

Quarterback Will Feel Pressure

Berkeley—(UPI)—There will be plenty of pressure on California's quarterback Larry Parque when the Bears open their season against Washington State in Spokane Saturday night.

Parque is the inexperienced unknown quantity who will be attempting to fill the shoes of the incomparable Joe Kapp, since graduated.

Last year, with Kapp, the Bears shocked the experts by racking up a 7-3 mark and going to the Rose Bowl.

With the exception of Kapp and Jack Hart, a slick running halfback, the whole team is returning.

Bear Coach Pete Elliott says the Bears can repeat their Pacific Coast conference crown if they get good quarterbacking. So, the job is squarely in the hands of Parque, a 20 year old, 195 pound junior who was Kapp's No. 1 replacement last season. Parque is strong and rated good on defense.

Proof Needed
In Elliott's split-T system, the quarterback carries most of the offensive load, and Parque will have to prove himself as a passer and a runner under game fire.

If Parque can't make it, then Elliott will call on Wayne Crow, who lettered at left half last season. Crow has been hampered by injuries this fall but is expected to be ready for the Cougars. He is a good runner and passer but has never played the position before. Still, he could take over the first string job before the season is too old.

The Bears figure to get a good test Saturday against the Cougars.

"We destroyed their Rose Bowl chances last year and you can bet they will be out to get even," says Elliott.

The blond Bear mentor said Washington State will be presenting a more balanced attack than last season when Bobby Newman and Company put their aerial circus on display.

The Bears will again be predominantly a running team and they have an abundance of good backs. Grover Garvin, a 190 pound swift, and Walt Arnold, a powerful 218 pounder who can also run, will handle the halfback posts. Billy Patton, a fierce blocker and solid defensive worker, will work from the fullback spot.

Speedy Help
Behind these men, the Bears have depth in halfbacks Steve Pates, John Blaylock and soph speedster Bob Willis, a 9.8 sprinter. Dave Maggard, a 220 pound fullback, will spell Patton.

The Californians have real strength up front having lost only one second string tackle from last season's first two units.

Elliott has been working on a rock-ribbed defense this fall and he seems to have the tools.

The veteran line will probably be composed of Terry Jones at center; Pete Domoto and Jeff Snow at guards; Pat Newell and Frank Sally at tackles; and Skip Huber and Gael Barsotti at ends. Only Barsotti, who sat out a year after transferring from San Diego State, was not a first stringer last year.

And behind these men, Elliott has plenty of good replacements.

Coast Champion Hardtop Races Set for Sunday

Portland—The sixth annual Pacific Coast championships for the "full modified" hardtop racing cars, will be held Sunday afternoon at the Portland speedway.

A banner field of over 50 of the fastest hardtop on the Pacific Coast will start action when time trials get underway at noon. Only the 50 fastest qualifiers will compete when the racing events get underway at 2 p.m.

A guaranteed purse of \$2,000 added, will be on the line in the 200 lap championship main event with the winner being guaranteed a minimum of \$500.

Entries to date include cars from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California. Oregon reps will come from Portland, Salem, Gervais, Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Eugene, Medford, Roseburg, Coquille, Cottage Grove, Klamath Falls and Coos Bay.

Washington representation will be from Vancouver, Tacoma, Seattle, Spokane, Sunnyside, Yakima, Ellensburg, Auburn and Enumclaw. Idaho cars will be from Lewiston and Boise while California will be represented from Eureka and Crescent City.

At least 15 different racing associations will be represented with cars being allowed to run under their own rules. Gates open at 11 a.m.

St. Louis—(UPI)—Charley Share, a regular with the St. Louis Hawks since 1955, has retired from National Basketball association competition. Club officials had announced earlier they planned to trade the Hawk team captain.

The tutor reported that Alex Mete, a halfback last year, had returned to the squad but suffered a back injury the first time he packed the ball. Otherwise, he said, there were no serious ailments among the parochial school players.

Talent will have some new blood in the tussle, he said. Among the late starters for Bulldog drills who should see quite a bit of duty are Jerry Moore and Larry Walker at guards, and Bob Dickinson at end, and Bob Jacobs and Dave Grimes in the backfield.

Overlooked in pre-game mentions last week was Doyle Leek, a guard, who played most of the way against the Eagles and likely will start this Friday.

Portland State Upset Minded

Portland—Portland State goes gunning for an upset win over traditional cross-town rival Lewis and Clark Friday night in the second annual ViPi game at Multnomah stadium.

The Vikings, in their first season under head coach Hugh Smithwick, just missed stopping the Pioneers last season by the narrow margin of 35 seconds, as LC tallied the winning touchdown in a 12-7 victory with that amount of time remaining in the game.

PSC, which wound up with a record of four wins and five losses a year ago, will pin its upset hopes on an experienced, tough line and the passing of senior quarterback Ward Sayles and the running of junior halfback Henry Matias.

Sayles, who completed 35 passes last fall, and Matias, the Vikings' third-leading ground gainer in 1958, occupy key roles in Smithwick's version of the T-formation. Their starting mates in the backfield will probably be sophomore halfback Gary Hamblet and junior fullback Ken Humphrey.

