Negatives are developed and prints are made within minutes after the racing messengers reach a nearby town.



12:45 An operator slips a print of the plane crash picture onto a vice tied to U.P.I.'s nationwide Telephoto-Facsimile network.



12:52 On the U.P.I. facsimile machine in the newspaper office, the picture rolls out, completely finished and ready to be made into an engraving. The photo editor clips it out and starts it on the way to the front page.



2:15 A cut is made, locked up in the forms, and the presses roll. Within two hours of the time U.P.I. took the picture, readers see it on the front page of their local newspaper, alongside the news story of the plane crash.
