

### Vancouver Child Drowns in Pond

Vancouver, a Wash. — (UPI) — Michael James Givens, 6, drowned Wednesday in a large pond on property of his family near here. Coroner Paul Mylan said the boy apparently walked into the pond and slipped on a ledge into water about five feet deep.

The boy's body was found by his father, Earl Givens, a fireman.

## Many Factors Cause Heat Loss

A house, like a body, is constantly giving off heat when it is warmer than its surroundings. The amount of heat a home loses depends upon many factors — outside temperature, wind velocity, size of a house, number of windows and doors, type of construction, kind and amount of insulation in the ceiling and walls, and many others. Even the number of people and how they live in a home must be considered.

Since owners pay for the heat lost from their home, they will want to restrict the

heat losses by all possible means to get the greatest efficiency justified by the savings and comfort produced.

The use of good materials and sound construction is always worthwhile.

Proper insulation of the ceilings and walls is recommended for all homes. The savings in heating costs (about one-third in most cases) usually is enough to pay for the original cost of the insulation within a few years. A more even temperature can be obtained throughout a home, and during the hot summer months the home will be cooler.

#### Size of Windows

The greater the number and size of windows and doors, the more heat a home will need. Heat escapes through glass easily and also gets out through all cracks and openings. Storm windows and storm doors will reduce the loss of heat through windows and doors by 50 per cent.

Naturally, a small room will require less heat than a large room, and the colder it gets outside and the higher the temperature is kept inside, more heat will be needed.

The heat which will be lost from a house during the coldest day must be calculated and enough heating capacity supplied to provide the comfort wanted. For a specific room, the heating capacity needed will always be the same regardless of the heating system used.

### Cost Estimates Are Available

The cost of electric heating depends upon the heating capacity in the home, how much is used and kilowatt hour cost for electricity, and how much heat is needed.

The electric utility representative or an electrical contractor can estimate closely what the cost will be for electric heating which will fit individual requirements.

Electric heating is 100 per cent efficient; all the electricity is converted into heat, according to the Cal-Ore Electrical league. A 1,000 watt unit operated for one hour steadily will produce 3,413 BTU of heat and use one kilowatt hour of electricity. The meter registers in kilowatt hour usage.

#### Recommendation

It is recommended that heat be left on during colder periods both day and night. However, if the heat is turned down during the night, 65 degrees Fahrenheit is not unbearable, and only a few minutes are required to bring the room to livable temperature in the morning.

Vapor on windows in cold weather indicates excess humidity in the room and ventilation should be provided either with a small fan or by natural processes.

Heating the air consumes a few kilowatt hours. Heating costs originate primarily by the necessity of having to bring walls and objects in the

## Electric Heating Adds to Leisure

Today's homemaker is seeking things that are handy—easy to use—time-saving. Simplicity is the outstanding keynote of modern living. More time is given to leisure—less time is given to tiresome household tasks.

Electricity has taken much of the unpleasantness out of maintaining the house. And now, it has taken most of the maintenance and all of the mess out of heating the house.

There are two general methods of heating electrically, resistance heating and the heat pump, the Cal-Ore Electrical league says. Resistance heating is by wire, similar to the form of heat used in electric irons, toasters, dryers, ranges. There are several types of resistance heating, providing a choice of equipment best suited to various sizes and styles of homes.

The electric heat pump is a completely self-contained all-electric heating and cooling conditioner that cools the home in summer, heats it in winter and conditions the air in all seasons. Using only air and electricity, its operation is similar to that of a refrigerator.

The coming of electric heat was inevitable, and the trend toward it is rapidly increasing, the league noted. It literally makes other methods of heating obsolete—it's clean,

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## CENTRAL POINT School Enrollment Up

Central Point—Central Point schools opened Monday with an increase over last year's enrollment.

Enrollment at Jewett school totaled 312 with 153 first grade students and 159 second grade students. Last year there were 308 registered and the year before there were 283.

Crater High school recorded a total of 668 students. The number is expected to increase with the return next week of students now employed in the fruit harvest. Last year 652 students registered the first day.

One hundred sixty-five students in grade 7, and 129 students in grade 8 registered at the junior high school. Central Point Elementary and Junior High school recorded an enrollment of 887 students. Last year's enrollment was 824.

## Liquor Commission To Quit Special Orders

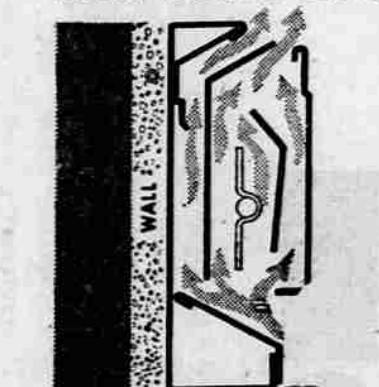
Portland — (UPI) — The State Liquor Control Commission said Thursday it no longer would fill special orders from bars and clubs for unlisted brands of liquor.

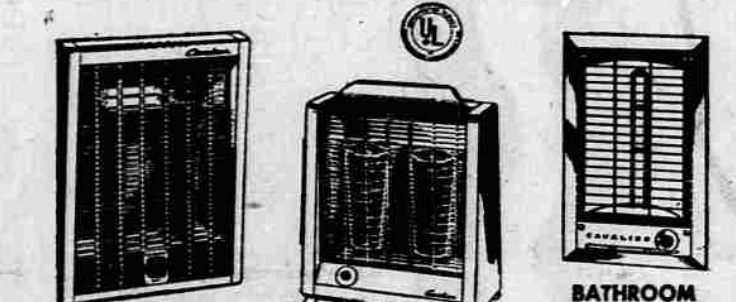


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
