Rain Ruins Cause for Vancouver

If the Vancouver Mounties start screaming "we wuz robbed" you can hardly blame them.

But for three rained out games the Mounties might have tied the Salt Lake City Bees for the Pacific Coast league pennant.

PCL action ended Sunday with the Mounties clipping Seattle 7-0 in an oddy speeded up affair while Salt Lake City was whipped by Sacramento, 5-3.

That put the Bees just one and a half games in front of the second place Mounties. And the Bees' slim lead was picked up in the win column. Both clubs lost 69 games over the campaign, but the Bees won 85 to 82 for Vancouver.

Vancouver General Manager Cedric Tallis did everything he could to get League President Leslie O'Connor to reschedule the three rained out games. When O'Connor said it couldn't be done, Tallis appealed to the club owners, asked for a vote. They backed up O'Connor. So the Bees are the kingpins, but don't be surprised if Mr. Tallis raises a mild uproar at the next league meeting.

That Vancouver-Seattle affair Sunday took just one hour and 15 minutes. For fun, because the game didn't mean a thing both clubs concentrated on hitting the first pitch. The Mounties established themselves as infinitely superior to the Rainiers in this experiment. They rapped 15 safeties while Seattle could get only four off George Bamberger. It was Bamberger's 11th win against seven losses. Perry Homers Twice

Bob Perry closed out the season with a bang as he smashed a pair of tremendous homers to bat in all of Sacramento's five runs in their conquest of the league champs. The clouts were No. 19 and 20 for Perry. Winston Brown went all the way for the Sacs, bringing his record to 15-14 for the season.

Other PCL action saw Spokane defeat Portland, 7-3. Don Domenichelli and Al Norris each batted in three runs to lead the Indians to their win. Norris belted a three run homer in the seventh to erase a 3-1 Beaver lead. Domenichelli ripped a three run triple in the eighth.

The San Diego Padres clinched third place with a 5-4 win over Phoenix in the only night game. It was the last PCL game to be played in Phoenix and an expected small crowd of 541 was on hand.

MARILYN WINS
Memphis, Tenn. (UPI)—Marilyn Smith of Wichita, Kan., dropped a 25-foot putt on the 16th hole Sunday to break a tight three-way battle and win the \$7,500 Memphis Women's Open golf tournament. The blonde Kansas golfer finished with a three-under-par 70 and a 72-hole total of 295. Mickey Wright of San Diego and Bonnie Randolph of Columbus, Ohio, tied for second place with 297.

Spiegelberg reported that he and his staff were particularly pleased with the play in the defensive line of "new boys." Reggie Breeze, middle guard, and John James, tackle. Work of Terry Earl and Skip Bennett backing up the line drew plaudits. The coach reported that Dennis Jensen did a fine job at defensive end and that Lynn Knight worked "okeh" at his tackle slot. Knight also did some fine punting for the Black Tornado.

Play of end Lowell Dean and linebacker Jerry Anderson on defense was highlighted when Dean blocked a punt and Anderson recovered the ball for a touchdown.

To Stick With Platoons
The Tornado completed just two of 11 passes but one, by Calvin Dean to twin brother Lowell, was good for 43 yards and a touchdown.

Spiegelberg said he alternated his "go" and "shock" offensive platoons until the later stages of the game when players mixed in the action. A total of 41 Tornadoes got into the fracas. The tutor said he planned to stick with his unit offense plan for the Marshfield game at Coos Bay next Saturday night. He stated that he'd like to have a complete defensive club of gridders who do not play offense. With the exception of Calvin Dean, the defensive platoon draws players from each of the offensive units.

The Medford coach said he thought the Tornado came through the Beaver scrap without injury. Al Funston, fullback and linebacker, who suffered an injured knee in practice, got into the tussle but the knee did not hold up, Spiegelberg reported.

Medford will have its labors cut out for it on Saturday. That was shown by Marshfield's 39 to 6 victory Friday over Prineville, a score contrary to the 6 to 0 circulated Saturday. Scouts reported the Pirates of Coos Bay with a 201-pound average line and 181-pound average backfield. A 214 fullback, Don Austin, entered the Friday contention for Marshfield and looked good.

Marshfield struck three touchdowns in its first 12 offensive plays against the Cowboys.

Van Guides Eagles in Colt Upset

Coach Buck Shaw of the Philadelphia Eagles is realistic enough not to be expecting miracles in the 1959 National Football league campaign, but if he's strutting a little today, you can't exactly blame him.

With Norm Van Brocklin pitchin' and little Tommy McDonald catchin' the Eagles soared to a surprising 35-14 victory over the champion Baltimore Colts Sunday in the biggest form reversal thus far in NFL exhibition play.

Van Brocklin, who can carry a team a long way if he gets a little help, did exactly that against the Colts. The 33-year-old Dutchman, who completed 198 of 374 passes, high for the league in both respects last year, made good on 15 of 28 attempts Sunday.

Three TD Passes
And McDonald, former All-America from Oklahoma, snagged three of them for TD's.

The 14 points scored by the Colts represented a low for the club in exhibition play, but it can be attributed to the absence of the game of No. 1 quarterback Johnny Unitas, who sat it out while Ray Brown was given a chance to run the club.

In Sunday's only other game, the Detroit Lions defeated the Cleveland Browns, 31-28, on Tobin Rote's two last quarter touchdowns passes to John Henry Johnson.
In Saturday night action, the Los Angeles Rams buried the San Francisco Forty-Niners, 48-14, with John Arnett and Tommy Wilson scoring twice each, and the Green Bay Packers edged the Washington Redskins, 20-13. Paul Hornung was the Green Bay hero, scoring two touchdowns and booting two field goals.

Ed Machen, Besmanoff Vie in Ring

New York (UPI)—Two heavy-weight fights top this week's boxing schedule. Both will be televised.
Eddie Machen of Redding, Calif., fourth-ranked heavy-weight contender, is favored at 3-1 to defeat unrated Willie Besmanoff of Germany and Milwaukee at the Portland, Ore., Auditorium, Wednesday night.

Machen has suffered but one loss and one draw in his 31 professional bouts. He was knocked out last year by Johansson. A good puncher, Eddie scored 18 kayoes. Besmanoff's 30-16-7 record includes 14 knockouts.

Friday's TV-radio 10-rounder brings together Alonzo Johnson, 10th-rated heavy-weight contender, at the Baltimore Coliseum.

Johnson of Braddock, Pa., is favored at 7-5 because he lost but two of his 19 fights. Johnson is a replacement for Willie Pastrano, who suffered a knee injury in training.
