Secret Microscope Flown To States

Houston, Tex.—UPI—A new electron microscope—so powerful and so secret that it was flown from West Germany with elaborate security precautions—is now in use at the Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston.

The high-powered instrument magnifies electronically up to 160,000 times. With photographic enlargement, a magnification of up to two million is possible.

The new \$28,000 instrument will be used at Baylor in research and training studies of the ultra-structure of both plant and human cells.

"No cell can escape its powerful eye," Dr. J. C. Hampton said. "It lends itself to experimental biology as well as use in clinical investigation of specimens taken at biopsy, and can be used as a diagnostic tool."

Unlike the conventional microscope, the electron microscope utilizes an electrostatic or electromagnetic field as a lens. In this particular model, there are five such lenses.

Law Stacked Against Man Who Gave Up U.S. Citizenship

Washington—UPI—Nicholas Petrulli, who renounced his American citizenship in hopes of becoming a Soviet national but now regrets it, appeared today to be a man without a country.

State Department legal experts called the case unprecedented. They searched for ways to help Petrulli out of his dilemma but said the law seemed stacked against the Valley Stream, N. Y., man who got carried away by what he saw in Russia as a tourist.

Tests Predict Future Suicides

Cincinnati, Ohio—(Science Service)—Personality tests can be used to predict which mental patients will later attempt or succeed in killing themselves. How to predict suicide was described to the American Psychological Association here by two research teams from Veterans hospitals in Los Angeles, Calif., Durham, N. C., and Brockton, Mass.

Significant answers to the standard "MMPI" personality test were found to characterize persons who later showed various kinds of suicidal behavior, Drs. Norman L. Farberow and Edwin S. Shneidman of VA Center, Los Angeles, told the meeting.

The well known Rorschach ink blot test can be used to spot the person who may wind up a suicide, Drs. Paul G. Daston of VA Hospital, Durham, N. C., and George A. Sakheim of VA Hospital, Brockton, Mass., reported.

One way of scoring the test classified correctly 83 per cent of non-suicidal mental patients, 72 per cent of those who later tried to kill themselves and 82 per cent of those who were actually successful suicides.

Sheriff's Office Doubts Housewife Hit by Plane Part

Los Angeles—UPI—The sheriff's office said today it has a statement casting doubt on a claim that a housewife was struck by a piece of a wing-flap that fell off a Boeing 707 jetliner.

Gilbert Gessler said he found his wife, Evelyn, 28, unconscious in the backyard of their home Monday night shortly after the wing piece broke off from an American Airlines jet landing at International Airport near the Gessler home.

Mrs. Gessler was taken to a hospital and remained there under observation. But attendants said she showed no sign of having suffered an injury.

Different Versions
 Detective Sgt. Claude Everly said Gessler has given several different versions of the accident. He also revealed a neighbor signed a statement claiming Mrs. Gessler was in her home when the small wing section fell into the Gessler yard.

Mrs. Olivia Carr said she saw a man walk into the yard, pick up the section and take it into the Gessler home.

Everly said he would continue his investigation "then take the facts to the district attorney for his consideration in issuing a complaint against Gessler for issuing a false report."

Jordan Valley Family Said To Be Missing

Jordan Valley, Ore.—UPI—A Jordan Valley hotel operator, his wife and a nine-year-old girl are reported by state police to have disappeared while on vacation.

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Huddleston and the girl, Susan Dickens, left here six weeks ago on vacation. They planned to take two weeks. They notified persons in Portland they were leaving for that city Aug. 8 from Carmel, Calif., but never arrived in Portland.

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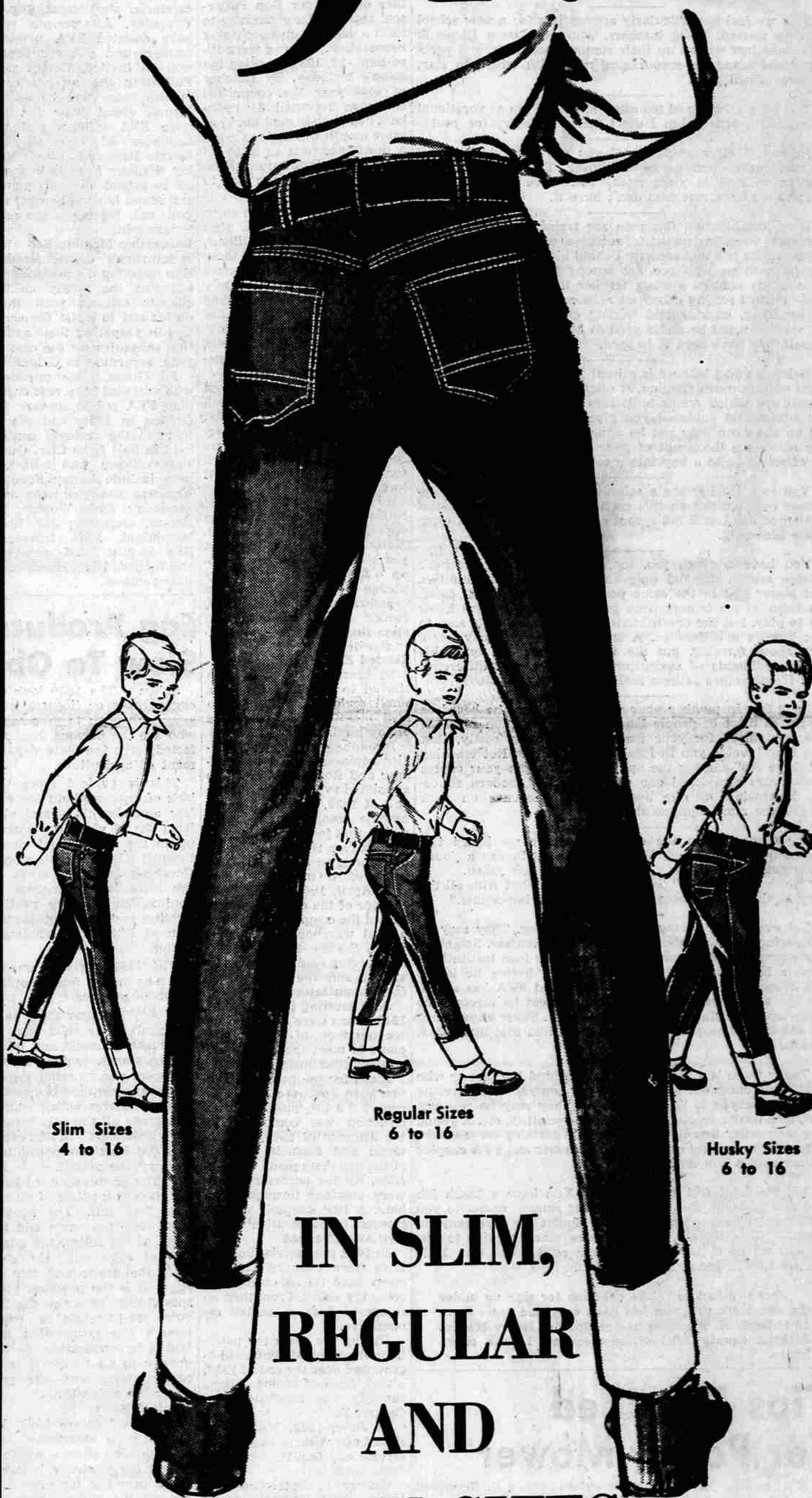
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
