Home Brewing Comeback Doubled

Cleveland—UPP—It's unlikely that the fine art of homebrewing will ever make a comeback.

Aside from the fact that the U.S. Alcohol Tax Unit frowns on the practice, its resumption is doubtful for another reason. Not only are supplies hard to find, but the art of homebrewing itself is an almost forgotten one.

Back in the early '20's, recipes flourished aplenty. But Prohibition went out in 1933 and many of those who brewed their own now have only a hazy recollection of how they did it.

The formula is relatively simple once the supplies are ready.

Mix one gallon of hop-flavored malt syrup with five pounds of sugar and a teaspoonful of salt with two gallons of water in one crock as the first step.

Next add the first mixture to three gallons of water in another crock. Add one cake of yeast and allow the concoction to ferment in a warm place, bottling on the fifth day while it's still fermenting to assure carbonization.
