Net Crown Captured By Fraser

Forest Hills, N.Y. — (UPI) — Australian Neale Fraser, the new U.S. amateur tennis champion, and runner-up Alex Olmedo of Peru both had a hopeful if slightly jaundiced eye on the professional net game today.

Fraser moved into the center of the play-for-pay picture Sunday when he upset Olmedo's \$100,000 pro appearance by beating the tawny Peruvian for the U.S. crown, 6-3, 5-7, 6-2, 6-4.

The only difficulty was that Olmedo, the Wimbledon champion, apparently had blown his big offer by losing the U.S. title and nobody has ever made Fraser an offer.

Complicating the whole situation was the fact that pro net czar Jack Kramer had his entourage flailing for francs in Paris so that he wasn't on hand to tell either the victorious Fraser or the disappointed Olmedo — who had the excuse of a sore shoulder in the finals — just how matters stood.

But both men were willing. Fraser, the fourth straight Australian to wear the U.S. crown felt, quite naturally, that Olmedo's excuse of a sore shoulder had little to do with the outcome on a day in which Brazil's Maria Bueno took the women's crown with a 6-1, 6-4 win over England's Christine Truman.

White Sox Gain 5 1/2 Games-Margin; Dusty Rhodes Shines for Giants

The White Sox have a new magic number and the Giants an old magic name today as the major league pennant races go into their final two weeks.

The White Sox virtually clinched the American league pennant race when they zoomed into a 5 1/2 game lead Sunday while the Giants inched closer to the National league flag by opening a two-

game bulge on two other contenders.

For the White Sox, the "magic number" is six—meaning that any combination of Chicago victories and Cleveland losses which total six clinches the Sox' first flag in 40 years.

And the old "magic name" for the Giants is Dusty Rhodes — pinchhitter par excellence of the 1954 world champions who drove in the only run in San Francisco's 1-0 triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies.

His Rare Homer
Billy Goodman's first homer in two years provided the margin of the White Sox' 3-1 win over the Boston Red Sox and the second-place Cleveland Indians saw their hopes practically disappear when they suffered 2-1 and 1-0 losses to the New York Yankees. The Giants picked up ground on both their rivals when the Pittsburgh Pirates

beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-3 and the Cincinnati Reds downed the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2.

Goodman's homer, following a walk to Jim Landis, came in the fourth inning and gave the White Sox a 3-0 lead.

Jack Sanford pitched five-hit ball for 8 2/3 innings and Mike McCormick retired the last Philadelphia batter for the Giants. The Giants scored the game's only run in the second inning when they filled the bases with one out. Then Rhodes, batting for Danny O'Connell, delivered a sacrifice fly.

Mickey Mantle's two-run 11th inning homer gave the Yankees a come-from-behind win in the opener with Cleveland and then Duke Maas pitched a six-hitter for his 13th triumph.

The Pirates sank the Dodgers on solo homers by Roman Mejias, Bob Skinner, Dick Stuart and Hank Folles plus a sturdy nine-hit pitching job by Ron Kline.

Eddie Kasko's fourth single of the game drove in Eddie Robinson with the run that enabled the Reds to ruin Warren Spahn's bid for his 20th victory of the year and recording 266th of his career.

The Kansas City Athletics defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 9-5 in 10 innings and 4-1, and the Washington Senators beat the Detroit Tigers, 2-1, in other American league games while the Chicago Cubs whipped the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-0, in the other National league game.

Milwaukee, LA Collide

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The Milwaukee Braves arrived in town for a two-game series with the Dodgers starting tonight that could knock either of them out of the pennant race.

Don Drysdale, the quick tempered but hard-throwing star of the Dodger mound staff, got the call tonight. Drysdale (16-12) has a 3-2 record against the Braves this season and a 11-3 lifetime mark.

Opposing him will be Bob Buhl (12-9) one of the key men in the Milwaukee late season drive.

Both the Braves and Dodgers were beaten Sunday. Los Angeles dropped a 4-3 decision to Pittsburgh who found the range for four homers. The Braves fell before Cincinnati, 3-2, leaving the San Francisco Giants two games in front.

San Francisco Spirits High
San Francisco — (UPI) — Their lead back at a fat two games, their spirits high and their confidence great, the San Francisco Giants opened a two-game series with the Cincinnati Reds here today.

