

Khrushchev Gets Cool New York Reception

Phoenix, Talent Patrons Favor Consolidation

Canvass of Votes Scheduled Soon

Patrons of both the Phoenix and Talent school districts yesterday voted by substantial margins for the districts' consolidation, according to final but unofficial returns.

The voting in the Phoenix district represented a major switch from the election last May 20, when consolidation was defeated there by a close margin. Yesterday's unofficial totals in Phoenix were: Yes, 436; No, 323.

In the Talent district, where the proposal was approved May 20, the returns yesterday showed: Yes, 186; No, 57. This margin, more than 3-1, was considerably wider than the 2-1 result last May.

Canvass Voting

The Jackson county school district boundary board has 10 days after receiving the sealed election returns to canvass the voting and make the results official. If the canvass indicates approval of consolidation in each district, the boundary board must notify each school board at once.

Then, before another 10 days pass, it must declare the official consolidation.

The polls yesterday were open from 2 to 8 p.m. Officials reported things went smoothly, with no recurrence of the disturbances at the Phoenix polling place last May.

In both districts, the turnout was smaller than before. Observers attributed this among other things to a reduction in the volume and heat of pre-election campaigning.

Cast Ballots

Well over half the estimated 1,265 registered voters in the Phoenix district cast ballots. Fall harvesting, it is understood, kept very few away.

Some 60 names had been dropped from the Phoenix registration list following the Sept. 8 transfer of a sector north of Barnett rd. to the Medford school district.

While a majority of these voters, it is understood, opposed consolidation with Talent, their disqualification was not enough in itself to effect such a large shift in voting compared to the May 20 election.

An official observer remarked that a large number of persons who cast ballots last spring did not show up yesterday, while a number who did vote yesterday had not appeared last spring. In addition, this observer said, a substantial number of voters who marked their ballots "No" in the first election, indicated they were switching to the affirmative yesterday.

Opposition to consolidation in the Phoenix district was divided into two camps, it is understood: those wanting the district to remain independent and those who preferred consolidation with the Medford district. Yesterday's returns were interpreted to indicate a thinning in the ranks of the "keep Phoenix independent" group.

Meanwhile, the county boundary board and reorganization committee were preparing an official answer to the circuit court suit filed Monday by Mrs. Bertha W. Gammill, Phoenix district patron, in which they are defendants. Mrs. Gammill asks that the court declare the May 20 election binding and nullify yesterday's vote.

Ross is a member of the National Trust, the College Art association, and the American Institute of Architects and other organizations.

Mail Tribune Joins UPI Newspictures Wirephoto Service

The Mail Tribune today introduces to its readers the world's fastest newspapers service, United Press International facsimile.

From sending stations in more than 100 cities throughout the country as well as from across the Atlantic and Pacific and from South America, photographs of the day's biggest news events will roll in.

Within minutes from the time the pictures are filed, the Mail Tribune will have them in its newsroom.

The UPI picture network comprises 30,000 miles of leased long distance telephone wires that criss-cross the nation, and the UPI facsimile machine, an electronic device which can copy, at no matter what distance, any picture transmitted on those wires, in seven minutes.

Tiny Beam of Light

Starting in an upper corner of the photograph, the sending machine sends a tiny beam of light on a spot in the picture. If that spot is white or gray, the reflection of the light beam will generate within the machine and transfer to a telephone line connected with it, an electrical impulse of a certain force. If the spot is darker, the impulse will be of darker strength.

The instant the light beam hits the picture, it is transmitted to a machine in the Mail Tribune newsroom, which sets in motion the facsimile copying process.

The spot of light moves slowly along a horizontal track below a whirling cylinder.

Mostly Silent Treatment Given Traveling Russian

Scattered Boos Heard Along Route

New York — (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said today President Eisenhower had shown great political wisdom by taking the not universally approved step of inviting the Russian leader to America.

"We respect him for his role in World War II as an ally," Khrushchev said, "and my respect has grown because to have invited me here called for will power."

"Not a very American would have made this step," Khrushchev said.

"He is a great man, who understands great politics."

New York — (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev came to the nation's biggest city today and got another cold reception from a massive crowd that jammed the streets beneath towering skyscrapers.

A lunchtime crowd of almost 40,000 persons jammed the few blocks from Pennsylvania Station to Fifth ave. as the world's top Communist arrived for the beginning of his trans-American tour.

There was a polite clapping from a few persons and an occasional isolated cheer. But, as he had in Washington, Khrushchev again got mainly the silent treatment.

Khrushchev brought with him a new disarmament proposal which he will unveil Friday in a major speech to the United Nations.

The Premier, his wife, family and official party pulled into the railroad station at 7:54 a.m. (P.S.T.) after a trip from Washington. There he had told a national television audience Wednesday that he stuck by his prediction that Communism would bury capitalism.

Khrushchev flashed out of Pennsylvania Station in a closed limousine and he moved so fast many in the massive crowd were not even aware that he passed. Escorting police did not use their sirens.

Police Guard Premier

It took him only six minutes to reach the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel where he will stay in its Presidential Suite in the tower.

