

## Public Hearing Slated Oct. 15 On Rezoning Highway Property

A public hearing was set for Oct. 15 by the Medford city council last night on a request to change the Harold Farr property fronting on the North Pacific highway from Class IV limited industrial to Class V light industrial.

The planning commission Sept. 10 recommended the change.

The planning commission pointed out that the new trailer ordinance would not effect the property as far as zones are concerned. The owner wants to make improvements on the property but must secure a zone change before financing can be completed, it was noted.

"Due to the non-conforming status of the Farr property and in order for him to operate the existing trailer park and make necessary improvements to the property, the zone change is recommended," the planning commission wrote in its recommendation.

### Approve Plans

The council also approved plans and specifications for paving streets in Ellendale subdivision, the revised plans for paving Verde Terrace as recommended and paving

Shannon dr. between Mira Mar dr. and Nieto way.

The city planning commission has given tentative approval for a plat in the Ellendale subdivision being developed by Dan Patch. Only a final plat, however, has been filed on a small section adjoining Ellen dr. on the north. The developer plans to construct streets within the subdivision according to the city's specifications. City Manager Robert Duff said.

Verde Terrace on a dead-end lane south of Woodlawn dr. in the Verde Hills area serves five properties, of which face on Woodlawn ave. The council approved previously a 23-foot paved section for the lane.

Property owners state that a sidewalk reservation on the street would not be necessary to serve the three residences which would be the principal users and that the wider section would provide some parking during special events or parties in the neighborhood.

### Curbs and Gutters

Curbs and gutters would be installed on this improvement and it would be necessary to have a set back six inches

from each property line to provide for forming gutters. Total paved section would be 28 feet excluding curbs and gutters on each side, Duff said.

Shannon dr. is part of the Mont Crest subdivision. The work will be performed by the subdividers who will pay the contractor directly. No assessments against the properties are involved, the city manager said.

The city council granted Jeske Brothers construction company a 30-day extension for completion of the Berrydale sanitary sewer. Acquisition of easements for the project delayed the contractor in the beginning, the engineering department pointed out. Necessary easements were secured on May 18, over 30 days after the contract had been awarded.

## Oregon Centennial Exposition Closes Run of 100 Days

Portland (UPI)—They rang down the curtain on the 100-day Centennial Exposition at midnight Thursday.

The final day's attendance was 12,311, bringing the total to 1,335,082. This was an average per day of 13,350.

The biggest crowd was on Sunday, Sept. 13 with 32,173. The smallest was on Tuesday, Sept. 8 with 3,496.

### Horns Sound

The blare of hundreds of automobile horns in the parking lot sounded the end of the event which marked Oregon's 100th year of statehood.

The closing day was marked with a tribute from Gov. Mark Hatfield in the International Garden of Tomorrow. Hatfield said Oregon is grateful to those who had a part in the Centennial celebrations.

Oregon's chief executive said he believed the Centennial served a purpose of showing to the people that they have important trade obligations and emphasizing the oneness of the state.

He said the progress of Oregon has been emphasized as "we look forward to the second century."

### Bulbs Presented

A symbolic presentation of 4,000 begonia bulbs, gift of the government of Belgium to the International Garden of Tomorrow, was made to Hatfield by C. A. Fowler, Seattle trade analyst with the Belgian consulate. The bulbs are for later planting either in

the capitol mall or other state grounds.

Mrs. Hatfield was presented with a large bouquet of Mojave roses from the garden by Centennial Commissioner Janet Baumhover. Mrs. Hatfield then pinned a single red bud from a centennial rose bush on the governor's lapel.

The Centennial celebration officially ended with the dousing of a gas-fired torch high above the main entrance.