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Washington Husky Voice Will Have Growl Again

Seattle, Wash. — (UPI) — The University of Washington Husky's voice will be a growl this coming football season instead of the frightened puppy's whimper it has been for a number of years past—at least coach Jim Owens thinks so.

"This is the best team I've had in the three years I've been at Washington," said Owens. "This bunch has a grown-up together. Most of them came in as freshmen in 1957, our first year here; last fall, as sophomores, they had to carry most of the load."

"As a result they have developed a unity and closeness which is going to be one of their best assets this season," Helped By Transfers

In addition, Owens said, his squad has been helped by the addition of "some pretty good sophomores and junior college transfers." This will give the Huskies some depth which they lacked last year.

As of now, Owens plans to field a starting unit of 10 juniors and one sophomore when

Washington opens the season against Colorado Sept. 19. The starting line will average 210 pounds and the backfield 175.

Actually, Owens considers his first two units to be of equal strength. They will alternate and play about the same amount of time.

It has been evident in the early practice sessions that the Huskies' passing game is being sharpened up. Washington was woefully weak in the air last year.

Owens has had his quarterbacks working on various pass patterns and plans even more work on the aerial attack during the final days of practice.

The Washington coach said he will vary his split-T formation somewhat this year by using a halfback flanked out wide and a split end on many plays.

Veteran Bob Hivner has been calling signals for the Number 1 unit. He is backed up by Bob Schloredt, another of the 25 lettermen on the Husky squad, and Kermit Jorgensen, who is up from the 1958 frosh team.

Experienced halfbacks include Brent Wooten, Don Milich, Carver Gayton, George Fleming, and Don McKeta. Sophomore Lee Bernhardt and Sam Hurworth, a junior, are the leading fullback candidates.

Al (the Horse) Barnes, frosh from Crater, scored the White tally on a 35-yard sweep around right end and followed up the gallop with a quick dive over the right end for the extra point.

John Harvey, the latest Medford rookie to turn out, picked up a fumble in the white backfield and sped straight ahead for the 30-yard score the losers gained. A kick for the conversion was low.

Rain Hurts Passing
The rain that splattered the field off and on was the first that the players had seen this season and as a result the passing attacks of both teams was none too successful.

Under Locke and Ballard, the Whites hit on only six of 15 aerials and the Reds under Jack Brown connected on three of 14.

Trade Strengthens Cardinals For 1959 Pro Gridiron Season

Chicago — (UPI) — Coach Frank Ivy has shuffled his Chicago Cards like a riverboat gambler, and the way things are going, he might wind up with a prize jackpot, even the National Football league championship.

By trading star halfback Ollie Matson to the Los Angeles Rams in a multi-player deal, Ivy picked up enough manpower to strengthen both his offense and his defense. The Cardinals, in the exhibition season, have looked like a rejuvenated eleven.

One of the results of the trade was to install Ken Pinfill, a 275-pound tackle, in the offensive line. He's turned into a sparkplug that's molded the whole crew into a far more rugged unit than it was in the past.

Conrad To Offense
Equally important, it enabled Ivy to switch Bobby Joe Conrad from defense to his offensive backfield, and the second year man from Texas A&M has been a stand-out.

Added experience has made King Hill, another second year player, a promising quarterback. Hill has been passing better, running better and calling plays better during the training season.

In the other two backfield slots, Ivy has been impressed by performances made by fullback Mal Hammack and halfback John Crow who matched all his press clippings as a rookie last season until a leg injury put him out of action.

The defense looks better too, largely because of added experience and maybe more desire.

Ivy was enthusiastic about the prospects.

Rams Clip SF Eleven

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The Los Angeles Rams wind up their pre-season exhibition football games Saturday night in the Coliseum against the Philadelphia Eagles.

The Rams will be facing an old team late in the Eagle lineup — quarterback Norm Van Brocklin. And they'll need all the offensive know-how they displayed Saturday night against the San Francisco Forty Niners when they come up against the Dutchman.

The Rams gained 359 yards on the ground and 141 yards in the air in the clash at the Coliseum to humble San Francisco 48-14 before 59,552 fans.

The Ram defense held the Forty Niners to 63 yards on the ground and 181 in the air to put on their fin de defensive display so far in the pre-season tilts.

Before the first half was over the Rams scored six times, capitalizing mainly on Forty Niners miscues and their own strong offensive game. The Rams were leading 41-7 by the end of the half.
