

Reminders Issued Vets in Schools

Three "money" reminders to the half-million veterans planning to train this fall under the Korean GI Bill were issued today by S. T. Brannock, contract representative, VA Domiciliary, Camp White.

First, veteran-students were reminded to take along enough money of their own to tide them over their first two months of GI training. It takes that long, under the law, for a veteran's first monthly GI allowance check to reach him.

Brannock's second reminder has to do with monthly certifications of classroom attendance. These should be signed by the veteran and a representative of his school, and sent to VA promptly after each month of training completed. Late certifications invariably mean late checks, Brannock said.

The third reminder is for veteran-students who want to get part-time jobs after school. There is no limit on the amount GI students may earn outside of class. In fact, they need not even report outside earnings to VA.

The only "ceiling" applies to veterans training on-the-job. In their case, if earnings rise above a certain level, GI allowances will be reduced, Brannock said.

Democrat Congress Passes 40 Per Cent Of Ike's Program

Washington - Even though he's a "lame duck" President with the biggest opposition Congress in 20 years, President Eisenhower managed to push 40.4 per cent of his legislative program through the first session of the 86th Congress.

A Congressional Quarterly analysis shows that Mr. Eisenhower made 228 specific requests of Congress this year and Congress acted favorably on 92 of them. This 40.4 batting average was worse than all other Eisenhower years in the White House except 1957, when he battled .369. But in 1957 he had more Republicans in Congress than in 1959 and he had just emerged from a great victory at the polls.

The relatively good showing this year can be laid to President Eisenhower's effective use of the veto and the veto threat and the assistance he received from the new minority leaders in the House and Senate.

Halleck, Dirksen Aided
The new House Minority Leader, Charles A. Halleck (Ind.), is considered a shrewd fighter in legislative battles. And in the Senate, Everett McKinley Dirksen (Ill.) has won a reputation in his first year as Minority Leader as a skillful trader and negotiator.

In addition, the President established what observers considered a pleasant working relationship with the Democratic leaders in both houses. Faced with the veto, they more often accommodated themselves to the President's desires than risked his displeasure.

The Democrats control the House with 283 Members to 153 Republicans. In the Senate, it's 65 Democrats to 35 Republicans. This is the biggest majority since the 75th Congress in 1937 came in with 331 Democrats and 89 Republicans in the House and 76 Democrats and 16 Republicans in the Senate.

Ike's Boxscore
Here is how the President's 228-point program did in the Congress topheavy with Democrats whose election last year brought predictions of disaster for the Administration program:
92 Eisenhower requests were approved by both House and Senate and are either law or awaiting the President's signature - 40.4 per cent.
9 requests were passed by either the House or Senate but not both. They can be passed by the other chamber next year - 3.9 per cent.
24 had received some committee action but no floor action as yet - 10.5 per cent.
54 requests received no action at all but can be acted on next year - 23.7 per cent.
49 received unfavorable action, either through rejection in committee or on the floor,

but could be brought up again next year - 21.5 per cent.
President Eisenhower's best legislative score was made in his first two years (1953-54) with a Republican-dominated Congress, the only one of his administration. In 1953 he scored 72.7 per cent and in 1954, 64.7 per cent. In subsequent years, with Democratic majorities in control, he scored as follows with his legislative program: 1955-46.3 per cent; 1956-45.7 per cent; 1957-36.9 per cent, and 1958-46.6 per cent.

Right after the Democratic landslide at the polls last November, President Eisenhower was asked whether he thought the strength of the opposition in Congress would doom his legislative program. He showed prescience by saying:
"Not at all. I have always dealt with the Democratic Congress in what I thought, in my honest conviction, was good for the country, and I think there is a lot of them believe that they want to do what is good for the country. And I assure you again that I'm talking about a good many people in that Party."

The Tomato Isn't A Fruit Or Vegetable, but a Berry

Don't look now, but the tomato is neither a fruit nor a vegetable; neither is the banana, but that's botany for you; you can hardly tell who's who or what's what without a program.

Go right ahead and kid yourself that you are eating a vegetable when you have sliced tomatoes if you insist. But in reality you are eating a berry! And so, too, believe it or not, is the banana. Even after many years of cultivation, the tomato was considered only as ornamental; raised only because of the attractive foliage, and the unusualness of the "berry." And this early start, so the botanist says, was in Peru. Later the tomato was introduced into Europe as a curiosity; from there it was brought to America.

'Love Apple'
At the time it was called "love apple." Children were cautioned against eating it, as it was considered highly poisonous. Even after many years of association, and timid experimentation on early American tables, the housewife was still pretty careful to cut out all bruises and blemishes. It was generally believed at the time that the blemish would cause cancer. Strangely enough this silly

superstition persisted for many years.

There are many wild varieties of tomatoes; these are usually yellow instead of red. Nearly all have bitter taste. Some of the wild ones resemble the so-called "ground cherry." They grow low to the ground in a parachute-like husk, and look like a Chinese lantern.

Three or four decades ago growers and plant scientists found that the "love apple" responded favorably to cultivation and hybridization. Through their combined efforts we now have plump, red tomatoes, delicious in salads or in bright red slices on a hamburger.

It's Vitamin C
The acceptance of the tomato as one of the principal sources of vitamin C and one of the most nutritious of foods has been an uphill struggle, but at last it has arrived.

Fortunately, "truth will usually prevail" and today there is hardly a person in America who does not enjoy the nutritional goodness that Nature packed in the plump, hermetically sealed globes with the jaunty red jackets that we call tomatoes; it's the "berries."