Standouts up front for the Vikings are ends Sam Roberts, two-time all-conference choice and the nation's tenth-leading small college pass receiver last year, and Bob Grant, tackle Bob Wheeler, another two-time all-conference selection, and center Mickey Gray.

Portland Seeks Hoop Tourney

Portland—(UPI)—The Exposition-Recreation commission here wants to stage the class A-1 Oregon high school basketball tournament starting in 1961 at the new Memorial Coliseum here.

The tourney is now held at McArthur Court in Eugene.

The offer was made to the Oregon School Activities association. Don Jewell, manager of the Coliseum, said the OSAA appeared "reluctant to make a decision until the facility is completed."

Such a proposal would meet with strenuous opposition from Eugene.

WALK MARK BROKEN

Los Angeles—(UPI)—A new world walking record was claimed Wednesday by Bill Mihalo of Studie City, Calif., when he finished the 20,000-meter even in 1:24:01. The World Professional Walkers association said the old record of 1:27:36 was set by Gregory Panichkin of Russia last year.

Oregon Due 17 Democrat Votes

Washington—(UPI)—Oregon will have 17 full votes at the Democratic national convention in Los Angeles next July and will be able to send a 52-member delegation.

This was decided Wednesday in a meeting of the Democratic National committee. Thirty-two Oregon delegates will be elected. Two will be C. Girard Davidson, Democratic national committeeman, and Mrs. Virginia Grant, national committeewoman. In addition, 18 alternates will be permitted.

Oregon had 16 votes at the last Democratic convention. Americans have a choice of about 200 different ice cream flavors and more are added every year.

Coach Jack Woodward reported that Gerald Sloper, quarterback, and Doug James, center, from last year's squad are now on hand full time for practices and that the squad is now up to 26 players. Neither of the two made the trip to Mt. Shasta, Calif., last Friday.

Brown To Carry Bulk of Load Again for Cleveland's Team

Cleveland, Ohio—(UPI)—All-pro fullback Jimmy Brown will be carrying the bulk of the mail again this season when the Cleveland Browns try to deliver their eighth division crown in 10 years of National Football League competition.

The former Syracuse All-America almost carried Cleveland to the Eastern division title last season when he paced the league in rushing with a record march of 1,527 yards in 257 carries and tied the touchdown record with 18.

In the club's first five exhibition games this year, Brown, who was used sparingly to allow testing of the rookie crop, accounted for seven of the 11 Cleveland touchdowns. When the fleet 230-pounder can't run over you, he simply out-runs you.

But while Brown will remain the primary scoring weapon, there are indications Cleveland will pass more frequently in an effort to achieve a more balanced offense.

Plum's Third Season

Quarterback Milt Plum, the former Penn State star now in his third season in the pro league, finished second in passing last year primarily because he threw an average attempt for a total gain of 102.16 yards, 11 touchdowns and an average gain of 8.46 yards.

Behind Plum is Jim Ninowski, a second year pro from Michigan State. Ninowski started only one game last season, against Detroit, but he completed 8 of 17 passes for an average of 8.82 yards and a total of 139 yards. He

Guenther, 22, was Seattle's all-star champion in 1956-57 and bowler of the year for the same season. He had a 198 average. In 1957-1958 he had an average of 204 and won Seattle's recreation doubles title. He tied for fourth in American Bowling congress singles and finished 10th in the Masters tournament in 1957. Before discharge from the Army in July 1959, Guenther gained the all-Army singles title.

The Seattleite employs a five-step approach and rolls a semi-rubber ball. Foy Belcher, Glendale, Calif., also of the AMF staff, will appear in exhibition at the same time. The two visiting stars will take on two local men. An elimination runoff at Roxy Ann lanes is being held to determine the rivals for the AMF keggers. Guenther and Belcher will be available for instruction Saturday afternoon and evening and Sunday afternoon.

Formal ceremonies of the opening will be at 8 p.m. on Saturday. The 24-alley establishment is at 2375 South Pacific highway.

Weather Cuts Attendance in Northwest Loop

Portland—(UPI)—President Jim Fleishman of the Northwest league said today total attendance for the 1959 split-season was 324,613.

This compares to 363,942 last season. Fleishman said early season bad weather was to blame for the drop this year.

Eugene led the league in attendance with 67,386 followed by first-half champion Salem with 66,607.

The average attendance at 420 league games was 773, compared to 894 last year.

Fleishman also announced a league all-star team picked by representatives in each city.

Squaw Valley Maps Printed By Oil Company

Los Angeles—Presentation of 25,000 Tidewater Oil company pocket-sized maps of Squaw Valley, Calif., containing a wealth of Winter Olympic information has been made to Prentis C. Hale, San Francisco business leader, who heads the organizing committee of the forthcoming eighth Olympic Winter Games.

Prepared in color, the Tidewater map provides an illustrated representation of the Squaw Valley area plan for the games as well as a complete listing of events during the classic's ten days of international competition, February 18-28.

Roads leading to Squaw Valley are clearly shown on the map together with distances from principal California and Nevada communities to the site.

Additionally, the map has a brief history of the Olympic Winter Games including a description of the Squaw Valley location, situated seven miles from Lake Tahoe in the Sierra Nevada Range.
