

Tigers Stall White Sox In Drive To League Pennant

The Detroit Tigers stalled Chicago's drive toward its first American league pennant in 40 years Saturday by defeating the White Sox, 5-4.

The loss meant that the White Sox cannot clinch the pennant until Sunday when they play the Tigers again. The second-place Cleveland Indians, who trail by five games, were at Kansas City for a night game.

The second-place Cleveland Indians stayed alive in the American league pennant race when they crushed the Kansas City Athletics, 13-7, Saturday night to move within 4½ games of the first-place Chicago White Sox.

Had the Indians lost last night, the White Sox automatically would have been assured at least a tie for the pennant. As it is, the "magic number" remained at two.

Any number of Chicago victories or Cleveland losses to tallying two will give the White Sox their first pennant in 40 years.

Southpaw Jack Harshman won the game for the Indians, scattering nine hits for his seventh victory of the year, in addition to contributing a double and two single's in Cleveland's 19-hit attack. Minnie Minoso hit his 20th homer for the Indians. Johnny Kucks was the loser.

Earlier, the Detroit Tigers beat the White Sox, 5-4.

Paul Foytack, with a ninth-inning assist from Ray Narleski, got the victory over the White Sox. Pennant-bound Chicago, however, got close when Norm Cash belted a two-run homer in the ninth to close the gap to 5-4. Narleski then got Ted Kluszewski on a high fly to preserve Foytack's 14th victory.

Dick Donovan, the Chicago starter, Barry Latman and Ray Moore were tagged for the first three Detroit runs, but Gerry Staley gave up what proved to be the winning run in the eighth when the Tigers scored twice for a 5-2 lead.

In other games, the New York Yankees defeated the Boston Red Sox, 3-1, on Yogi Berra day, and the Baltimore Orioles edged the Washington Senators, 5-3, with the help of Willie Tasby's 13th home run.

Whitely Ford pitched four-hit ball to notch his 15th victory as a crowd of 24,005 turned out at Yankee stadium to honor Berra, the Yankee star now in his 14th major league season. Robby Richardson batted in two runs and Marv Throneberry hit a homer to account for all three New York runs.

Boston's lone run, scored in the eighth, was unearned. Berra was honored by his

teammates, the Red Sox and his fans in pre-game ceremonies. Among other gifts he received an automobile from the Yankee front office, a silver tray from his teammates and fishing and golfing equipment from the Red Sox.

The Orioles scored twice in the seventh to take a 4-3 lead and Tasky belted him home run in the ninth for an insurance marker. Milt Pappas was the winner, gaining his 15th victory, while Tex Clevenger was the loser.

Surprise Starter Pays Off On Hunch

San Francisco - (UP) - Roger Craig, a surprise starter, hurled the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 4-1 victory over San Francisco Saturday and pulled his team to within one game of the league-leading Giants in the opener of a day-night double-header.

Manager Walt Alston had planned to go with Craig Saturday night but decided to switch him with Don Drysdale when statistics disclosed that the latter pitched better at night than in the sunshine.

The first part of Alston's hunch paid off. Craig, who has a lifetime record of six wins and one defeat against the Giants, scattered six hits in posting his ninth win of the season.

Johnny Antonelli, who was taking a third shot at becoming a 20-game winner this year, got the hook in the fourth inning while Los Angeles was drawing out to a 3-0 lead.

Troubles Begin
The moody southpaw's troubles began in the second inning when the Dodgers slapped him for four straight singles and two runs after he had retired the first two batters.

Veteran Carl Furillo started Antonelli towards the exit with his 10th loss when he opened the fourth frame with a double into the left-field corner, was sacrificed to third, then tallied on a single by Maury Wills, who got three hits in four trips to the plate.