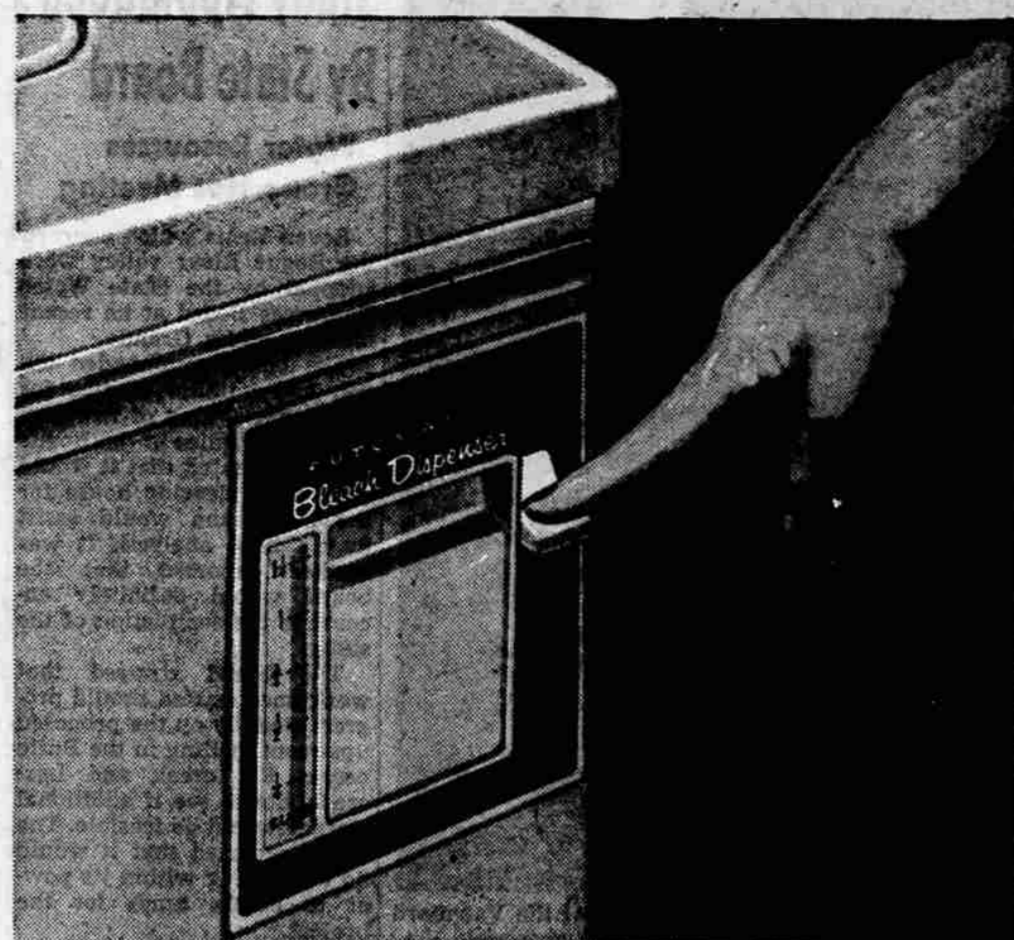