Security precautions were unprecedented. The police department assigned 3,300 men to guard the Premier in addition to a personal bodyguard of 12 six-footers plus his own and State Department secret agents.

Khrushchev waved from the black Cadillac to the crowds on his side of the car. They were some scattered boos.

Police took vigorous steps to prevent placards being raised, but some demonstrators succeeded anyway.

Satellite Shot Fails To Go Into Orbit

Cape Canaveral, Fla. — (UPI) — The United States apparently failed today in an effort to put a 265-pound global navigation satellite into orbit around the earth.

A tall Thor-Able rocket shot the satellite aloft at 6:34 a.m. (p.s.t.) but the defense department announced an hour later that the rocket's third stage apparently failed to fire, and "it must be assumed that the satellite did not orbit."

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Ike Says No Agreement Made With 'K'

President Doubts Americans Fooled By Predictions

Washington — (UPI) — President Eisenhower today firmly rejected Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's prediction that Communism will eventually replace democracy and capitalism in the world.

Eisenhower also told a news conference he has reached no agreement with Khrushchev to exclude Laos, or any other so-called "third country" from their forthcoming talks at Camp David, Md., following completion of the Soviet leader's cross-country tour.

Americans Not Fooled

The President said that no matter how sincere and colorful Khrushchev might appear to the public, he did not believe Americans would be fooled by the Russian leader's generous forecasts of Communist dominance in the world.

Khrushchev said Wednesday at the National Press Club that his oft-quoted remark that Communism would "bury" democracy was meant historically and was not meant to mean "the physical burial" of the American people.

Fix Agenda for Talks

Eisenhower said that, thus far, his conversations with Khrushchev had been confined to a general restatement of position and agreement on the agenda for the Camp David talks. Therefore, he said, it was not possible to detect any change in the basic Soviet position that has led to East-West tension.

Not True Bills Are Returned by Jury

Grants Pass — Two "not true bills" were returned by a Josephine county grand jury Tuesday in cases against Lewis Henry Lively, Ashland truck driver accused of negligent homicide in the deaths of a San Francisco couple.

Lively was slightly injured in a traffic accident Aug. 25 on Highway 99 north of Wolf Creek which took the lives of Earl William Callahan, 70, and his wife, Eva Gertrude, 61.

Hill-Burton Funds Approved for New Ashland Hospital

The state board of health Wednesday approved federal Hill-Burton fund grants to eight Oregon hospitals and related institutions, including \$157,173 for Ashland General hospital.

The funds last week were recommended by the board of health's advisory committee, and must now be approved by the surgeon general.

The board of health noted that institutions granted Hill-Burton funds must match \$2 of their own money to \$1 in federal grants not later than Jan. 15 and must award bids by May 1. If these conditions are not met, the spokesman said, the funds will revert and be reallocated.

Ashland City Superintendent E. C. Biegel explained today that the city's matching funds are to be sought through issuing general obligation bonds in the amount of \$350,000. He noted that while this plus the federal grant exceeded the \$471,520 estimated construction cost, another Hill-Burton stipulation is that the institution would have to prove it had the financial wherewithal to operate for one year.

The bond issue being a general obligation will require approval at the polls, Biegel continued. He said the city council would probably hold a special meeting in the near future to set an election date.

Dog 'Licks' Problem Of Opening Carton

The job of opening waxed cardboard milk cartons has stymied some persons but a large dog on the east side of Medford seems to have the problem "licked."

City police early today were notified by Norma R. Van Lamingham, 2211 Capital ave., that a large dog was stealing milk from her doorstep. The thefts during the week totaled about 17 quarts.

Reports show that as the patrolman was en route to the Van Lamingham residence he spotted the dog with a quart carton of milk in his mouth. The officer said that as he watched the dog put it down on the ground, gripped it firmly with his two front paws and promptly bit a hole in the carton. He proceeded to lap up the milk, pressing down on the end of the carton as the supply dwindled.

Police were able to obtain the dog license number.

Council to Call Rezoning Hearing

A variety of items will be considered at tonight's Medford city council meeting.

A call for a public hearing on the change of zone from Class IV limited light industrial to Class V light industrial for the Farr property fronting on North Pacific highway will be made, according to City Manager Robert Duff.

Plans and specifications for paving three streets will be considered as well as the acceptance and dedication as a part of the city's street and alley system Connell ave. and DeHague st.

The acceptance of three sewer and paving projects is expected, and an assessment for a sanitary sewer on Eastover terrace and Hillcrest rd. will be considered.

An extension of time request on the Berrydale sanitary sewer contract will also be considered. According to Duff, the 30-day extension request would coincide with the delay which was necessary prior to the start of work due to action by the city for acquisition of easements for the project.

Two requests for "no parking" on the north side of East Jackson st. in front of the Rogue Valley State bank and from Genesee st. to the first driveway on the west will be considered.

New York — (UPI) — The steel industry has rejected an offer by President Eisenhower to name a fact-finding board in the 65-day-old steel strike and hinted that it would not object to his use of the Taft-Hartley Law.