Stu Miller came in to retire the side and gave up another run in the sixth on a pair of singles by Wills and Joe Pignatano, which were followed by Craig's sacrifice to bring in Wills. Wills, who had streaked home in the second inning from third base after catcher Hobie Landrith made an errant throw back to

LSU Tigers Swamp Rice By 26 to 3 in Final Period

The Louisiana State Tigers, national college football champions of 1958, exploded for 19 points in the final period Saturday to whip Rice, 26-3, while the 1959 campaign moved into full swing with a wave of upsets and near-upsets.

It appeared Coach Paul Dietzel's Tigers, unbeaten and untied in 1958, would head the list of beaten favorites when they trailed the Owls at the half, 3-0.

But the Tigers came out after the intermission and went in front to stay when Billy Cannon, their All-America halfback, raced 17 yards for a third quarter touchdown. In the final period, Tommy Neck plunged for a touchdown, Warren Rabb passed 32 yards to Merle Schexnaydre for another and Wendell Harris boosted a field goal for LSU Gordon Speer's 46-yard field goal gave Rice its halftime edge.

But several other major powers weren't able to show the bounce produced by the Tigers. Maryland upset West Virginia's Southern conference champions; Georgia downed Alabama in a mild Southeastern conference surprise, 17-3; Clemson upset North Carolina in a clash of Atlantic Coast conference favorites, 20-18; Cincinnati upset Oklahoma State, 22-9; William and Mary upset Virginia by a smashing 37-0 margin, and Wichita surprised Kansas State, 19-0.

Like Louisiana State, several highly-regarded teams had to sweat for victory in their openers.

Rogue River Wins Over Canyonville

Rogue River - Rogue River high opened its 1959 football campaign Friday night by thumping Canyonville here 32 to 0.

The Chieftans were limited to just one touchdown in the first half but collected four more and a safety over the rest of the distance.

A five-yard run by Bill Pentecost capped a 66-yard touchdown drive by Rogue River in the first quarter. Paul Archer broke off tackle and ran 71 yards to the pay zone in the third quarter. The safety came in the same period when a Canyonville reverse failed and a back was tackled in the end zone. Then, on a 54-yard promenade, Archer went off tackle for the last 18.

Archer's 62-yard jaunt in the fourth quarter goth the fourth TD of the fracas and Pentecost went the last half-yard of a 62-yard march for the final score.

Rogue River dominated the offense with eight fort downs to one and 225 net yards from scrimmage to four. The Chieftans also put up good defense, recovering two Canyonville fumbles and intercepting four passes.

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Dodgers Climb to One Game Near National League Lead

The Los Angeles Dodgers climbed to within one game of the National League lead Saturday when they defeated the first-place San Francisco Giants, 4-1, behind Roger Craig's six-hit pitching in the opener of a day-night double-header.

Craig, who scored his ninth victory against five defeats and originally had been scheduled to pitch the night portion of the twin-bill, blanked the Giants until the ninth when they scored their lone run on a walk, Leon Wagner's pinch double and an infield out.

Southpaw Johnny Antonelli, making his third try for his 20th victory, wound up with his 10th defeat instead.

The Dodgers got to him for two runs in the second inning and routed him in the fourth when they scored their third run.

Catcher Hobie Landrith's error helped the Dodgers to one of their two runs in the second inning and Los Angeles added another run in the fourth on Carl Furillo's double, a sacrifice and a single by Maury Wills, who collected three of the Dodgers' nine hits. The Dodgers registered their final run off Stu Miller in the sixth.

Bill Mazerowski's two-run triple in the 12th inning gave the Pirates a 4-3 victory over the Reds and reliever Roy Face his 18th triumph in 19 decisions.

Cincinnati got to Face for

one run in the top of the 12th, but a double by Dick Stuart, a hit batsman and Mazerowski's triple off loser Brooks Lawrence gave Pittsburgh the victory. Mazerowski also homered off starter Don Newcombe in the third inning.

In addition to the nightcap between the Dodgers and Giants, two other N. L. night games were scheduled. Milwaukee was at Philadelphia for one and Chicago at St. Louis in the other.
