Summary of New Act Included With Checks

All veterans, widows and orphans receiving pensions from the Veterans administration will receive their September checks a summary of the Veterans Pension Act of 1959, enacted by Congress and recently signed by President Eisenhower, S. T. Brannock, contact representative, VA Domiciliary, Camp White, said today.

Brannock said that plans for putting the new program into effect emphasized these facts:

1. The new law does not go into effect until July 1, 1960.
2. It applies only to non-service-connected pensions and will have no effect on service-connected compensation payments.

3. Veterans now drawing pensions will not have their benefits changed unless they choose to apply under the new law for increased benefits. Their choice is final.

Since there will be ample time to make application, Brannock urged veterans and veterans' families not to write to VA about their individual cases. Such correspondence will delay the processing of veterans' claims.

All who do not receive the summary of the new law with their September checks may be assured the new law does not apply to them, he said.

The new law provides that the amount of pension will be based on the amount of other income which the veteran or dependent receives, Brannock said. The greater the other income, the lower the pension and vice versa.

The new law will govern all applications for pensions after July 1, 1960. Those already on the pension rolls will be affected only if they choose to change over to the new system.

Those having a choice under the new law will be invited to make it with care after they are familiar with the provisions, because any change received by the VA is irrevocable. Those who change to the new system will not be permitted to return to the present system.

Morse To Question Soviet Premier on Peaceful Intentions

Washington—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) says he feels his effort to keep Congress in session until Soviet Premier Khrushchev arrived in Washington was worth the criticism he has suffered in view of Khrushchev's scheduled meeting Wednesday with the Senate foreign relations committee.

Morse said he is "very pleased" that he and other senators will have this opportunity for a frank give and take with the Russian leader, and that Congress won't appear to be "on the defensive" in leaving town just before Khrushchev arrived.

"I intend to participate in the questioning of Khrushchev," Morse declared. "We can put our country on the offensive in this meeting, and that's the position I want my country to be in."

The main question Morse said he intends to press with the Premier is "Why Russia doesn't square her claims of peaceful intentions with her acts."

"My attitude is that if you are interested in peace, Mr. Khrushchev, it's up to you," Morse said.

He said he planned to ask Khrushchev when Russia will

be willing to accept the complete jurisdiction of the World Court in the settlement of international disputes. "There is no other alternative to power politics," he averred. "Either do it this way or I don't see how war can be avoided."

Morse said he may attend an inter-parliamentary conference in Australia this fall to discuss this very point, continuing where he left off at the conference in India he attended as a U. S. delegate year before last.

No Indication of Steel Settlement
New York—(UPI)—Top industry and union negotiating teams resumed negotiations in the 63-day-old steel strike today with no indication either side is ready for a compromise settlement.

Twelve subcommittees of the bargaining steel companies and the United Steelworkers of America continued talks on local plant rules.

R. Conrad Cooper, executive vice president of the U.S. Steel Corp. and head of the industry's four-man chief bargaining team, charged today that the major bar to reaching a settlement is union refusal to accept technological progress.

USW President David J. McDonald said the charge was "utterly ridiculous." He said steel production before the strike had been at an all-time high with fewer workers than ever before.

Fire Puts KF Station Off Air
