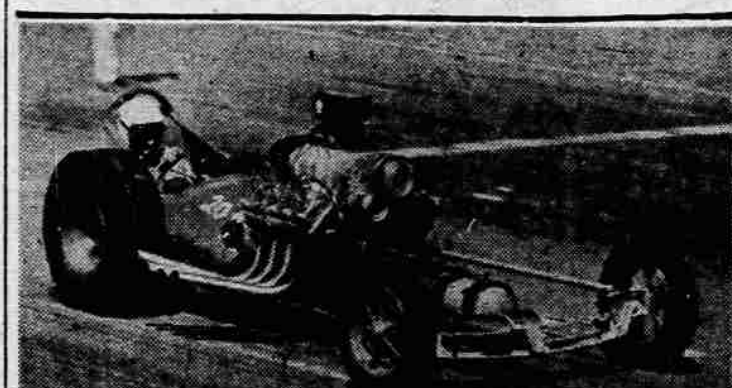

The machine is a fuel-injected, supercharged Chrysler-powered entry and has hit 168 miles per hour on special fuel and 154 on gasoline.

North-South Duel
Rivalry Possible
In Centennial Race

Entries continue to come in for this week end's Centennial Gas Championship and indications look toward a duel to develop between northern and southern contestants.

Never in the history of drag racing in Oregon, it is thought, has such a large number of challengers from both north and south been entered in one meet.

Topping the California entry list is the famous Glass Slipper dragster from Sacramento. Owned by Ed Cottapassi and Doug Butler this car is making a return engagement after winning top honors here in 1957. Powered by a fuel-injected supercharged

Chevrolet engine and a body made of fiberglass this sleek speedster has recorded speeds in excess of 160 miles per hour on California drag strips this year.

The Slipper holds the local strip record in "B" dragster at 134 mph.

Besides being a consistent winner both for performance and beauty the Glass Slipper holds the world record for average speed over a one kilometer distance for class "C" vehicles.

167 Top Speed
Another outstanding dragster coming from California is Paul Sutherlin, Walnut Creek, Calif., driving a very potent supercharged Chrysler-powered "A" class dragster.

Sutherlin's machine has sped to a top speed of 167 mph and holds the mark at Redding, Calif., at 154 mph.

Top roadster entry from the south may be the Hansen "707" Special, also from Walnut Creek. Hansen's Chrysler-powered 1929 Model A has reached speeds of over 140 mph and has records on three southern strips.

From the north entries are so numerous an outstanding machine would be hard to choose. From Tacoma, Wash., will be the Day and Night Special, another Chrysler-powered entry that registered speeds in excess of 160 mph at Shelton, Wash., last week end.

Portland is sending several competition machines including an Oldsmobile powered streamliner that has recorded speeds of over 150 mph. Tom DeLon's 130 mph modified roadster powered by a Packard engine, Chuck Blanchard's "B" class gas dragster, and a twin-engine motorcycle capable of speeding to over 125 mph.

From Vancouver, Wash., comes a car club, the Slo-Poks, running at least 14 different classes. Their machines could break many of the strip records.

Time trials will commence at noon on Saturday and run throughout the afternoon and again Sunday morning after 8 a.m. Eliminations will be held Sunday afternoon.

Salem Squares
NWL Playoff

Salem, Ore.—(UPI)—Bailey Brem hit a home run and pitched an effective eight-hitter Wednesday night to lead Salem to a 6-4 victory over Yakima in a Northwest league playoff game here.

The Salem win evened the series at one game apiece. It also snapped Salem's 10-game losing streak which stretched back into the regular season and halted Yakima's 11 game winning skein.

OSC Beavers Could
Be Surprise Eleven

Corvallis—UPI—Coach Tommy Prothro can come up with a top-flight tailback and fullback Jim Stinette stays healthy, the Oregon State Beavers might prove to be one of the West's football surprises this fall.

Oregon State, an independent this year after the breakup of the PCC, had a 5-6 record last season. It lost all American tackle Ted Bates, who was half a team in himself, plus fullback Nub Beamer and sometimes great halfback Paul Lowe.

So the Beavers have been generally passed by in early season rankings. But Prothro frankly expects to do better than last season despite a tough schedule which starts off with highly-regarded Southern California and includes Michigan, Nebraska, California, Washington and Oregon among others.

Many Tailbacks
First off, Prothro has enough tailback or halfback-

candidates for two or three teams. And most of them at one time or another have shown great promise. Oregon State uses the single wing so the tailback is the key position on offense.

Secondly, Stinette, who now weighs a solid 215 pounds, is rated as potentially better than Beamer, who left lineman flat on their backs from Los Angeles to Seattle. The trouble is that Stinette has been subject to injury—he reported for practice this fall with a sprained ankle—and Prothro is afraid to build his hopes too high too soon.

No less than six potential first-string tailbacks are out. Dainard Paulson, who was the regular most of last season, may be moved to fullback to back up Stinette. Leon Crier, a baseball pitcher, may play catcher at an end position.

Grimm Mason, who had the job nailed down last year before he hurt a knee, might go to right half. There also is Larry Sanchez, a 1957 letterman, and Earl Harbin. Right now Mason is nursing another knee injury.

Kasso May Be Key
But the key man in this slot may be Don Kasso, a sophomore from Berkeley. Kasso is considered the best all-around passer on the team and does everything else well.

Amos Marsh of Wallowa has looked sharp at wingback. There are 19 holdover lettermen, plus Sanchez and end George Thompson, 1957 award winners. The bulk of the line probably will be co-captain Ed Kaohelaui pronounced (Koa-la-lee) from Honolulu. He teamed with Bates at tackle last season to give Oregon State two of the best in the west. Also back are rugged Bruce Hake, 212, at center; George Enderle, 206, and Sonny Sanchez, 212, at guard. Howard Hogan probably will take Bates' place.

Jerry Doman and Don Theil, the probable starting ends, are strong defensively but have not shown too much ability in pass catching.
