Prothro said the Beaver grid squad would leave Corvallis Saturday by bus for Portland and their opener against Southern California. The team will arrive shortly before game time.

The Beaver mentor still has not announced a starting lineup.

The Southern California team was to fly to Portland from Los Angeles today and work out on Multnomah stadium, made soggy by a rain Thursday night.

Game time Saturday is 8 p.m.

Purdue, UCLA Collide Tonight In Major Grid Intersectional

College football muscles in on baseball for national attention tonight when Purdue and UCLA clash at Los Angeles in what has been billed as a possible preview of the next Rose Bowl game.

Purdue, favored in most quarters to win the Big Ten conference title and its accompanying bid to the Rose Bowl, is a 12-point choice for the season's first major intersectional clash, which is expected to attract a crowd of about 40,000 to the Coliseum.

In tonight's other major openers, Detroit is a 10-point favorite over George Washington and Florida is a seven-point choice over Tulane.

Television viewers will get an early peek at Louisiana State, last year's national champion when the Tigers entertain Rice in Saturday's feature attraction. LSU is a 13½-point favorite for its opener, which will be tele-

vised nationally NBC starting at 4:45 p.m. (e.d.t.). There will be several other interesting openers in the Southland in addition to the LSU-Rice conflict.

The Atlantic Coast Conference schedule opens with a bang with North Carolina entertaining Clemson, the defending champion, while Maryland hosts West Virginia, perennial kingpin of the Southern Conference.

Elsewhere Duke takes on South Carolina, Georgia meets Alabama, Kentucky runs into Georgia Tech, Virginia plays William and Mary, Wake Forest meets Florida State, and North Carolina State opens against Virginia Tech.

In the Southwest, the major openers include Arkansas vs. Tulsa, Texas A&M vs. Texas Tech, Texas Christian vs. Kansas, and Houston vs. Mississippi, while California opens against Washington State. Southern California tackles Oregon State, Washington meets Colorado and Stanford takes on Oregon on the West Coast.

Navy, Penn State and Pittsburgh get a jump on most Eastern teams who don't start their head-knocking until next week. The Middies make their debut under new Coach Wayne Hardin by playing dangerous Boston College, Pittsburgh visits Marquette, and Penn State plays Missouri.

Woods, Water, Wildlife

There are a number of wild stories making the rounds as to the size of the fall steelhead run now progressing up the river but they all agree on two things — the fish are many and they are taking flies quite readily. I caught my first steelhead on a fly using fly fishing gear just this last week and although the fish were small half-pounders it was a new fishing experience for me. It is easy to see why the old timers lament the passing of the time when there were plenty of fish to catch by this method.

THEY ARE BACK!
These same old timers ought to take a run down to the Galice area this next week end, or before if they can, and perhaps they will stop their lament long enough to catch fish again. The run is acclaimed to be the forerunner of the main bunch and since these early fish weigh up to 5 and 6 pounds the main bunch ought to have those 8-pounders we youngsters hear about that used to send Zane Grey into writing spasms. The Grants Pass fishermen are having a fine time and people who have rarely caught steelhead are catching them on flies. The flies I hear about are the golden demon, rogue river special, marche brown, red ant and bucktail coachman.

MY ERROR
Last week I wrote about the half-pounders and stated they didn't go up the river very far. This was not correct in that further research (I asked Cole Rivers) convinces me that some go as far as the counting board at Gold Ray dam and most of them use the middle section of the river as well as the tributaries. Very little is known as to how long they stay and as to whether or not they spawn while they are here. The reason for this is that there are nine different races of steelhead in the Rogue river and they all have distinctive life cycles. It is difficult to know just which pattern these particular fish belong to.

FISH PONDS
A report from P. W. Schneider, director, Oregon State Game Commission reveals that construction of steelhead and salmon rearing reservoirs along the upper Rogue river may be started soon. The beginning work on the reservoirs will get under way during the next two years because the Rogue has number one priority in this part of the state for the reservoir construction.

FOR SALMON, STEELHEAD
The purpose of the reservoirs is to supplement the state's hatchery production of summer steelhead and spring chinook. It is estimated that a total of 1,000 surface acres will be needed to satisfy the present and future needs of sports anglers on the Rogue. The reservoirs are expected to

raise 600 to 1,000 fish per acre. The eggs will be hatched at the hatchery and then the young will be placed in the reservoirs to fend for themselves. This method is supposed to eliminate or lessen the feeding and disease problems which continually plague hatchery production of these fish. It will cost less too.

THREE CHEERS!
Now that we know this is definitely going to come about, let's give the game commission three cheers for that number one priority. Let's hope it stays a priority until the project is on its feet and producing. We would hate to see it started and then have the money frittered away on beginning other similar projects before ours is finished. This may seem a selfish attitude but I would like to see this method of fish management tried and proven here on the Rogue river in order that those who say we will never get our summer steelhead and spring chinook runs back are proven wrong.

THE ANGLER'S LOG
The reports from the Klamath river indicate a large run of steelhead down by Happy Camp. The salmon are thick up at Hornbrook and some fishermen are having luck catching these. If the weather brings enough rain in the next few days we should be in the middle of a darn good steelhead season during the next few weeks.

Diamond Lake — Is pretty good. Fish up to 5 pounds are being taken. The cold nights have caused the algae to settle out but the bottom weeds are growing closer to the surface and interfering with trolling to some degree. Fly fishing morning and evening gives good results with the woolly worm getting the most takers. Flatfish are doing quite well also.

Fish Lake — Fishing is good with fish running from 10 to 12 inches. The water level has risen about 8 inches but it's still low. The Forest Service is progressing with its cleanup of deadheads and snags. It ought to really look good in a couple of years.

Four Mile Lake — Is producing some fine catches of brook trout trolling FF&W. Water is low and the fishing is down toward the dam and out from the dock.

Lake of the Woods — Fishing is picking up but there aren't enough anglers to hold it. Trolling is producing catches from 10 to 14 inches. Willow Creek — Some nice fish are being caught. Leo O'Leary from Grants Pass landed a 4 pounder on FF&W. Flies are taking fish up to 18 inches. Yellow woolly worm is best. Green flatfish are also taking fish. Water is clear and a little low.

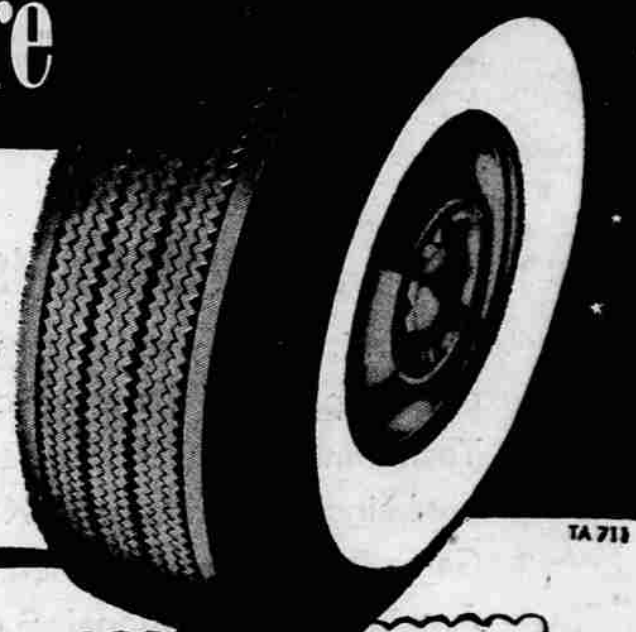