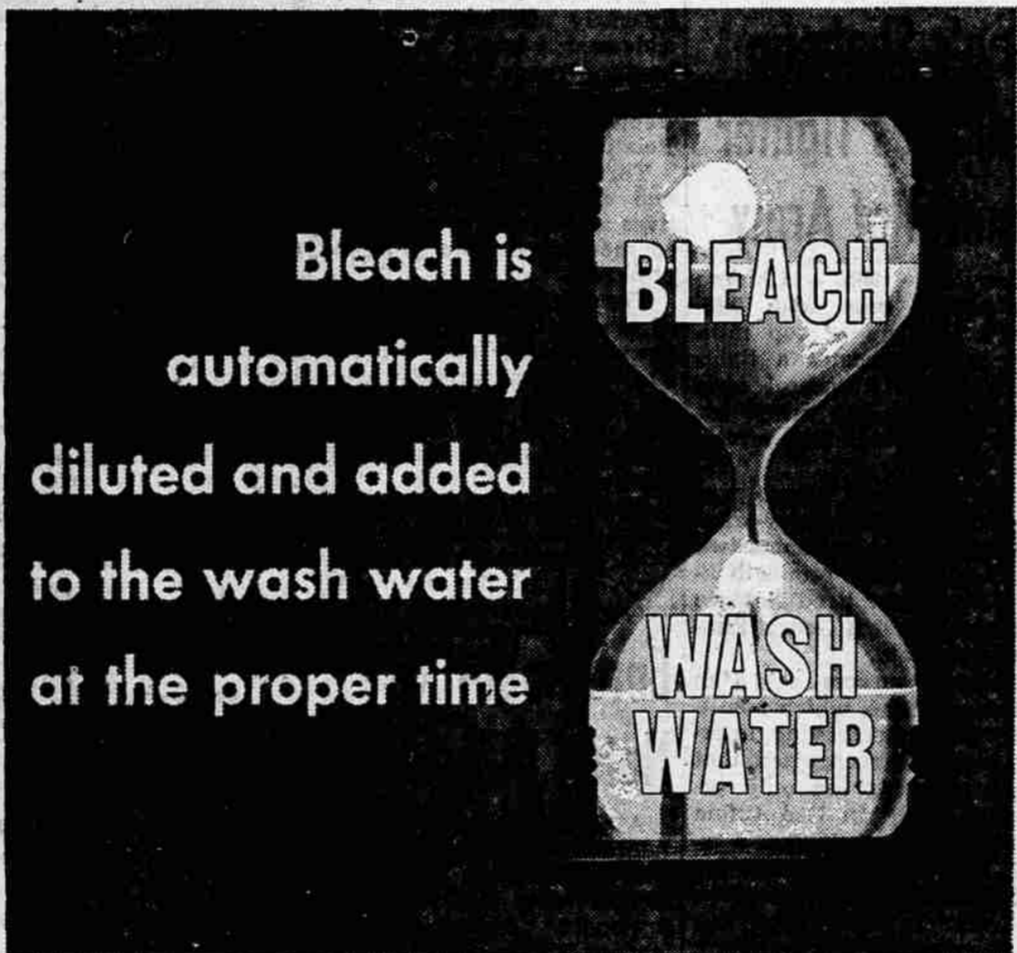

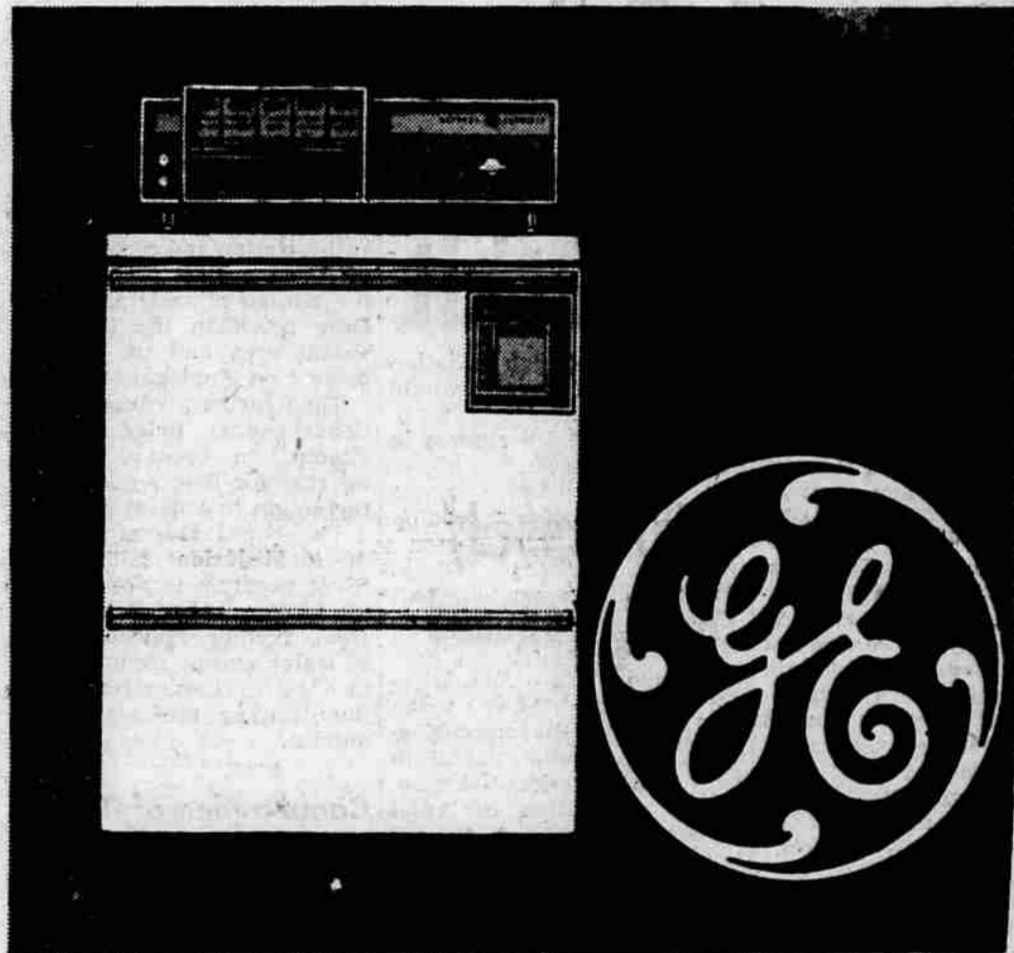
